**Topics of Interest.**

The London Morning Post says of the U. S. Senate's action on the treaty of peace: "The main cause of the rejection of the peace treaty is the covenant of the league of nations—which had, in fact, nothing to do with the peace terms, but was spatch-cooked into them by President Wilson and his obsequious seconds in this country. We have always contended that the sentiment that moved the senate to reject the covenant was sound, patriotic sentiment—America's value of national sovereignty. They saw in the covenant an encroachment on that sovereignty and even the substitution of an international sovereignty, and their national patriotism revolted at the idea. And it was a healthy revolt. For the league of nations, when all is said, is a substitute government in Switzerland for the government of Americans. It is an excellent scheme for those who have no country, but for those who have a country—a great country of their own—it is a delusion and a snare."

St. Louis Times: "The Measure of silliness of J. Sharpe Williams was taken when, as a woodchopper of Mr. Wilson and the league of nations, he voted with the irreconcilable enemies of the treaty to reject it Nov. 19 and again March 19. His charge of a 'conspiracy' against the president, coupled with his belief that the President's enemies desire his death, may be executed as the garrulity of a somewhat showy old man whose mind was overcultivated and has long been overirrigated. Senator Williams has reached such a stage of irresponsibility that after an outburst, such as his recent attack on persons of Irish extraction in America, he falls asleep, not always occupying his own desk. It has been occasion for protest that he has occupied other Senator's seats, the fear being expressed that visitors in the galleries might form erroneous conclusions."

Frank H. Simonds says: "In my judgment if there is to be a league of nations, any form of association we shall have to begin over again and at the beginning we shall have to content ourselves with a far modest foundation and proceed only so far as there is a common agreement on both sides of the Atlantic. In the formation of that association we shall have equally to avoid forcing our views upon Europe and permitting Europe to press her own views upon us. As it stands, Europe has in fact rejected ours and we have rejected hers. This was inevitable, given the total difference of actual conception. And in my judgment, the real league of nations will only be possible when not merely the United States and her recent allies, but Germany and Russia, as well, are able and ready to participate in the formation of such an association. Had the league of nations come into being now, with the United States as a partner, the result would almost inevitably have been the formation of a rival league of nations with Germany and Russia as the main factors, with socialism in one form or another as the basic principle, and events would war between the two systems of alliances."

Gov. Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, in a recent interview, said: "The government of the United States need today a business administration conforming to the old-fashioned idea of Americanism. I believe in government according to the Constitution. I don't believe the time will ever come when we will need to suspend any of the rights set forth in that document. The rights of free speech, free assembly and free press must be maintained. Any citizens should have the right to express his political views, and to bring others to his belief, if he can do so by peaceable persuasion, but when he resorts to violence to work changes in government then it is time for the government to take a had quickly and firmly. The chief problem of Americanization is one of education. The man who thoroughly understands what America means is little apt to be a transmitter of revolutionary ideas. I am in favor of letting in all the immigrants who want to come to America, providing they adhere to the principles of American government. We who are here and acquainted with those principles should make a special effort to see that the newcomer speedily learns them. We can't expect a foreigner to like this country unless he gets a decent home and a decent wage. The success of any industry can no longer be measured by dollars and cents. The only true measure is the well being of the men who work in it. I believe in profit sharing in industry, and in the cooperation of all engaged in it, whether working with brain or brawn. The ownership of private property is an economic motive for which no satisfactory substitute has been found. Private property is essential to civilization. The greater the number of people owning property the higher the civilization."
