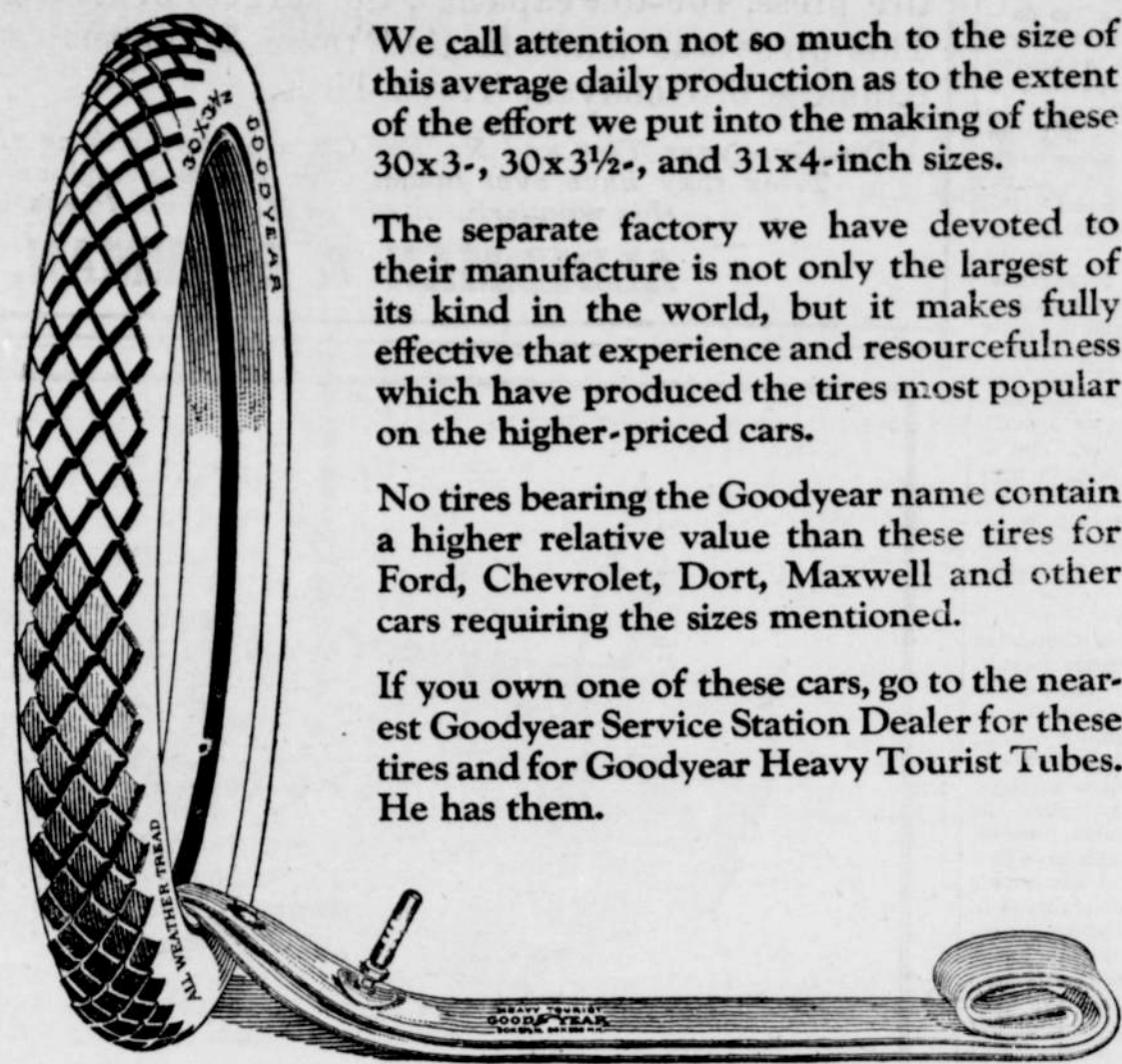

To the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon: The undersigned, being the owners of more than fifty per cent of the land in Tillamook County, Oregon, and within the boundaries of the drainage district proposed to be organized as hereinafter described, do hereby petition your honorable body, and pray that you cause to be organized and formed a drainage district, for the purpose of having the lands herein described re-claimed and protected in the manner herein set forth from the effects of water, for sanitary and agriculture purposes, and for the benefit and welfare of the public, and for public utility.

