Tillamook Roll of Honor. Salem June 8, 1920.

Mr. Homer Mason, County Clerk, Tillamook County, Oregon. Dear Sir—There is attached hereto a statement of the men from Tillamook County who paid their lives in defense of the country during the war with Germany.

This list, covering the Army and Marine Corps only, was made up by this office from red casualty cards furnished the State of Oregon by the War Department.

It is possible that there may be an addition or two because of oversight on the part of the Federal Government, although as the record now stands the list is a complete one covering Tillamook County (except for losses in the Navy.)

It is requested that if there are any omissions of if any of the data contained hereon is inaccurate that the relatives inform this office. To this end it is desirable, if you wish to do so, that the list be given your local paper for circulation.

I might add that if there is any information which you or the relatives of the men who died desire other than that contained hereon, I will be very glad to give you a complete statement in the case of any man from the records furnished us by the Federal Government.

Getchell, Leonard C., private Infantry, Hebo, killed in action, October 5, 1918.

Gray, Perry O., Private Infantry, Blaine, died of pneumonia, January 16, 1918.

McKinens, Donald B., Corporal Infantry, Mohler, killed in action, October 15, 1918.

Mills, Howard B., Private Tank Corps, Tillamook, died of pneumonia, September 28, 1918.

Loerabel, Guy, Private 1st Class, Mohler, killed in action May 29, 1918.

Van Northwick, Roy H., Private Signal Corps, Garibaldi, died of pneumonia, January 16, 1919.

Williams, Lloyd, Private Coast Artillery, died of pneumonia, November 5, 1918.

SHUT DOWN INEVITABLE

Lumber Market and Labor Conditions Are the Cause.

Owing to the car shortage and lumber being in poor demand. A large proportion of the logging camps and saw mills between this city and Banks will close down indefinitely.

During the close down some of the saw mills will make necessary repairs. The shut down will mean that hundreds of men will be thrown out of employment within the next few weeks.

Mill men complain that they have had more or less trouble in keeping men, some of whom work for a few days or a week or so and then quit, and a large proportion of that class will not do an honest day's work, hence the logging camps and saw mills are handicapped on that account.

There is no telling when milling activities will be resumed, as conditions all over the country are very unsettled, for there is a tightening up in the money market and in all lines of business.

What probably had something to do with the lumber market being glutted, was on account of the high price and scarcity of other building material, making it almost prohibi-
