The Market Commission Bill

At the last meeting of the Tillamook County Creamery Association the Directors adopted resolutions asking the voters of Oregon to vote No on the Market Commission Bill. This bill would put the marketing of Tillamook cheese under the control of a Market Director not residing in Tillamook, possibly in Portland or Salem. The farmers know from experience and to their sorrow that the best control is control by themselves. Since they have had control of their own marketing there have been no losses, previously to that they lost lots of money. The matter of marketing a commodity is a difficult proposition and in no way should be controlled by the state. The bill provides for an appropriation of \$50,000.00, the salary of a Director at \$4,500.00 per year, a secretary at \$3,000.00 per year, and attorney fees without limit. Practically everything would be spent for attorney fees if the Director saw fit.

All existing marketing associations or corporations are put under State control, yet the promoters claim they are fighting the Non-partisan League. Their intentions are the same, absolute state control of private business. This is just a starter. No parlor theorist can operate a marketing association. The marketing of a commodity is something that takes a lot of training to do, and think of one man controlling the marketing of Tillamook cheese, all dairy and milk products, Hood River apples, Bend potatoes, Clackamas eggs, Marion county berries, and the endless things marketed in Oregon. Truly it would take a Moses to lead Oregon in this regard, and no Moses is in sight. Plausible arguments are put out on co-operation, but successful co-operation is cold blooded business, not philanthropy. No parlor philanthropy can market anything.

Voters of Oregon should run this bill down and give the Legislature a chance to look into this matter in January, so that all interests can be heard. This bill is the work of theorists in Portland, California co-operatives were going for years before their marketing law was even dreamed of. Their first marketing Director had a good press agent and gained lots of advertising, no one has heard of his successor.

CONGRESS PLANS PERMANENT BODY

Portland, Or.—Steps toward formation of a permanent organization were taken at the session of the Northwest Rivers and Harbors congress which convened here Monday.

Charles Hall, president of the Oregon State chamber of commerce, which called the conference, was elected chairman. In his address he urged a lasting organization to carry on the work of encouraging river and harbor development in the Northwest and forwarding marketing of Northwest products.

More than 100 delegates from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Northern California points, were welcomed to Portland by Mayor George L. Baker. Responses to the address of welcome were made on behalf of Washington by Mayor W. H. Clay of Everett and on behalf of Oregon by Earl Kilpatrick of the University of Oregon.

U. S. Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon and United States Senator Wesley L. Jones of Washington were among the prominent speakers who addressed the conference.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Real estate in New York city will have an assessed valuation of \$9,608,017,467 for 1921.

The population of North Dakota is 645,730, an increase of 68,674, or 11.9 per cent.

South Dakota has a population of 635,839, an increase of 51,551, or 8.9 per cent.

Wisconsin's population is 2,631,839, an increase of 297,979, or 12.8 per cent.

Franklin K. Lane, former secretary of the interior, has been forced to give up business temporarily because of ill health.

Reports made public in New York by employment agencies of both the Salvation Army and Knights of Columbus indicate that jobs soon will be scarce in cities.

Appointment of George M. Hermiton, Toronto, Ont., as general commander of the Patriarchs militant, the uniform rank of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, has been announced.

Mississippi is the second state to show a decrease in population in the 1920 census. Its population of 1,789,182, announced by the census bureau, is 7932 or 4 per cent less than that of ten years ago.

Death Summons Murray Crane. Dalton, Mass.—W. Murray Crane, former United States senator and for years a power in the Republican party, died here in the family home. The end came quietly, after four days of heavy sleep, almost of unconsciousness. The sleeping sickness had set in after an illness of several months, and it was this which immediately preceded death, the actual cause of which was said by his physician to be inflammation of the brain.

\$5,000,000 Offered American Legion. Chicago.—The board of directors of the Knights of Columbus has voted to offer the American Legion \$5,000,000. This is the balance of the \$40,000,000 collected by the organization for war purposes, to erect a memorial building in Washington.

Coming Championship Not "Fixed." New York.—District Attorney Lewis of Kings county issued a statement in which he declared investigation by his office had failed to disclose any plan to "fix" the 1920 world series.

Cleveland Wins American Pennant. New York.—Cleveland won the American league pennant and earned the right to oppose the Brooklyn Nationals in the world series.

DEFENSE CHARGES TORTURE IN JAIL

Pendleton.—Charges that ammonia was applied to the mouths and noses of at least three of the five prisoners recaptured following the jailbreak and the slaying of Sheriff Taylor and that other cruel means were adopted to force confessions from the men were made during the argument of the trial made by the defense in the trial of John Rathle and Elvi D. Kerby to throw out the testimony of Robin W. Fletcher, member of the grand jury, who was called to repeat the voluntary statements of the prisoners to that body.

The motion of the defense was overruled by the court on the ground that the statements made by the defendants before the grand jury were made ten days after the alleged third-degree application in the jail, and that the defendants were not under the influence of fear when appearing before the grand jury.

FRANCE HONORS PERSHING

Washington.—In the name of the American army that fought in France," General Pershing accepted the award of the medaille militaire, the highest military decoration within the gift of the French government.

The presentation was made at Fort Myers by the French General Marie Fayolle, who commanded the first American troops on the western front. "It gives me the deepest pleasure," General Fayolle declared, in presenting the medal, "to confer upon you as the commander-in-chief of the valiant American soldiers who fought in France, the highest decoration of my government."

Seattle Fire Chief Ousted. Seattle, Wash.—Frank L. Stetson, chief of the Seattle fire department for the past nine years, was removed from office by Hugo M. Caldwell, mayor, and George L. Mantor, a battalion fire chief, was appointed in his stead. Mayor Caldwell declined to discuss his action. Chief Stetson was chief of the fire department at Minneapolis for 30 years before coming to Seattle.
