the area of Ohio and Kentucky, awakened a storm of opinion at the conference of his denomination at Sidney, Ohio, September 1, when, in declaring that President Wilson should have accepted the reservation to the peace treaty adopted by the United States Senate, he said: "I submit to you, in the interest of Christian civilization and by virtue of the fact that the destiny of millions of men, women and children depended on the action of that hour, that is what ought to have happened. That is what would have happened if the President had really cared more about the league of nations than he cared about having his own particular way in the matter, because his natural and highly cultivated opinion stood in the way of that piece of world constructive statesmanship."

Albert W. Fox, writing in the Washington Post, indicates that Governor Cox has "killed the goose," so to speak. Mr. Fox says: "The greatest impediment to the flow of Democratic funds has apparently been Governor Cox's 'whish fund' charge against the Republicans. Democratic headquarters in New York sent us 2,100 telegrams to wealthy Democrats throughout the country just before the governor launched his sensational charge. It was expected that hundreds of the governor's supporters would contribute \$5.00 or \$10.00 each. It virtually frightened the wealthy Democratic contributors into withholding any and all contemplated contributions. Instead of checks, Democratic headquarters received countless letters explaining that the writer had intended to contribute but did not want his name to appear in the newspapers in connection with the Senate's 'whish fund' investigation."

The last few elections they have been as indifferent and as dead as a door nail, leaving the map shot man to do the political scrapping. And they don't appear to have the energy and snap to even raise some small money to help bear the party that kept them out of war and spent the taxpayers' money like a lot of drunken democrats--no, we mean sailors. As competition and opposition is the life of business, as well as politics, maybe it wouldn't be a bad idea to have a local democratic ticket in the field another year to make an election more interesting. But we don't approve of those who have been honored with nominations setting back in their offices and depend on the other fellow to do the work, as well as receive the hard knocks.

The Portland Spectator says: Political conditions in Oregon and California are somewhat similar. Here the registration records show twice as many Republicans as Democrats, and we have a Democratic man, Gen. E. Chamberlain, representing us in the United States Senate. In California there are nearly three Republicans to one Democrat, and James D. Phelan, a democrat, is senator. The reason for this anomaly is that all who glitter as Republicans in the registration records are not put in the voting booth. A great many persons consider it more respectable to be registered as Republicans than as Democrats. Having gained whatever reputation for respectability there is attached to their open registration as Republicans, these persons go to the ballot box and faithfully cast their votes for Democrats. Whether or not it is quite honest this is a respectable thing through crowded affiliation with the Republican party, and then surreptitiously an vote against its principles and candidates in a position for the political chameleon to determine."

With a republican president and a republican congress there is every prospect that lumber and dairy products will obtain more protection, for kind manufacturers, lumber and Chinese eggs should not be allowed to compete with the lumber manufacturer and the dairy products of Tillamook county. Those who want more Chinese eggs and Canadian lumber to come into the country should vote the democratic ticket, and those who want to protect the principal industries of this country will vote for Senator Harding, for President, R. N. Standfield, for U. S. Senator and W. S. Hawley for congressman. Anyway, we do not think that a person who owns property or is in business here uses good horse sense in being to and vote for the democratic party. Besides, us, we reach the one man party dominated by an aristocrat who kept us out of war.

Senator Harding, in asking those who vote for him to vote of R. N. Standfield for United States Senator is giving good advice to the Republicans of Oregon. All must admit that when Senator Harding becomes president next March he will have a herculean job on his hands, for never before in the history of the United States were there so many serious problems to straighten out. The unbusiness system of the Wilson administration and with the whole country demagogued with socialism, the next republican administration is confronted with a condition that never should have been allowed to enter in a country like the United States. Therefore, it is highly important that Mr. Harding should have a republican senator from Oregon to help him, in the great undertaking that confronts the next republican administration. The next congress should be in session with Mr. Harding, but should the United States Senate be dominated by democrats largely from the Southern States, it will be a serious handicap to the republican party in getting the country back to normal conditions.

So False Alarm Jimmy Cox put a sudden stop to money being subscribed for the democratic campaign. One may not believe it but it is a fact nevertheless, and that accounts for the report that the campaign managers will be deep in the hole when the campaign is over. It came about like this. False Alarm Jimmy Cox was organizing the republican managers of raising millions of dollars to buy the presidency. At breakfast time False Alarm Jimmy said it was \$3,000,000, at lunch time it was \$15,000,000, and by dinner time Jimmy Cox had multiplied it to \$10,000,000. Jimmy Cox next morning subcontracted about half the amount, but by evening had it back where he had figured it the previous evening. The senate investigation committee found that False Alarm Jimmy was talking through his hat and for political effect. Some of the big subscribers to the democratic campaign fund got cold feet and refused to "go up" for fear their names would be investigated. So Jimmy Cox's false alarm about republican check money has put the democratic campaign managers in a quandary and brought about a frost at headquarters.

