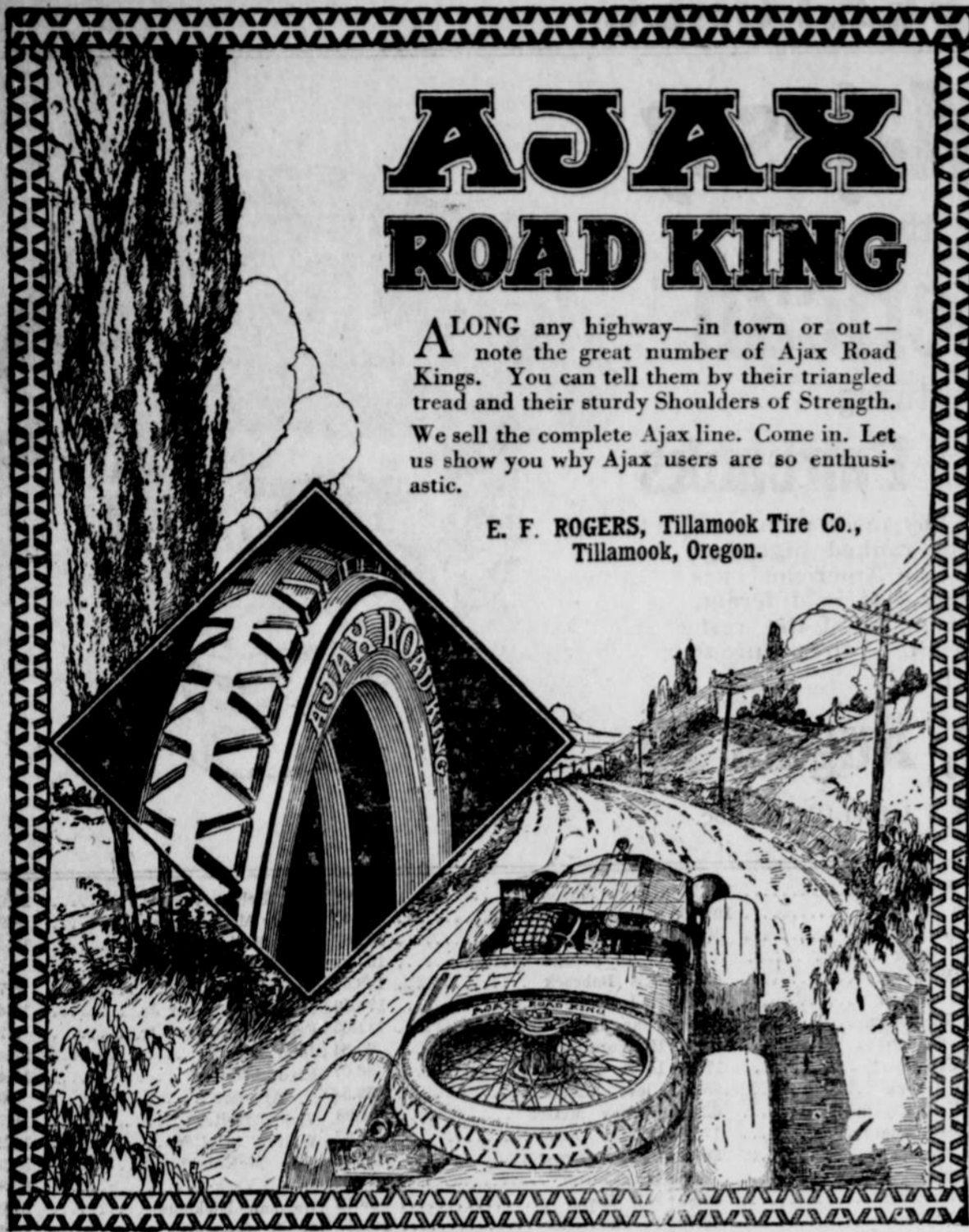

Raising the Lusitania.
To many the project of raising the Lusitania will be distasteful. The tragedy of her sinking was so poignant that to see her afloat again would recall too many sad memories. Nor has it been generally regarded as practicable to bring her to the surface from the depth of some 250 feet where she lies. Some hundreds of other ships sunk off the British coasts have been salvaged, but most of these lay in shallow water and were of smaller tonnage.
Nevertheless, a distinguished French engineer, M. Emile Bertin, believes an attempt to raise the Lusitania would have a good chance to succeed. His scheme is to construct a floating chamber 3000 yards long and 200 yards wide, to be attacked at low tide by means of some 800 steel cables, and so manipulated as to raise the hull from the sea bottom as the tide rises. It is not quite plain how all the details of this scheme could be carried out, and M. Bertin admits that success would depend upon the condition of the hull, and that if the ship were brought to the surface there would be great trouble in beaching her. The cost in any case would be enormous.
Perhaps all this will have to be dismissed as one of those ingenious problems with which men of science sometimes like to play. The work of 800 men at 250 feet under the surface is well nigh impossible, and all kinds of unexpected obstacles would probably be met if the work were undertaken. It may be doubted if the money for such a hazardous experiment could be raised.

Governor Cox announced at Washington that he didn't play golf on Sunday but there may be people who consider that a more innocent occupation than holding a Sabbath morning political conference with the titular head of his party.

At the close of the fiscal year on June 30 our gross national debt was nearly \$25,000,000,000. That is a colossal sum. Yet it is proportionately somewhat less than our debt was fifty-five years ago, at the close of the Civil War. At that time our debt was nearly two and three-quarter billions, or \$76.98 per capita; and our total national wealth was a little over twenty-three billions, or \$646 per capita. Now our debt is twenty-five billions, or \$238 per capita, and our wealth is \$267,000,000,000 or \$2,545 per capita. Therefore in 1865 our debt was 11.8 per cent of our wealth, and in 1920 it is only 9.3 per cent. Contrast this with conditions of France, whose debt is about fifty per cent of her wealth!

A. J. Morrissey, of Kansas City: "The unexpectedly large crop of wheat and corn that are promised—and with the former crop it is more than a promise for it is already being harvested—gives the West another opportunity to prepare for peace time liquidation. One of these days the price of products is going to come down, and when it does the man with land priced at \$500 an acre is going to be hard put to meet the payments on it. Backward crop conditions in the early part of the season gave the land boomers a scare. As a consequence they are more apt to rein up a little in the matter of speculation. This year's prosperity will largely be banked against future rainy days, instead of risked in wild-cat deals and promotions of uncertain return. The new wheat crop is not only larger than was anticipated, but it is of exceptionally good quality. The first crop brought into Kansas City graded No. 1 and brought \$2.90 a bushel, very little of it turning out to be lower grade than No. 2. It is now believed that the Kansas crop will turn out not less than 135,000,000 bushels."

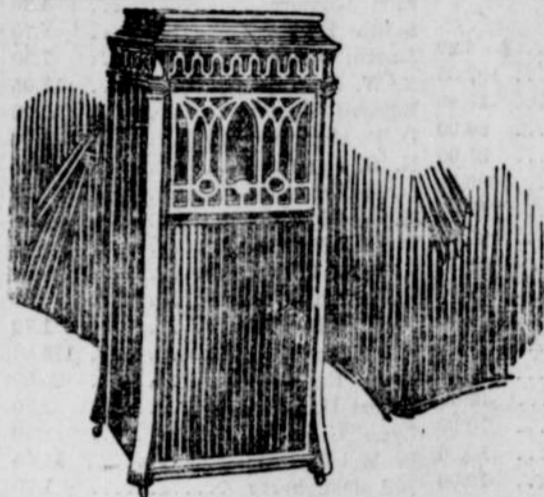
