Obituary Notice D. G. ndall.

In the death of D. G. ndall, on
July 29, Tillamook County lost one
of its oldest and sturdy citizens,
and one of the early settlers of Ore-
gon, for he crossed the plains in
1853 and after residing in different
parts of the state came to Tillamook
County in 1869, when there were
but few citizens here, it with true
western grit and determination he
was one of the industrious citizens
who helped to make Tillamook what
it is today. Uncle George Randall, for
that was the family name he was
known by, retained a memory until
the last, and although somewhat
feeble at times, used to attend circuit
court and appear to take a great
interest in cases and the arguments
of attorneys.

David George Randall was born in
Connecticut, Cawfor Co., Pa., July 10,
1823. He spent the greater part of
his childhood at Lake Erie and
Earle Canal. Later the family moved
to Illinois and from there to Iowa,
where, in 1838, he was married to
Miss Harriet Church. He crossed the
plains in 1838 in company with his
father, two brothers and several Per-
kins brothers. Their trip was un-
eventful. He immigrated to Oregon
in 1853, stopping at The Dalles,
where he headed build the govern-
ment forts at barracks. Later he
entered the Indian service, helping to
place the Indians on Warm Spring
and Grand Ende Reservations. He
spent several years in Lafayette,
farming, and several years in South-
ern Oregon, where he operated a saw
mill. There his son William was

born, who now is a resident of Till-
amook. In 1860 he came to Till-
amook where he engaged in farming
and stock raising and build and op-
erated the first grist mill. At this
time he was married to Miss Martha
Trask, of Tillamook, who died in Oct.
28, 1874. To their union seven child-
ren were born, two died in infancy.
Those living are: Mrs. Henry Olds,
Mrs. Myron Trowbridge, Cyrus Ran-
dall, Mrs. J. J. Rupp and Mrs. Albert
Phelps, all residents of Tillamook.

Tillamook Cheese Notes.

Carl Haberlach reports that the
cheese market is fairly steady, with
buyers just about taking our offer-
ings. No cheese has been placed in
cold storage yet by Tillamook fac-
tories, but this will probably be done
with at least part of the August pro-
duction. Triplets continue selling at
29c., Longhorns and Y. A's. at 30c.

The meeting of the Creamery Asso-
ciation will be held Monday, August
2nd, at the association rooms. Several
matters of importance will come
up and it is desired that every direc-
tor be present upon said day.

One of the matters coming up will
be the proposition of the association
putting in a co-operative hay, feed
and grain store. It has been felt for
some time that in order for the
farmers to be able to make feeding
pay, they should get the hay, feed
and grain at cost prices. Also that
the matter of different farmers going
out and buying hay in the Willamette
Valley in competition with one
another be discouraged, and the buy-
ing done through one agency. As it
is, different farmers have gone to
Banks and bought clover hay as high
as \$25.00. With freight and carrying
charges added makes the hay cost
the farmers \$30.00 and over by
spring. There is a very large crop of
fine hay this year and it is felt that
prices will decline materially if Till-
amook farmers hold off for awhile.

June milk checks will be given out
early next week.

The Lincoln-Tillamook Project.

Mr. and Mrs. William Walton were
in the city this morning from Salem.
Mr. Walton was highly interested in
the Roosevelt Highway measure, and
the editor found him a good booster
for it when he visited Salem, and
strange to relate, although Marion
county is considered to have more
mossbacks than any other county in
the state, it gave the Roosevelt High-
way measure a majority vote. Mr.
Walton is also interested in the pro-
posed road to connect Lincoln and
Tillamook counties and in this con-
nection it is proposed that the ex-
pense of this improvement be divid-
ed between the two counties, the
State Highway Commission and the
government, each contributing \$20,-
000 for the project. As this is a
matter of great importance to Till-
amook county, especially the south
part of the county, it will open up
to development a large stretch of coun-
ty and bring a large volume of trad-
ing to Cloverdale. We consider this
improvement of more importance to
the Nestucca Valley than the Three
Rivers road, and we hope that the
next county budget will provide the
necessary funds for our part of the
work.
