Editorial Snap Shots.

Wonder when President Wilson read the republican platform in regard to league covenants, whether he called the delegates to the Chicago convention, "contemptible quitters."

The republican party has taken a wise course in regard to the treaty of peace and the league covenant. It is not opposed to a league but it is opposed to the Wilson one man league.

There is a shortage of most everything, but there won't be any shortage of splendid weather in Tillamook county this summer, for that is something the profiteers cannot raise the price on and bring under the high cost of living.

It is unfortunate for the state, as well as Tillamook county, that road improvements are going on at a time when the cost is twice as much as it was before pre-war times. No one can blame the State Highway Commission for postponing work which had been planned, on account of the money market and the cost of labor and material.

It's now up to the democratic national convention to nominate the heir apparent to the Wilson throne—son-in-law McAdoo, for that appears to be the Wilson program. The idea is a good one, but somehow there is more attraction or amusement in the movie show than in a religious service on Sunday evenings with a large number of persons, and why is it, and who is to blame for that state of affairs?

Some of our influential citizens are discussing the question of harbor improvements, and they are in a quandary to know what is the best course to pursue in obtaining deep water to the upper part of Tillamook bay and as far as Tillamook river. We have always contended that there should have been only one port commission for the entire water shed of Tillamook bay, and that it was unjust to tax one portion of the water shed for the improvement of Tillamook bay and exempt the other portion. But this was what was done by creating the Port of Bay City and not taking in the entire water shed. The injustice of this is now seen, after so much money was expended on the bay and lower bay improvements to stop there and no improvements to upper part of the bay to be considered. That is a selfish, one-sided culmination of harbor improvements.

Hiram Johnson had but a small show of obtaining the nomination, simply because he did not play fair four years ago and refused to meet Hughes when he went to California. Although Johnson has been able to roll up tremendous majorities for himself in California, yet he did nothing to bring success to the Republican party in that state four years ago, which threw its vote to Wilson and which saved the democratic party from defeat. Delegates to the national convention had not forgotten this, hence the frost that Johnson met with when the balloting commenced. But California wanted the nomination and for state pride, and notwithstanding that about nine California millionaires financed Johnson's campaign, he probably would have won out had Johnson and California given its support to Hughes four years ago. That's the reason that California lost out. It is to be hoped that Johnson sees the mistake he made which was the cause of the frost he met with at Chicago.

What happened at the Republican national convention last week was what a large number of Republicans predicted, that neither Wood, Lowden nor Johnson would be nominated and that a "dark horse" would win, and that the conservative element in the Republican party would rule and predominate. It did so, and in nominating Senator Harding it nominated a discreetly conservative, live person and a man of energy and brains. Harvey's Weekly, in discussing the candidates previous to the convention, had this brief paragraph about the Senator, little thinking at the time that he would be the choice of the convention. It is brief but hits the nail squarely on the head: The Senator from Ohio is neither a reactionary nor a progressive. He is a conservative and proud of it. That he would like to be President is a reasonable assumption, but it is equally certain that there will be no heart break for Mr. Harding if he be not chosen. In point of fact, we are strongly inclined to believe that he would just as lief and perhaps a little leifer continue to represent his State in the Senate of the United States. As once was said of his chieftain predecessor, James A. Garfield, Mr. Harding has "a bushel of brains" which he knows how to use to the advantage of his country and his party. Whatever public position he may occupy will be well filled.

Harding Gets Nomination

Warren G. Harding, United States senator from Ohio, was nominated for the presidency by the republican national convention at the tenth national convention on the tenth ballot, after a deadlock which had lasted for nine ballots and which finally forced out of the running all the original favorites.

As his running mate, the convention named Governor Calvin Coolidge of Massachusetts, upsetting a plan of a combination of the Harding backers to nominate for the place Senator Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin. Coolidge was nominated by Wallace McCamant, Oregon.
