Editorial Snap Shots.

Attorney Wallace McCamant, who is well known in this county, is a candidate for delegate at large to the Republican National Convention, and we hope will win in the race, next week, for he is a true blue Republican. The snap shot man ask Republicans to place a cross opposite his name.

The snap shot man is getting primed up to give somebody a good roasting on account of the black cinders flying over the city. Stocks of goods are outrageously high, and to have black cinders blown into the stores and cover up the roofs of buildings is enough to make one fighting mad. Who's responsible for allowing the nuisance?

President Wilson started the White House steam roller to crush Senator Chamberlain, which means there will be a lot of democratic fire works the next few months. What with the Edwards "wet" forces, Bryan's dry brigade and democrats in favor of ratifying the treaty of peace with reservations, a first class entertainment is being staged for the democratic convention at San Francisco. Has our respected democratic Bro. taken another political somersault? What's the matter with Wilson, Bro., you told us a few years ago "he kept us out of war?" And what's the matter with McAdoo, the heir apparent to the democratic throne that he should be ignored and a republican boosted for president?

The snap shot man is through subscribing for and boosting drives for money. Give the people a rest. They have been most liberal contributors to most every drive for money, and it is time to let up. It seems to us that too many persons are making a good living managing drives and living on the money contributed, to say nothing of the large amount of money that is wasted in propaganda. So the best way to prevent these drives is for every body to refuse to contribute. That's what the snap shot man is going to do.

In those good old days when we used to swap a year's subscription for two or three sacks of spuds was not so bad after all. If there is some good kind, Christianly farmer who wants to swap even one sack of spuds for a year's subscription, it won't hurt our feelings in the least, but when we will be able to carry out our part of the agreement is somewhat doubtful, for there's a lot of country newspapers going to the wall on account of the scarcity and high price of paper. But bring along the spuds, anyway as in the good days of plenty.

Sugar in the United States is 25c per pound and in England it is reported it is 8c to 9c per pound. If we had some one at the head of the government, instead of a college professor who kept us out of war, who was looking after the welfare of the people, sugar would and could be sold in the United States for one-third what it is selling for today. The democratic party has made it possible to add thousands of millions to the already long list, the profiteers becoming enormously rich from money taken from the people. We sincerely hope that when the Republicans go to the polls next week they will vote for Ben Jones for secretary of state. It will show that the appreciate what he did to help boost the coast counties. Ben is all right and we can highly recommend him for the job. He will give everybody a square deal, and will be that much stronger to boost for the Roosevelt Military Highway when he is elected secretary of state.

It maybe that State Treasurer Hoff did not use the best of discretion in investing state funds and that the Portland brokers made some money, but after all the newspaper notoriety and grand jury investigation there is nothing wrong with the state treasurer's accounts. We were informed the other day that after the accounts were audited there was

a discrepancy of but one cent, and it cost the state \$30,000 to pay the auditors, to say nothing of what it cost Marion county to make the investigation. The grand jury came to the same conclusion as most people had before the investigation that in the matter of investing state funds this should not be left entirely to the state treasurer, but the governor and secretary of state should have a voice in deciding how and where state funds should be invested.

We have been asked a number of times who Frank C. Reed is, who is running for county commissioner. He has lived in the county about six years at Wheeler and is engaged in trucking. There is something a little amusing about his candidacy. It was reported that A. C. Andersen might be a candidate, and Reed doing considerable trucking for the county, thought he would lose his job if Mr. Anderson was elected. Hence he jumped into the race. With the exception of a little support at Wheeler, Mr. Reed's candidacy is looked upon as a joke by the people in the north part of the county. H. V. Alley has a strong backing in his part of the county and the people up there are not going to throw him down for a comparative stranger. Mr. Alley has always been a valuable addition to the county court, and his ability and experience makes him a valuable servant of the people. When Mr. Reed has lived in the county as long as Mr. Alley has, and had the same experience, then he would have some claim to support, but at present he has not the ghost of a chance to land the nomination.

There is a report in circulation that some of the timber owners are ready to spend large sums of money to defeat Homer Mason for county judge. We hope this is not true. If it is then the timber owners are making a mistake. This is no time for the citizens of this county and the timber owners to line up in a local political fight. Harmony and good will should be the slogan, not political strife. There was too much of that a few years ago when a paid agitator stirred up enmity and discord in the county, and for the good of the county we do not want to see a repetition of it. The timber owners invested in timber, and it is a most easy matter for some malicious, evil disposed, revengeful person to cause them serious loss, for invariably there are a good many persons who feel "sore" after a political election, especially when local aspirants for office are defeated by money big corporations, such as the timber owners. For the best interest of the county, and for the best interest of the timber owners we hope the timber owners will allow the citizens of Tillamook county to elect their own county officials without interference, or money, from the timber owners.

Generally, about election time we receive a letter from E. K. Scovell, time we receive a letter from Scovell, of Nehalem, who has a peculiar way of registering a "knock". The gentleman is certainly somewhat rattled in his argument, being opposed to all the measures with the exception of the lieutenant governor. Let's see what is going to happen to Tillamook county if the 4 per cent indebtedness is defeated. The county court prepared 15 miles of road bed with the understanding that the State Highway Commission would go 50-50. If the measure carries the 15 miles of road will be hard surfaced on that agreement, but if it fails to carry Tillamook county will receive no more money from the state. This will leave the county in a serious predicament, for at present the money is not available to hard surface the road, which will have to be done by special road tax. That is what is going to take place in Tillamook county if the money cannot be obtained from the State Highway Commission. State money to be used for road purposes is obtained from those who own autos and auto trucks, and does not come from farms and landed property. So it can be plainly seen that if the measure fails to carry, the expense of hard surfacing these 15 miles of road will fall upon the taxpayers of the county, and Mr. Scovell will have to dig up his share. We cannot conceive how a person, who has property in this county, can oppose the 4 per cent indebtedness measure, for it will mean several hundred thousand dollars given the county for road work. All will agree with us that the county needs the money and needs the hard surfaced roads. We want to remind Mr. Scovell that a whole lot of road work in the county will immediately stop if the county is deprived of the money that was promised by the state, and a large amount of money will have to be expended on fixing up the roads that have been graded.
