American Legion Meeting.

Seventy-five members were in at tendance at the monthly meeting of the local post of the American Legion held last Friday evening in this city Both the Cloverdale and Wheeler dis tricts were represented and ex-ser vice men from practically all parts of the County were present.

The attraction for the meeting wa the announcement that the legislation proposed by the Legion in the federal Congress would come up for discussion. Under the plan outlined by the Legion, every man who was in the service at any time during the war would be entitled to assistance from the federal government in one of four different ways, namely: He might receive preference in settling upon vacant lands; or he might recieve a direct loan from the government in building a home or in purchasing or improving farm lands; or he might receive aid in getting vocational training; or he might receive a readjustment of pay on the basis of a \$50 bond for every month that he was in the federal service.

It is proposed that each man should have the option to choose which form of assistance he might desire. In any case, he would receive only one of the four benefits. No opposition to the proposed

measure was apparent among the members present and upon motion. the plan received unanimous support of the post.

Medals awarded by the State in reognition of service by men who enlisted or were inducted from this State were presented to a number of the men present. Many failed to receive their medals because of their failure to furnish the information required before the medal can be awarded. I. E. Keldson, adjutant of of the post, is gathering additional data covering men who have not received their medals. All service men who believe themselves entitled to one and who have not yet received one should communicate with Mr. Keldson. The medals are being presented only through posts of the Legion but it is not required that a man be a member of the Legion to secure one.
