Editorial Snap Shots.

The Baptist New World movement plans to raise in the 36 states embraced by the Northern Baptist Church \$100,000,000. A little sum like that wouldn't amount to anything by the democratic administration.

We notice that the ministerial association at Salem as having gone on record as opposed to the money drive of the Inter Church Movement. It seems to us they have acted wisely and know what the people are thinking about drives for money these days.

It seems there is considerable friction on account of the building of a new school house at Bay City, as well as some unpleasant feeling. We want to pour oil on the troubled waters. Bury the hatchet, ladies and gentlemen, for as Bay City is an ideal location for a good school, in a few years you will wonder why the school district got into such a turmoil. Maybe, some mistakes have been made and we are free to admit this—we all make mistakes, at times—but forget them, ladies and gentlemen, and all pull together for one of the best schools in the county. A district school fight, we know is a nasty thing, and sometimes proves very discreditable to those who take part in them, as well as a bad reputation for the district. The best friends of education are those who make an effort to avoid trouble in school districts, for friction means trouble for the school board and trouble for the teachers.

Democratic wool in Tillamook appears to be somewhat ruffled because the Herald, a dyed-in-the-wool, "he kept us out of war" democratic local organ, is advocating a republican for the office of joint senator. If republicans wanted office there is nothing to prevent them from throwing their hats into the political ring and take chances with the other republican candidates. What we object to is a democratic newspaper poking its nose into the affairs of the republican party in an effort to name and support republican candidates. At one time, when the president undertook to dictate what should be done in Oregon, Governor Penneyer politely wired to Washington for the president to mind his own business and the governor would do the same, and this is pretty good advice to give to the Herald. There are a number of intelligent, capable democrats in the county who could fill the position, but the Herald evidently does not think so, for no one ever heard it advocate a democrat for the office of joint senator. What's the matter with Judge Webster Holmes, J. S. Lamar, S. A. Brodhead, P. W. Todd and a number of other democrats that that they should be ignored by the democratic organ and a republican boosted for the position? There's something rotten somewhere in the democratic party of this county when the dyed-in-the-wool, "he kept us out of war," democratic organ has become a dyed-in-the-wool mugwump newspaper.

Mr. C. J. Edwards has consented to make the race for joint senator of Tillamook Washington, Yamhill and Lincoln counties, and we are sure this meets with the approval of most every republican in Tillamook county. Mr. Edwards was not very anxious to make the race, but as so many business men and others almost insisted upon him doing so he finally gave way and consented to make the race. Mr. Edwards represented this county in the lower house at the last session of the legislature, and being a good practical business man, rendered good service. The snap shot man is exceedingly pleased that Mr. Edwards will be a candidate for joint senator, and the county is fortunate in having him make the race. As there are other candidates, who are making an active campaign, Mr. Edwards must have the solid backing of the republicans of Tillamook county to win, for being one of the smallest of the four counties, Tillamook is somewhat handicapped when it comes to votes. No doubt, Lincoln county will support a coast county man, and Mr. Edwards is sure to poll a good vote in Yamhill county, which insures a good prospect for him winning the nomination. It is exceedingly important that this county be represented in the state senate at the next session of the state legislature for there will be a re-distribution of representation both in the senate and the house. It is now up to the republicans of this county to get out and vote at the primary election and vote for Mr. Edwards, for that will insure his nomination and election, and this county having a voice when the seats are re-distributed.

At last! The burden of Democratic pay roll padding has been lessened by the Republicans. Forty thousand superfluous government employees who have been fattening the payrolls of the administration are dispensed with by the new legislative, executive and appropriation bill which has been formulated in accordance with the Republican policy of paring all expenditures to the bone.

A Dallas, Texas, Democratic writes to the New York World saying the Senate ought to be abolished and its functions performed by the president's cabinet. The truth is that the administration organs would like to abolish every agency of government but the president. After the inauguration of a Republican president on the 4th of March next they will lose their enthusiasm for the scheme.

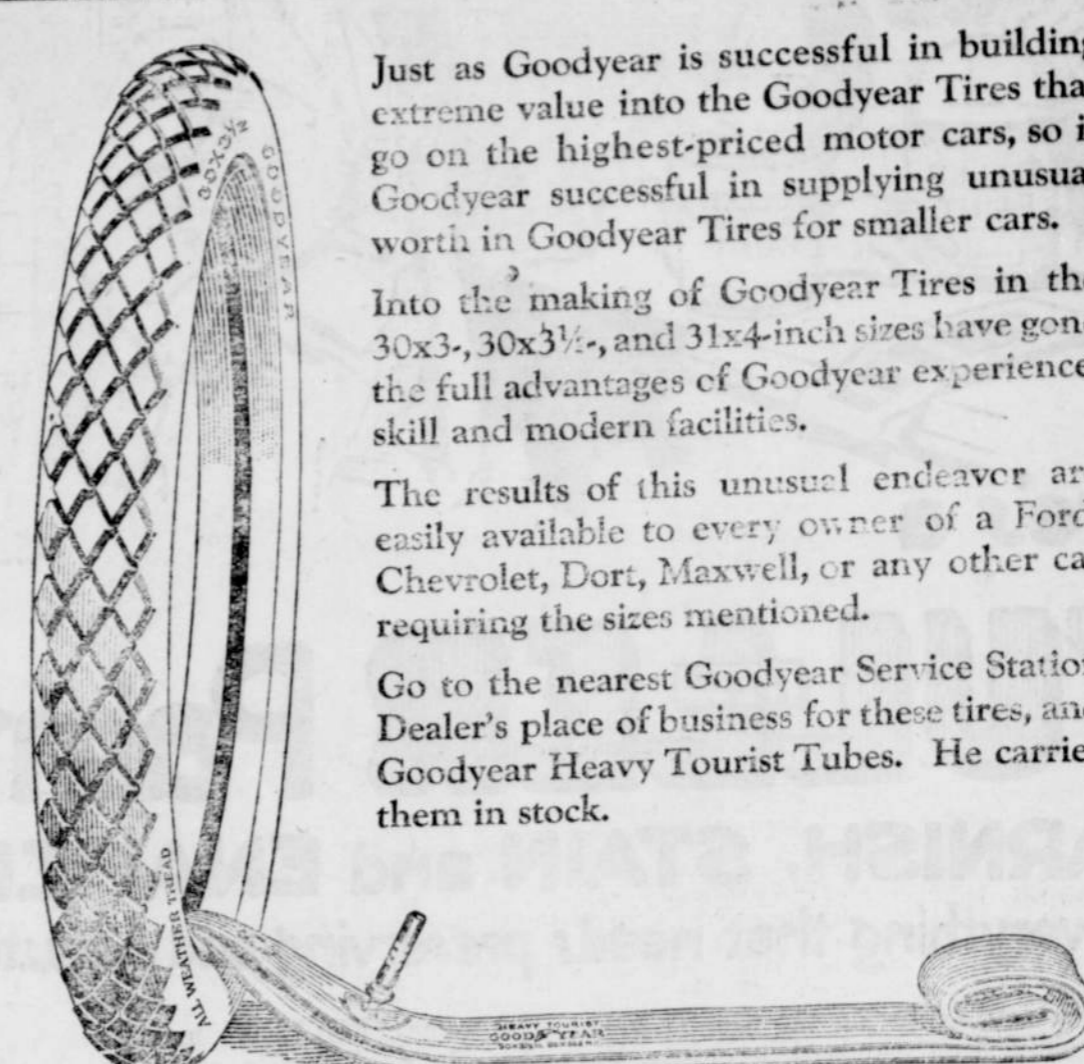
