THE TWO MILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TAX LAW.

County Supt. G. B. Lamb Explains Details of Measure on Ballot—Present Basis Does Not Provide as Equal Distribution of Funds as Provided for Under the Proposed Law.

At the special election to be held May 21st, 1920, the voters of Oregon will be called upon to vote upon the Elementary Educational Bill. This is by far the most important one for the betterment of our schools proposed in many years hence its provisions should be thoroughly understood.

Briefly speaking, the bill proposes a state-wide tax of two mills, to be levied upon all taxable property of the state, to raise a fund for the elementary schools, to be apportioned upon the basis of the number of teachers employed in the several districts of each county in grades from one to eight inclusive, one teacher being allowed for each thirty pupils or fraction thereof. The proposed law does not do away with the present state and county apportionment, nor does it change the method of distributing it. On the other hand, it need not necessarily be an additional tax. Many districts now levy a special school tax, in fact this year forty four districts levied special taxes to the average amount of 4.5 mills. The millage tax would in many instances reduce districts from levying any special tax or materially reduce the special tax usually voted.

Perhaps the chief merit of the bill lies in the fact that it is a fairer and more equal way of raising and distributing school tax than the method now used which is unsatisfactory. The chief item of cost in maintaining any school is the salary of the teacher. Compare the cost of maintaining two one-room schools. One we will say has six and the other thirty pupils. In both cases the cost of equipment and salary is about equal, yet under the census basis of distribution one school gets at least three times as much funds as the other. Then, too, districts differ widely in valuation. Many districts are very low in valuation. Our lowest is \$16,250.00. Then, others having no more children to educate, but being situated in rich timber sections, have a very high valuation. To illustrate: district No. 37, with a valuation of \$36,020.00 levied this year 8 mills and will get \$288.16. They have a school enrollment of fifteen pupils. District No. 33, with a school census of 25 and a valuation of \$53,340.00, levies 1.01 mills and will get \$559.02. The former district with nearly eight times the levy, raises approximately one half the amount of money as the latter. Both are one room schools.

A striking feature of this matter is that in the poorer districts nearly all the money is paid by the patrons of the school. While in the wealthier districts a large portion is paid by non-resident property owners. This proposed law is strong in that it places back of the schools and the education of every child in the county, every dollar of taxable property, including that owned by wealthy non-residents, basing its apportionment on the number of teachers—chief item of expense. Oregon is one of only seven states that has no state wide taxation for elementary education, while practically all the states apportion half the funds upon the teacher basis.

Now how much will this county get out of the law if it passes? A few figures tell. The assessed valuation of the county is twenty-two million dollars. A two mill tax upon this will produce \$44,000.00. 42-cent in mind that this is not necessarily an increase in tax, as I stated before, as such districts do not need extra funds may levy no special tax. This year \$92,000.00 special taxes were levied. Under the proposed law, this should be lowered by approximately \$44,000.00. Dividing \$44,000.00 by 76, the number of elementary teachers in the county schools, we get approximately \$575.00 per teacher unit. This means that each one-room school will receive in addition to the County and State funds now received, approximately \$575.00 from this state fund, and each two room school \$1,150.00, etc, according to the number of teachers. Because of a more equal distribution, a large majority of the districts of the county will receive more money than is now received, or would be received from a special two mill tax in such districts. More money, and more equal distribution, therefore, will be available under the proposed law and that is one of its chief purposes.

More revenue is needed for the support of the schools or our whole educational system is threatened. In so many cases the special school taxes by the district have reached a point where people cannot meet the additional requirements without state aid. The U. S. Commissioner of education in 1909 told us that 18000 schools failed to open this year for want of teachers; that there are 41,900 teachers below standing who could not pass a teachers examination; last year one-fifth of all the children went to school to teachers who had less than high school education—not another civilized people on earth of which this can be said. Our State Superintendent Churchill informs us that our own state is threatened with this condition. Many of our best teachers are taking up other lines of work more profitable financially. A careful investigation of applications now filed in this office reveals that many of the teachers are not up to the standard desired for school work.

Next year Tillamook county must have twenty-five teachers from some place other than in the county, as more than that number are leaving the profession or county, this summer. It is a matter of finance, and this bill will help.

This breakdown in our schools at a time when we need more than ever before the Americanizing,

steadying influence of education, directed by strong, level headed conscientious teachers. The passing of this bill will place Oregon schools upon their feet.
