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**Brief Items of Interest to The Dairyman and Stock Breeder.**

It is none too early for the stock breeders of this County to plan for their exhibits at the county fair, State Fair and International this fall.

The County Fair will be held at the "old" grounds this year. This is good common sense as there is no funds or appropriation for the development of the "new" fair ground as yet; then again, the high prices of all materials and labor conditions are such at this time that it would be exceedingly costly to attempt any extensive improvements such as will become necessary at the new fair grounds. Plans should be made to develop the new Tillamook Fair Grounds covering several years along a complete plan as to buildings and landscape arrangement with the end in view that all buildings, drives, walks and parkings will be attractive and useful.

We hear and read much about the need for better dairy cattle, all of which is perhaps true. But the real need of the world is for better men and women. The cattle now are better than the dairymen. There isn't a cow on earth so scrubby that she would feed oleomargarine to her calf.—Missouri Farmer.

A Hereford bull, Domino Jr., has been sold for \$15,000 to C. B. Scott, of Colorado, and a cow of the same breed, for \$2000 to B. H. Connor of Texas. A Hampshire hog changed hands lately for \$2800 and the boar Longfellow 2nd sold for \$5000. These transactions were in South Dakota and Georgia. Purebred livestock certainly "runs into money" these days!

We would like to ask some expert in mathematics to figure out how many purebred cows you would have in ten years, starting with one fresh purebred with a heifer calf and assuming that all their descendants are females and that all live. No doubt, the answer will surprise you. This is a fascinating field for conjecture as well as calculation and would pay some of our dairymen well to figure it out and then—"tell the world" yourself and your neighbor that you proposed to have quite a considerable purebred herd in less than ten years.

The school of home economics of the New York state college of agriculture conducted a brief experiment last summer to demonstrate the value of milk in the diet of boys and girls. Ten under-nourished children who had contracted tubercular tendencies were selected for the experiment and during four weeks in which they were given a quart of milk a day as part of an adequate diet, they were weighed at regular intervals and record was kept of their weights. All but two of the children gained from 2.8 to 13.6 per cent in weight. Other two who failed to gain, one had enlarged thyroid glands and the other suffered from homesickness. Experiment, though very interesting, did not, of course, show what the addition of milk to an adequate diet would do for a child. It adds, however, to the already abundant proof as to the importance of milk as a food for children, which has been obtained since Dr. McCollum announced the result of his experiments concerning the growth-producing elements of foods.

While the "high cost of living" continues to trouble more of our people, the high cost of labor coupled with the shortage of competent help is having a serious effect upon the dairy and stock farmer the country over. Many stockmen are selling their holdings and retiring from the business on account of their inability to get farm help necessary to the production of forage crops. The dairyman, if he has "good producers" is just holding down his job 365 days of the year—on a 12 to 14 hour work day—hoping that hay and feed will not go any higher.

Canada's highest record cow, "Zarilda Clothilde"—a purebred Holstein has just completed a year's official milk record of 13,153.6 lb., which contained 955.34 lbs fat. The last three year's production averages 31,149.2 lbs. annually, she averaged 100 lbs. of milk per day for 260 days.

"Melba's Rima," a purebred Jersey owned by I. J. Miller, Jr., of Ohio, holds the breed milk record for cows of her age. Beginning at eleven years and eleven months she produced in 365 days 18,255.8 lbs. milk, 793.31 lbs. fat. Only three Jerseys of any age have exceeded this milk flow.

According to the Guernsey Breeders' Journal, twenty-nine Guernsey sales were held during the calendar year 1919. A total of 1,309 Guernseys sold for \$715,748 or an average of \$546. Two hundred thirteen bulls averaged \$470 and 1,096 cows averaged \$561, corresponding figures for 1918 show that in thirty-eight sales 1,318 Guernseys were sold for an average price of \$330. Seven hundred thirty-seven females averaged \$385, 167 bulls averaged \$284, and 414 unclassified Guernseys averaged \$252.

The Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, has acquired, by will, through the death of the owner, O. C. Barber, the 1300-acre Anna Dean Farm, valued at four million dollars. There were at one time seven hundred head of live stock on the farm, among them the present record Guernsey cow, Murne Cowan, and the champion, Spottswood Daisy Pearl. Since Dean Knickerbocker assumed charge, about five years ago Holsteins have been added to the other breeds.

John R. Shibley says that 74 per cent of the registered daughters of his Jersey bull, Spermfield Owl, are

on the Register of Merit; among them Spermfield Owl's Eva, with 993 lbs. of fat, Spermfield Owl's Temisa, 875 lbs. fat, Owl's Interested Tones and Owl's Sayda's Queen 779 lbs. fat each, and Spermfield Owl's Victor Lass, 716 lbs. fat. Eva has made in six tests 76,549 lbs. milk and 4383 lbs. fat.

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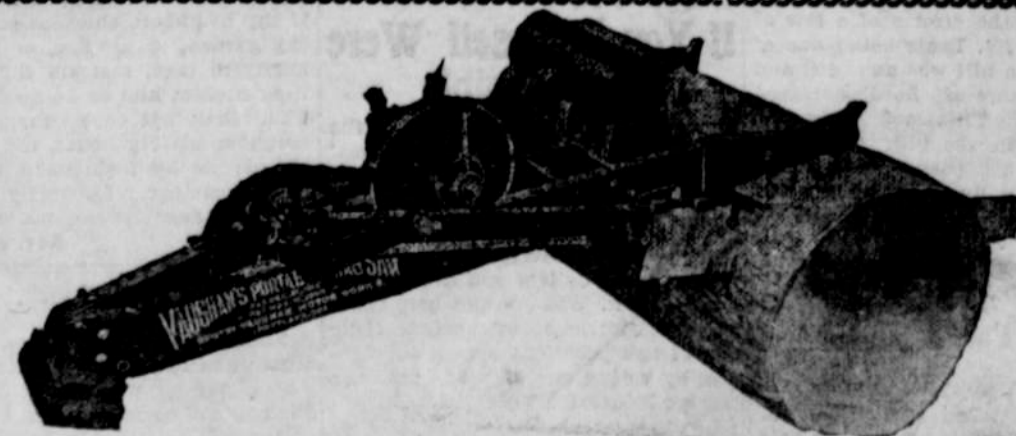
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