The appointment of T. B. Handley to the office of Attorney-General is a great honor conferred on one of our favored sons. It came as a surprise to Tillamook people when a telegram was received by Attorney S. E. Johnson telling the good news, and the people generally appeared to be well pleased. Mr. Handley made good when he represented Tillamook and Yamhill counties in the lower house, and when he became state senator for Washington, Lincoln, Tillamook and Yamhill counties. It was these offices that brought him to public notice, having filled them with credit to himself and the counties he represented. Mr. Handley, however, has declined the appointment because the reason that he did not have the time and means to run a state wide campaign and where his name would have to be written on the ballot, with, possibly, candidates from large cities. To our way of thinking he is a good decision in turning the appointment down, for a great many questions are being asked why the resignation could not have taken place as to allow persons names to appear on the ballot.

If other parts of Oregon vote in November the same as those who voted in the straw vote in this city, Harding will carry the state, by a vote of 3 to 1 and R. N. Standfield will beat Senator Chamberlain, 2 to 1. As the democratic party is divided, with two democrats, Senator Chamberlain and Thomas A. Bayne running for United States Senator, our George is badly handicapped, with the republican party united. Why so many democrats are now opposed to Senator Chamberlain is because they claim he deserted the democratic administration when his help was needed, having first voted for Wilson's league covenant and then voted for the Lodge reservation. When Senator Chamberlain was re-elected in 1914, there were two republicans in the caucus, R. A. Boren, the regular republican nominee, and William Hovler, progressive republican. Boren polled \$8,297 and Hovler \$8,228, or a total of \$16,525. Senator Chamberlain polled \$1,761, which gave a republican plurality of 1,747. With conditions reversed this year, with two democratic candidates for U. S. Senator, with a large number of influential democrats after the scalp of our George, he is doomed to defeat. And for the further reason that republicans see the wisdom of voting for both Senator Harding, for president, and R. N. Standfield for U. S. Senator.

It is safe to predict that when the republican party is returned to power, one of the first things that it will undertake will be to grapple with the anarchistic element. And it is going to take radical measures to bring about better conditions. To our way of thinking, a vigorous campaign should be started to round up the foreign anarchists who have come to the United States to preach their false doctrines in a free country, and after they have been rounded up to immediately send them back to their own countries, never to return. We ask anyone to take a retrospective view of the present democratic administration and it must be admitted that anarchism increased more in the last seven years than in any other period of the United States. We want to say that a serious state of affairs exists throughout the country when men will stoop so low in loyalty to the United States that they will vote for a Federal officer like Debs for president of United States. Our good friend, Bro. Wann, of the Reporter, say Wheeler leads and Tillamook follows. Wrong again Bro. The dairymen and lumber interests of this county, neither in Tillamook city, following the proceeding of the free trade, democratic editor, as he will see when the votes are counted next month.

The Tillamook High school pupils who voted for Wilson's League of Nations overlooked the fact that the U. S. senate ratified the covenant, they will be at dark age in a few years and liable to be called upon to fight the battles of two pugacious European nations. Well, that's what they voted for, for article 16 of the league of nations bind the United States to take a hand in European broils.

It was a little surprising in the straw vote taken in the business district of this city to find that quite a number of persons voted against the Wilson league covenant, and voted for Governor Cox, who is in favor of the Wilson League. It is pretty generally conceded that President Harding will be the next president. The next few years it will be necessary to obtain government assistance for the improvement of Tillamook and Nehalem bays and harbors. The men who are best able to obtain government aid are those who are politically connected with the administration. While the standard, the republican nominee for U. S. Senator, is elected he will be in a position to demand improvements for the coast counties whereas, if a democratic Senator is elected he will have little or no pull with the administration. Anyone can see the logic of our contention, viz. that it is for the best interests of Tillamook county that Robert N. Standfield be elected U. S. Senator.

Who said it rained 11 months in a year in Tillamook? It looks as though the Willamette valley is getting the same reputation. There is this difference, however, while the rain in the Willamette Valley brought considerable fruit, with a 10 per cent loss to the growers, over in this neck of the woods Old Bower is getting such an enormous lot of green grass that it is growing faster than the dairy herds can eat it. So it does not hurt our feelings one bit by saying that it rains 11 months in the year in Tillamook as rain has as much to do with the success of the cheese industry in this country as any other factor. In fact, it is the one great factor, for without it dairymen in this county would not amount to a whole. The map shot man only express the sentiment of every dairyman in the county when we say, "Let 'er Rain!"
