### The International Issue Between the Two Parties.

The issue between the Democratic and Republican parties on international questions in this campaign may be summarized as follows, says the National Republican:

The Democratic party stands for the perpetuation of the Wilson policy of one-man control in international affairs. It endorses President Wilson's course in treating the problem of American relations with the rest of the world as a mere personal affair of his own; his exclusion of all but his own partisans from participation in formulating the terms of peace and the construction of a plan of world government; his demand that a so-called covenant for a league of nations sacrificial in its original form of American rights, interests, ideals and even independence be adopted as a work of omniscience or in-

spiration of making clearer the obligations of this nation to the rest of the world under it.

The Republican party believes that treaties of peace should be formulated in accordance with American constitutional provisions, and in harmony with American precedents and traditions. Republicans believe that President Wilson violated the Constitution he swore to uphold when he constituted himself the legislative representative of the American people in the formulation of a world government and blocked a treaty of peace, first until he could link the league covenant with it for the announced purpose of preventing action upon it in the United States on its own merits rather than as a "ridder" on the treaty of peace; and again until he could force it down the throat of an unwilling Senate and people. Still Republicans have demonstrated clearly enough that they

have stood ready to accept whatever of good may have come out of the Paris peace conference and to make many concessions on matters of detail. There was never a time from the date of his return to the United States early last summer until the adjournment of Congress a year later when President Wilson might not have brought about the acceptance of a league covenant with Americanizing reservations Europe would have been willing to accept. He refused to accept the opportunity because he was more concerned in creating an issue for the 1920 campaign than in bringing about the establishment of a league of nations that would be something more than a monument to himself.

### Second Annual Tillamook County Dairy Festival.

The second Annual Tillamook County Dairy Festival at L. A. McCormack's was a great success from the standpoint of both attendance and enthusiasm. Mr. McCormack had the milking stable tastefully decorated and two long tables spread the full length of the stable. Two hundred and fifty people sat down to lunch. There was enough to eat and more and as to the balance of the ration no one need to complain. No one noticed but what the Jersey men present consumed just as much feed as the Holstein men. It was estimated that Gus Peterson and Rollie Watson each consumed 2.5 lbs. protein and 16000 calories of energy which is enough to feed a 1000 lb. cow giving 40 lb. of 4 per cent milk in a day. If they dispute this we will give you an actual list of what they stored away.

Prof. E. B. Pitts was the principal speaker of the day and talked on the development of the Dairy cow. The points emphasized were Better Sires and Applied Record Keeping. Mr. McCormack's herd, as well as many others that are in the Testing Association are good examples of results to be obtained by the methods Prof. Pitts outlined. If you own a string of racing mares you don't breed them to a scrub cart horse for speed. No more should you breed your dairy cows to a scrub bull. The merchant keeps tabs on each line of goods he is handling and sees that they all are making a profit. The Dairyman should apply these same business principles to each of his cows which represent his line of goods.

A summary of the work of the Tillamook Cow Testing Association in the past 8 years was given by County Agent Jones. It has enabled its members to raise the average annual production of their cows by over 100 lbs. of butter fat. At 70c. per pound of butter fat. At 70c. per pound for fat this is \$70.00 increase per cow for an investment of a measly \$1.50 in Association fees. What other investment can you make that will pay as well?

D. A. Wilbur gave the records of Mr. McCormack's two cows, Penny and Pal. Penny made 115 lbs. butterfat in June and Pal 105 lbs. in August. After this Len was called on to sing Dear Old Pal of Mine. He developed a sudden bashfulness and loss of voice so we had to excuse him.

After the program a tour of inspection was made to view the herd. Penny isn't the kind of a cow that just happens. Her sire is Lavina's Lad, the old herd bull, which Mr. McCormack still has. When we look back of him we find St. Mawes and Rosalie's Olga Lad and many individuals with large records that breed on for generations. It shows what a good sire will do for a herd. When asked what he would take for her Len shook his head and refused to name a price. He believes in the old axiom "Save your Pennies and the Dollars will take care of themselves." If the dairymen of this county had more of this kind of Pennies they would have no worry about the dollars.

The Festival, next year, should be held in the Nehalem Valley and every dairymen in the county should lay his plans to attend. Nothing but good can come of such meetings.

### Fire Wipes Out Pacific Cleaning and Tailoring Co.

The cleaning and pressing parlor of E. L. Stewart and Charles Wyner, across from Lamar's Drug store, was demolished by fire early Tuesday morning. As the wind was blowing from the north, the office on that side of it, belonging to George Kiger, was practically unharmed except being scorched a little, but the one on the south side, that of Dr. E. L. Glaisyer, County Veterinarian, was burned considerably, especially the roof. Mrs. Hubbard's Surgical Hospital, which is in the upper story of the building adjoining the office of Dr. Glaisyer, had the north side burned somewhat. Five patients were in the hospital at the time, but all were removed by the time the fire was under headway. The patients were Charles E. Fugua, of Barview; Peter Schrantz, of Tillamook; Mrs. Augusta E. Williams, of Pacific City; Mrs. Tuelie Churchill, of Cloverdale and W. L. Hubbard, of Tillamook. All are doing well, none having suffered from the shock.

The fire started about one thirty in the morning, and the cause is unknown, as Stewart says that he kept no gasoline in the shop at all, according to the state law, and that the red light over the iron was also burning. The only cause he can give is either short circuit in the electric wires or spontaneous combustion, as there were a few clothes that had been in ammonia and benzine. The fire department was called out, and the people realize that if it hadn't been for the splendid work of the fire engine the whole business section of the town would have been in jeopardy, for the buildings in that section are all frame structures. As it was, the fire was put out in a very short time after the arrival of the engine.

The building in which the cleaning and pressing parlor was located belonged to the Thayer estate, and it is not known whether the buildings will be rebuilt or not. Stewart had about eighteen suits in the shop that were being cleaned, but they are not to be responsible for them. They had the equipment insured, and are going to start business in another location as soon as possible, with a steam press as an improvement over the former equipment.
