The Jersey Breeders and The County Fair

The weather outlook was very discouraging for the Tillamook county Fair the opening day of which was Sept. 14th, continuing until the 18th. It began raining on the Thursday prior to the opening day and continued until it looked as though the Fair would have to be postponed, and on Monday it still rained, but through it all the stock men began to arrive with their cattle with a will and determination to have a Fair and to make a success of it. On Tuesday morning, the opening day, the weather suddenly ceased and the weather turned off clear and warm, all that could be desired, and while the ground was wet and sodden, it was only unpleasant for the first day.

Seven years ago, when Tillamook county held its first Fair, there were nineteen head of cattle shown, among them one pure bred bull. It is said that there were but three herds of cattle in the county at that time that carried registered blood. To-day there are about one hundred and fifty pure bred herds in the county, eighty of which are Jersey herds. This change for the better has come about as rapidly as is possible for such a change to come. The evidence of a remarkable growth was shown this year at our Fair. One would have to go a long way to find another dairy show as large and fine as this. There were one hundred and three pure bred Jerseys shown, more than were shown at either the State Fair at Salem, or the great Pacific International Live Stock Exposition at Portland, last year. Mr. C. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Live Stock Exposition, who was a visitor at the Fair said "There is a question in my mind whether the International at Portland, or the State Fair at Salem, can either one surpass or even equal Tillamook county, in quality or quantity."

The blood of the great bulls Gamboige Knight, St. Mawes and Golden's Chief flows richly in a great many herds of this county, and other royal strains have not been neglected. The Jersey owners were awarded 74 premiums in all, among them being 21 firsts, 4 champions, and 2 grand champions. To enumerate the names of all winners would take up too much space in your valuable paper, suffice it to say that not a breeder present failed to carry away one or more of the four colors. F. Blackadar sold a valuable bull calf during the week of the fair. This calf was sired by the Grand champion bull, Clarissa's Dulcet King.

Perhaps the most remarkable feature for the whole fair was the wonderful appearance of the Tillamook County Calf Club, one of the largest calf clubs in the United States. This club consists of 47 members, all of whom are enthusiastic boosters of the Jersey breed. There were 21 calves entered in competition by this Club. Professor Fitz, of the Oregon Agricultural college said it was the hardest task of judging he had ever been called upon to undertake. There were so many excellent calves, and so much uniformity among them, he invited anyone of the spectators to come into the ring and help judge them. After thorough examination and much shifting, from first to last, he placed Odalla Miller first with her beautiful heifer calf, which is as yet unnamed. The calf was given to Odalla by a friend of the family, and a fellow-breeder, Gus Peterson. Erdin Glad won second and Schuyler Fletcher, third. They both have beautiful heifer calves of the Gamboige Knight stock, which were bred by Morrison Mills, of Fairview. In the industrial work of the calf club Schuyler Fletcher won first prize, thereby winning the heifer calf given by Mr. and Mrs. Murice Bays.

There were many booths all beautifully decorated. Among them was one demonstrating Fisher's Flour. F. Blackadar, a Jersey booster, donated the milk and cream of this booth, and coffee, rich with delicious Jersey cream was served to the farmers. Of all the booths the Jersey booth was the most beautiful decorated, and was easily the most popular. Jersey milk and Tillamook cheese was served free of charge to all who wished to partake, and "repeaters" were operating at the counter continually. The milk was donated to this booth by Jos. Donaldson, president of the Tillamook Jersey Cattle Club, and by other Jersey breeders. The booth was decorated and operated by the committee, Mrs. Joe Donaldson, F. Blackadar, Paul Fitzpatrick and Mrs. Rose Crawford.

There were a number of prominent visitors in attendance, among them Senator McArthur, who praised the breeders highly on the number and breeding of the stock shown, and advised breeders to continue their good work. Senator McArthur is himself a breeder of Jersey stock. O. M. Plummer of Portland, was busy among the breeders, urging them to keep their stock in trim for exhibition at the great stock show in Portland. H. H. Bushnell, editor of the Oregon Farmer was also with us, busy with pencil and camera, and we are looking forward for a report and for pictures of our Fair. Professors Fitz, Westgrover, and Brandt were here also from the O. A. C. and were kept busy for two days judging cattle.

At 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon came the grand parade, of cattle and all in line, Jerseys, Guernseys and Holsteins were paraded before an enthusiastic and admiring audience and returned to the barns to be prepared for departure and "With a moo, the cows went marching home."

On Tuesday during the week following the fair, the Jersey Cattle club met at the home of Erick Glad and among other proceedings a vote of thanks was given to Mr. Riechers of the First National bank, of Tillamook, by the Jersey Cattle Club, also recorded its thanks to the Fair board for the manner in which the Fair was conducted, and for doing all that could be done to please each and every patron of the Fair.
