He stated that at the Maple Leaf Creamery they had found an average of 30,000 bacteria per C. C. in the milk delivered by 20 patrons that cooled their milk, while there was an average of 317,000 bacteria per C. C. in the milk delivered by 19 patrons who did not cool their milk. He expected to be back in Tillamook soon and would make further invest-
