**Notice of Hearing of Petition to Form Drainage District.**

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook. Notice is hereby given, that hearing on the following petition will be held at the Court House in the City of Tillamook, County of Tillamook, State of Oregon, on the 5th day of May, 1920, for the purpose of determining whether the prayer of said petition should be granted.

All persons owning or claiming an interest in lands described in said petition are hereby notified to appear at said place on said date, and show cause, if any there be, why the prayer in said petition should not be granted.

**To the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon:**

The undersigned, being the owners of more than fifty per cent of the land in Tillamook County, Oregon, and within the boundaries of the drainage district proposed to be organized as hereinafter described, do hereby petition your honorable body, and pray that you cause to be organized and formed a drainage district, for the purpose of having the lands herein described reclaimed and protected in the manner herein set forth from the effects of water, for sanitary and agriculture purposes, and for the benefit and welfare of the public, and for public utility.

For the purposes of this petition the undersigned petitioners state the following facts, which are required under the provisions of Chapter 249 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915, and as amended by Chapter 414 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1917:

First—The name proposed for such district herein prayed for is Sunset Drainage District.

Second—The boundary lines of the proposed district are as follows: Beginning at the point where the West bank of the South fork of the Nehalem river intersects the Section line, running East and West, between Sections 23 and 26, in Township 3 North of Range 10 West W. M., and running thence West along said section line to the point where the same intersects the East bank of the main channel of the Nehalem river, and running thence in a southerly direction along the East bank of said river to the 16th section line, running East and West through the South half of Section 35 in said Township and Range; thence East along said 16th section line to the West line of the right of way of the Southern Pacific Company's railroad; thence Northerly and Easterly along said line of said railroad to a point where the same intersects the Northerly line of the county road near Mohler; thence Easterly along the North side of said county road to the West bank of the South fork of the Nehalem river; thence following the South fork of the Nehalem river, down stream, to the place of beginning.

And petitioners state and allege, that such lands constitute a contiguous body of swamp, wet and overflow lands.

Third—The total acreage included in said proposed district is 851 acres.

Fourth—That names of the owners of land in said district as shown by the records of Tillamook County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of said owners, is as follows: Charles Kunze, one-third interest in 621 acres.  
J. J. Rupp, one-third interest in 621 acres.  
O. A. Schultz, one-third interest in 621 acres.  
Rudolph Zweifel, 155 acres.  
George Loerpabel, 75 acres.

Fifth—The proposed reclamation is for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and such proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare and of public utility and benefit.

Sixth—All of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed district.

Seventh—The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done, and the best interests of the land included, and the owners of such lands as a whole, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such district.

Eighth—That the promotion of a drainage district under the provisions of the acts heretofore referred to and under which this petition is presented, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands proposed to be included in said district.

Ninth—That the proposed plan for reclamation and protection of the property of such district is, that a dike shall be constructed along such portion of the outer boundary of said district as shall be found necessary to protect the lands in said district from overflow from the tide waters of the Pacific Ocean, together with such tide-gates and other works as may be necessary to give the protection required from effects of such overflow. The details of such construction to be worked out by the Chief Engineer and Supervisor of such district after the same is organized, and your petitioners would show that at the present time the tide overflows the land in said district to a great extent, and renders the same unprofitable, but by the construction of a dike, with suitable tide-gates therein along the western boundary of said district, the tides can be shut off from said lands, and they can thereby be effectually drained and rendered productive.

Tenth—The signers of this petition hereby agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred, and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their lands for the purpose of paying the expenses of organizing, or attempting to organize, the proposed district.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the Court to be properly included in the proposed district either permanently or until further investigation or surveys may permit elimination, shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the name of Sunset Drainage District, under the provisions of the laws heretofore mentioned.

**Topics of Interest.**

**Champ Clark says:** "I lost the nomination solely through the vile and malicious slanders of Col. William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska," writing in "My Quarter Century of American Politics." (Harper's). Later he adds: "It was on the fourteenth ballot that William Jennings Bryan violated his instructions and by base and false insinuations—to use no uglier word—robbed me of the nomination to which I was entitled by all the rules of decency, justice, honesty, common sense and fair dealing, as I had a clear majority on eight ballots."

Marshal Tuan Chi-Jui, former premier of the Chinese Cabinet and present head of the National Defense Board, says: "I cannot refrain from mentioning the admirable attitude of the American Congress toward the Far Eastern question in the matter of the peace treaty. It seems that public opinion in America is being guided much more by ideals than by interests. Your diplomacy is endeavoring not merely to prevent war today but to maintain peace forever. You set a fine example for the people of your sister republic, who will look to you for cooperation and counsel when the Pacific question comes to be settled."

Harris Taylor, former American Ambassador to Spain and a recognized authority on international laws, says: "The rejection of the peace treaty by the Senate and its return to the President brings the entire matter to an end. The only thing the President can do is to initiate a new treaty, which would have to be entirely acceptable to the Senate. The practical thing now will be the adoption of the Knox resolution, which if vetoed, will doubtless be passed over the president's veto. Thereafter the United States and Germany will proceed in their relations on the basis of former treaties and in accordance with the principles of international law."

Laurence Hills cables from Paris to the New York Sun and Herald: "Designed by its covenant to be the superintendant of the world's peace, the league of nations affairs are in such desperate straits just now that the correspondent of the Sun and New York Herald learns on reliable authority that it has been obliged lately to borrow funds from British bankers to keep it going. Sir Eric Drummond has been forced to resort to this, it is alleged, to tide things over until the members of the league pay up their subscriptions which, it would appear, they have been extremely slow in doing. Special appropriations must be voted by the various parliaments, and there is so little confidence in the league that the parliamentary committees are loath to include them in the payments in their budgets with the governments so hard up."

Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler president of Columbia University, says: "We would have to go back 1,800 years to find a highly organized opposition to Christianity as that which exists today. The feeling that every change in progress and that in some mysterious way the outcome will be all right as no basis in fact, unless we do our part. In the government schools of Russia, one hour each day is spent in removing the traces of what we call civilization and the Christian religion." He criticizes the tendency to avoid fundamental principles and discuss the details of education, politics, economics and religion. "Christianity today is not only overlooked and neglected, but it is positively antagonized. A new element has taken its place in the world. We are race to face with a teaching that holds Christianity to be not only an illusion and a superstition, but a fraud invented to gain control over men. This you will read in every tract of the Socialists, in every publication of the Bolsheviks. The virtues extolled by the philosophers, humanity, charity, service, are held by them to be worthy only the attention of children, and the world must get along without them; from life must be excluded everything that partakes of religious belief and organization."

Dr. E. J. Dillon, the English journalist and author, concludes his very celebrated work on "The Inside History of the Peace Conference," in the following words: "Whatever the tests one applies to the work of the conference—ethical, social, or political—they reveal it as a factor eminently calculated to sap high interests, to weaken the moral nerve of the present generation, or fan the flames of national and racial hatred, to dig an abyss between the classes and the masses, and to throw open the sluice gates to the inrush of anarchist internationalities. Truth, justice, equity, and liberty have been twisted and pressed into the service of economic-political boards. In the United States the people who prided themselves on their aloofness are already fighting over European interests. In Europe every nation's hand is raised against its ruling class. Every government is making its policy subservient to the needs of the future war which universally looked upon as an unavoidable outcome of the Versailles peace. Imperialism and militarism are striking roots in soil where they were hitherto unknown. In a word, Prussianism, instead of being destroyed, has been openly adopted by its ostensible enemies, and the huge sacrifices offered up to the heroic armies of the former nations are being misused to give one-half of the world just cause to raise up against the other half."
