Editorial Snap Shots.

Up goes the high cost of paper again—\$200.00 advance on 5000 lbs. Newspaper is getting more valuable than bank paper. We move that all the other drives for money be abandoned and that a drive for a billion or so be made for the country editors.

Notwithstanding the repeated assertion of the government that the high cost of living has reached the limit, most everything continues on the jump. The fact of the matter is the democratic administration has mused up things so badly that it is impotent to bring about any improvement.

We hope Tillamook County will give General Wood a good vote at the primary nominating election next month. Republicans should not overlook the fact that it was California, with the aid of the Johnson faction, that defeated Hughes in that state which gave us another four years of the Wilson administration. That's what Johnson did to the Republican party four years ago, who is now a candidate for president. Show your resentment of his action and vote for Wood delegates.

In the death of W. G. Dwight this city lost one of its most progressive citizens, yet it is unfortunate that he was a victim of the great white plague, when only in the prime of life. He was one of the few business men who took the initiative in building up the city and county along progressive lines, and was one of those who helped in a financial way to bring this about. The snap shot man differed with Mr. Dwight after he first came to Tillamook in a good many things, but when the old rule or ruin faction was broken up and it was necessary to broaden out and progress, Mr. Dwight was one of those who showed the progressive spirit, giving his time and money to help along the good work. The last effort in that direction was when Mr. Dwight consented to become a member of the Roosevelt military highway committee for Tillamook county, in which he did excellent work. The snap shot man felt pained when he was informed that it would only be a question of a few months that he would pass away, and since the end came, we know we express the sentiment of business men and citizens that we have lost a good citizen, and it is only fitting that we should express our heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved wife and relatives.

Tillamook County will be in a duc of a fix if the constitutional amendment fails to pass which provides that the state can be bonded up to 4 per cent for permanent roads. This does not increase taxation, but it enables the State Highway Commission to procure money to carry out certain road improvements, amongst which are road improvements in Tillamook county. The County Court has prepared about 15 miles of road bed for hard surfacing, with the understanding that the commission would go 50-50. The county is prepared with money to pay its share, but the commission is not, unless this constitutional measure carries. If it fails to carry, it will leave the county in a bad fix, and the only way out will be to spend money in having these roads graveled, which will be a serious waste of money but absolutely necessary for the roads will have to have some kind of surfacing. This is a matter that concerns every part of the county and it is the opinion of the snap shot man that an effort be made in every precinct to get the voters out at the primary election. It is exceedingly important that this county obtain the additional 15 miles of hard surfaced road, and the way to get it is to turn out and vote for the amendment. We may state for the information of the voters of Tillamook county that there will be a separate ballot for the constitutional amendments, and all those who have registered either as republicans, democrats, independents, etc., can vote.

Some little surprise took place when Fred R. Beals announced himself as a candidate for joint representative of Tillamook and Yamhill counties, and some persons wondered what would be the attitude of the snap shot man. The primary nominating election gives those who aspire to public office an opportunity to do so, and Mr. Beals is fully within his rights when he submits his name to the republicans to be voted upon. We want to say this for Mr. Beals, that since the inception of the good roads movement he has been a hard worker, and was one of those who saw that it was imperative that the county should bond itself for permanent road improvements to be in a position to obtain assistance from the State Highway Commission, and when the state highway bill was pending in the state legislature it was through the efforts of a few of our citizens, Mr. Beals being one of them, that the bill was amended and 20 miles or more of hard surfaced road south of Tillamook City was provided for in the bill. The snap shot man is in a position to know, having taken a lively interest in the bonding of the county, that Mr. Beals partly financed the first bond election in this county, and although it was the Headlight that did the trick and created public sentiment, Mr. Beals certainly did some hard work and it cost him some money as it did the snap shot man. Mr. Beals was just as much interested in the second county bond election, so we are better informed than most any other person as to what Mr. Beals did to obtain permanent roads in the county. Although Mr. Beals was not one of the members of the Tillamook

committee that had charge of the Roosevelt Military Highway measure, he was an enthusiastic booster. We want to say this if Mr. Beals is nominated and elected, if there is any "pork" to be obtained for Tillamook and Yamhill counties at the state legislature, you can bet dollars to doughnuts that these counties will get their share. There is another important matter that will come up, and that is the redistribution of seats in the state legislature at the next session, and we want to see this "joint" system knocked out, for we think that Tillamook county is important enough to have a representative in both houses without being tied up with other counties. We may add that our attitude toward Mr. Beals is exactly the same as other republican candidates, viz., those who receive the nomination will have the Headlight's hearty support at the general election, for we're going to help elect a Republican president, United States Senator and republicans all down the line.