For the purpose of this petition the undersigned petitioners state the following facts, which are required under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915, and as amended by Chapter 414 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1917:

First—The name proposed for such district herein prayed for is Sunset Drainage District.

Second—The boundary lines of the proposed district are as follows: Beginning at the point where the West bank of the South fork of the Nehalem river intersects Section line, running East and West, between Sections 23 and 26, in Township 3 North of Range 10 West W. M., and running thence West along said section line to the point where the same intersects the East bank of the main channel of the Nehalem river, and running thence in a southerly direction along the East bank of said river to the 16th section line running East and West through the South half of Section 35 in said Township and Range; thence East along said 16th section line to the West line of the right of way of the Southern Pacific Company's railroad; thence Northerly and Easterly along said line of said railroad right of way to a point where the same intersects the Northerly line of the county road near Mohler; thence Easterly along the North side of said county road to the West bank of the South fork of the Nehalem river; thence following the South fork of the Nehalem river down stream, to the place of beginning.

And petitioners state and allege, that such lands constitute a contiguous body of swamp, wet and overflow lands.

Third—The total acreage included in said proposed district is 851 acres.

Fourth—That names of the owners of land in said district as shown by the records of Tillamook County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of said owners, is as follows: Charles Kunze, one-third interest in 621 acres.

J. J. Rupp, one-third interest in 621 acres.
O. A. Schultz, one-third interest in 621 acres.
Rudolph Zweifel, 155 acres.
George Loerpebel, 75 acres.

Fifth—The proposed reclamation is for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and such proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare and of public utility and advantage.

Sixth—All of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed district.

Seventh—The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done, and the best interests of the land included, and the owners of such lands, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such district.

method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands proposed to be included in said district.

Ninth—That the proposed plan for reclamation and protection of the property of such district is, that a dike shall be constructed along such portion of the outer boundary of said district as shall be found necessary to protect the lands in said district from overflow from the tide waters of the Pacific Ocean, together with such tide-gates and other works as may be necessary to give the protection required from effects of such overflow. The details of such construction to be worked out by the Chief Engineer and Supervisor of such district after the same is organized, and your petitioners would show that at the present time the tide overflows the land in said district to a great extent, and renders the same unprofitable, but by the construction of a dike, with suitable tide-gates therein along the western boundary of said district, the tides can be shut off from said lands, and they can thereby be effectually drained and rendered productive.

Tenth—The signers of this petition hereby agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred, and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their lands for the purpose of paying the expenses of organizing, or attempting to organize the proposed district.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the Court to be properly included in the proposed district either permanently or until further investigation or surveys may permit elimination, shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the name of Sunset Drainage District, under the provisions of the laws hereinbefore mentioned.

'MADE IN GERMANY' SIGN RETURNS.

Cheap Earthenware, Cutlery, Toys and Musical Instruments Make Their Appearance Once More in British Markets.

"Made in Germany," the old familiar trade mark inscribed on most of the cutlery, crockery, earthenware toys and musical instruments in common use three or four years ago, again has made its appearance in Britain, causing surprise and alarm among the inhabitants of that tight little island, who fear a reversion to conditions existing before the war.

Articles bearing this well known sign are beginning to work their way to the front in stores in England and Scotland simply because they are much cheaper than British made goods.

German firms have resumed business relations with British merchants and are affording them unusual opportunities for profit making. British manufacturers are unable to compete with their German rivals, who completely undersell every production. German scissors which have reached the British market are sold at about half of the price of Sheffield makes. Knives and razors which form a large proportion of the imported articles, also are sold at enticing prices. A German made knife can be purchased for one shilling and sixpence (36 cents normally), while its equivalent in English makes costs seven shillings and sixpence (\$1.80).

Manufacturers in Germany who specialize in toys and musical instruments are offering to supply British warehouses with these at prices far below the cost of the domestic make. The presence of cheap German enamel ware is also felt in the British market. For instance, a 12 inch German made basin costs one shilling and sixpence, whereas four shilling and sixpence (\$1.08) is asked for an English made basin. In every instance, however, the British made goods are much superior to the German samples.—New York Sun.
