ASTORIANS VISIT TILLAMOOK

Last week a delegation from the Astoria Chamber of Commerce, with the Clatsop county court, visited Tillamook county. The object of the visit, was to look over the road from Astoria to the county line with the purpose of having it improved and eventually hard surfaced, for Astorians were greatly interested in the matter of tourist travel when this matter was discussed at the annual convention of the Oregon Editorial Association in Astoria. The party spent the first night at Neah-Kak-Nie Inn, being greatly surprised at this splendid seaside resort. Friday morning they came to this city and were taken out to see the dairy farms and cheese factories. When they returned to the city a lunch was served at the Lourve at which a number of business men attended. Fred C. Baker, president of the Chamber of Commerce gave the visitors a hearty welcome, and in doing so said he thought there should be more co-operation between the two counties in road work. Mr. Sanborn, president of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce was the principal speaker for the visitors. He spoke of the pleasure the business men of Astoria derived from a previous visit to this city, and they came here on this occasion to see if a closer spirit of co-operation in road work and other matters could be obtained. He drew attention to the great benefit that both counties would derive from the tourist travel if a good road was built between Astoria and Tillamook. Other interesting talks were made by the visitors and some of our business men. The party left the city at 3 o'clock on their return trip.