G. A. R. Notes.

It is earnestly requested that all graves be nicely cleaned up before Decoration Day. Appoint yourself a committee of one. Here is an "Emergency Call" and a "Drive" one in all. It is desired to complete a roster of all soldier's graves in Tillamook county, of all wars. And it must be done soon, or those who can furnish the required data will be gone. It should be put into permanent form and filed where it can be preserved and can be brought up to date from year to year. Four points of information are necessary, viz: (1) The full name correctly spelled. (2) The war in which he served, Mexican, Civil, Spanish-American, World War, etc. (3) Dates of birth and death, at least the year. (4) Name of cemetery or place where interred. It is also desired to have a full record of unmarked graves. The U. S. government furnishes marble slabs free for all such. Write for information to the Post Commander, Tillamook.

A complete list of all veterans and their wives and families is desired for the Decoration Day parade either on foot or in cars. Bring a basket lunch and you will be cared for by the Relief Corps at the Christian Church.

It is very much desired that every Civil War veteran in the county shall become a member of Corinth Post, G. A. R., membership costs but one dollar a year. ESSAY CONTEST.

Pure Bred Stock—Tillamook Cheese—Production Records.

Mr. Rollie W. Watson is the promoter of an essay contest among the school boys and girls of Tillamook County. In this he is aided by other public spirited citizens whose names will be published later.

Here is the Essay Contest Plan. Prizes are offered for essays in grades 3 to 8, and high schools. The first prize will be a silver medal, suitably engraved, one to each grade, and one to high school. Second prize, silver medal suitably engraved. Third prize, bronze medal suitably engraved.

To each boy and girl winning in each grade in his or her school will be awarded a small bronze pin or button. Essays in the 3rd and 4th grades not to exceed 200 words. Essays in the 5th and 6th grades not to exceed 400 words. Essays in the 7th and 8th grades not to exceed 600 words. Essays in the High School not to exceed 800 words.

Pencil or pen and ink may be used, but writing must be neatly done, and on one side of the paper only. Essays are to be written at home and delivered to the teacher on May 7th, 1920. You may secure information from whatever source you may desire. Consult the County Agriculturalist, Cheese Inspector, Dairy Inspector, Write to the Oregon Agricultural College for bulletin on the subject upon which you decide to write. Do your own writing and use your own language. You may write upon any one of the following subjects.

- "Advantages of Breeding Purebred Stock." "Tillamook Cheese, Why Superior?" "Advantages of Production Record, or Cow Testing." This does not mean that prizes are to be given for essays on each subject, but you are to choose the subject desired, and judges will consider the best essay considering the subject. Essays will be judged strictly on a basis of (1) originality. (2) Expression, such as a child would use. The chief stress is placed on originality. Each school will be the judge of its own product. In one room schools, the teacher or someone appointed by her shall be the judge. In other schools and high schools, the principal or some one appointed by him shall be the judge.

Only the one best essay from each grade in the school is to be sent to the County School Superintendent, and must reach his office not later than May 14th. These essays will then be sent to the O. A. C. for final decision. Prof. Westover, of the O. A. C., has kindly consented to aid in seeing that this is done. Ask your father or brother to tell you all he can about any subject which you decide to write. The following are merely suggestions of some of the points that might be covered. You may use any others you wish.

- Tillamook Cheese. 1.—Natural conditions (climate, feed, water). 2.—Sanitation (factory, dairy, tuberculin testing). 3.—Cheese Inspection. 4.—Making. 5.—Profit. Pure Bred Stock. 1.—Increased production. 2.—Prepotency i. e., ability to reproduce the good qualities in offspring. 3.—Increased returns from sale of stock. 4.—Greater profits. 5.—Increased human efficiency brought about by necessary study of breeding problems. Production Record. 1.—Eliminate borders or non-productive cows. 2.—Increase production average. 3.—Induces more interest in scientific breeding. 4.—Induces more interest in scientific feeding. 5.—Puts dairying on a business basis. The prizes will be awarded publicly and a special occasion made of the event. Geo. B. Lamb, County School Supt.
