**YOUNG MEN SHOULD OWN THEIR OWN HOMES**

Tillamook City Should Get Into the Home Building Movement.

The City Home Building Movement is something that should appeal to the citizens of this city and should obtain the support of those who are in a position to lend a helping hand, for there is too much money these days put into autos, gas and upkeep, and too little put into homes. We are sure most sensible people will agree with us that this is the case, and that it is poor economy and poor judgment for a person to put several thousand dollars into a machine and live in a rented house. It will not be long now before building material and labor can be had at reasonable rates, and when that time comes, it would be a wise move to encourage young men with families to build and own their own homes.

A good article appeared in the Journal of Commerce and as it throws some light on this subject, we reprint it below:

Get Under Your Own Roof. There is one kind of debt which will not call down the thunders of criticism upon the borrower. That is the prudent and necessary debt a young man may assume in order to buy a home. Such an investment partakes of some of the virtues of life insurance. It is a forefending against the day of misfortune.

The young man who sets out to own his own home is planting the best kind of an anchor to the windward. Kept within the bounds of modest restraint and in fair proportion to his means and earning power, a home investment becomes a rock of Gibraltar to the worthy citizen. It makes him more independent self-respecting, industrious and self-reliant than he otherwise would be. He takes a larger interest in his city, state and nation, for the reason that he now sees in them the larger bulwarks of his own home.

The ideal condition of affairs would be for each and every family to own its own home. To have it clear of debt is the highly desirable thing, but very often this is not possible. A real estate mortgage is a sign of thrift. It is a sound savings bank into which may go the surplus funds. It will pay good dividends to the holder because the interest charge is cheaper than tribute to a landlord, to say nothing of the wealth of satisfaction to be gleaned from sleeping under your own vine and fig tree.

The home-making aids can never flourish at their best in a rented house. There is a conflict of interest between the landlord and the tenant which operates to the deterioration of the property. Repairs are neglected through motives of false economy on one part and lack of interest on the other. The tenant gets along without refinements and conveniences which he would be encouraged to provide in a home of his own, and thus life is robbed, of some of its possible charm.

We need not feel sorry for the poor landlord if he is forced to sell, because he can find plenty of other investments for his money. It is the tenant who buys that is entitled to the encouragement. He at once becomes more solid and dependable citizen. He is an asset and not a liability to his community.

Take an interest in the home-building movement. Get acquainted with real estate values. Come to know the local agents. They are good men to know. They are stokers who put steam into the city's progress. They are among the bulls and never among the bears when the future is at stake. Never are they more in their element than when at the game of making good home-made city.

**School Clerks to Handle School Funds Again.**

To School Clerks and Boards of Tillamook County, Oregon. Ladies and Gentlemen: This morning the County Court exercising its legal authority made and entered an order that the school district funds be handled by the various school clerks as was the rule prior to June 1919.

This means that the County Treasurer will return to you whatever funds she has belonging to your district. You will draw no more district warrants on her but on the district clerk and in the future all warrant not paid for want of funds must be so endorsed by the district clerk instead of the County Treasurer.

Since the school clerk will handle the district funds a larger bond should be filed than last year, Sec. 192, Page 669, provided that the bond be double the amount of funds coming into the clerk's hands.

The school board shall fix the amount. As soon as the bond is filed in this office and approved, the County Treasurer will be notified to send you your funds whatever they may be.

This should be looked after without delay as now all district financial business is held up until you get this adjusted as the County Treasurer cannot pay funds further for you.

Do not forget that this bond must have a 50 cent renewal stamp this year. You can procure the stamp at the bank. The year was not very satisfactory, as no details were provided as to handling the funds.

I trust you can arrange this soon.
