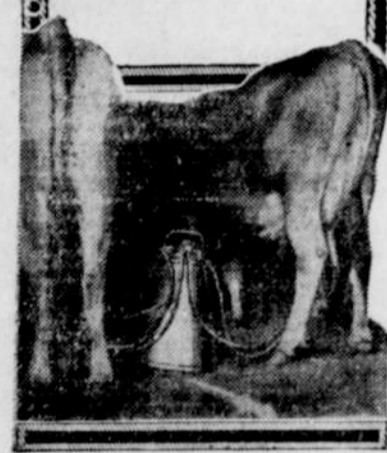

Tilly Aleatra, the Real Champion Butter Cow.

The New York daily press has had an item, copied into many journals in various parts of the country, which states that the Jersey cow, Sophie 19th of Hood Farm, "has come back at the age of 15 years, 6 months, with a record that makes her the champion butter cow of the world." The item goes on to say that "in nine years she has produced 100,918.1 pounds of milk and 6,355.06 pounds of butter, and average of 12,324.2 pounds of milk and 706.23 pounds of butterfat year."

The following tables will show the milk and fat; and we think that no fair minded person will fail to see that Tilly Aleatra, the Holstein cow, has practically twice the amount of milk and 380 pounds more fat in that period, as well as an average of 54.42 pounds more fat for the year. This, be it noted is for an equal number of years for both cows.

Again, out of the seven records given above, the Jersey has only one year with a higher record, and the next year slumped down to 300 pounds less while the Holstein gave 224 pounds more in her next period. Also, in the last of the seven periods Tilly Aleatra gave in 365 days within 100 pounds of fat of Sophie's fat for the entire year.

In the information given to the public, in which the yield of Sophie 19th is matched up with that of Tilly Aleatra and the claim made that the Jersey has far outdistanced the Holstein, no mention whatever is made of the fact that the Jersey has made nine records to the seven made by the Holstein; nor of the further fact that two Holstein cows' records were for less than a year. So we take leave to correct the statements made without foundation of fact, and maintain that the champion milk and butter cow of the World is the Holstein-Friesian Tilly Aleatra.

Mrs. J. McGhee Heard From.

National, City, Cal. I hear that you Tillamookers are having lots of rain while out here in National City we are having sunshine. I will tell you about a little mix up we had on our way to the grape fair at Escandoo. The town is 75 miles from San Diego. We hired a jitney to take us to the fair. There were five of us in a Ford coupe, Mrs. West and myself, two old war veterans and the driver. We were not out of San Diego when we were run into by a big truck and forced our car onto the curb and against a telephone pole. It happened so quick, if it hadn't been for the kind of car and the telephone pole some of us probably would have been killed. The car was almost on its side, but we managed to get out. The car and running board were badly jammed up. Mr. West and his little daughter were in another car behind us. They all got out and I tell you what there was some loud talking between Mr. West, our chauffeur, and the truck driver. The running gear was not damaged, so they started the car and we went on our way, but every car that passed I thought they were going to run into our car. Well, I forgot all about our mix up when we arrived at Escondoo. We went into a rest room and shook the dust off, then watched the parade on the streets. What attracted my attention was in one of the floats where a woman was milking a big pure bred Jersey cow. They gave away twenty tons of grapes and some of the bunches were eighteen inches long and weighed six pounds or more. At the San Diego fair, at Balboa Park, everything was nice. The cattle were mostly all pure bred Jerseys, and talk about nogs I never saw such large ones, and were mostly all dark red. And then my attention was called to a squash that weighed ninety pounds and a water melon that weighed sixty pounds. Yesterday Mr. West and I went to see a dairy ranch called the Pollyanna. They milk fifty cows, all pure bred Jerseys and are larger than they are in Tillamook.

I had the pleasure of helping Mr. West pick lemons last week. The oranges were nearly all picked when I got here, but they left enough on the trees so that I could pick an orange when ever I want one. I went to George and Abe Cohen's cannery. Abe was up town, but I had a nice visit with Gorge. He took us all through the cannery. It was a sight, and what pleased me, the other day I went in a large grocery store and I saw a big Tillamook cheese on the counter and I was glad to see that they are selling so much of the Tillamook brand here. The price of cheese here is forty five cents per pound, and they all say that they won't buy any other kind of cheese if they can get the Tillamook cheese.

There was a party of four of us got passports to go into Mexico, to a town called Tia Juana. It is a great gambling resort for both men and women.

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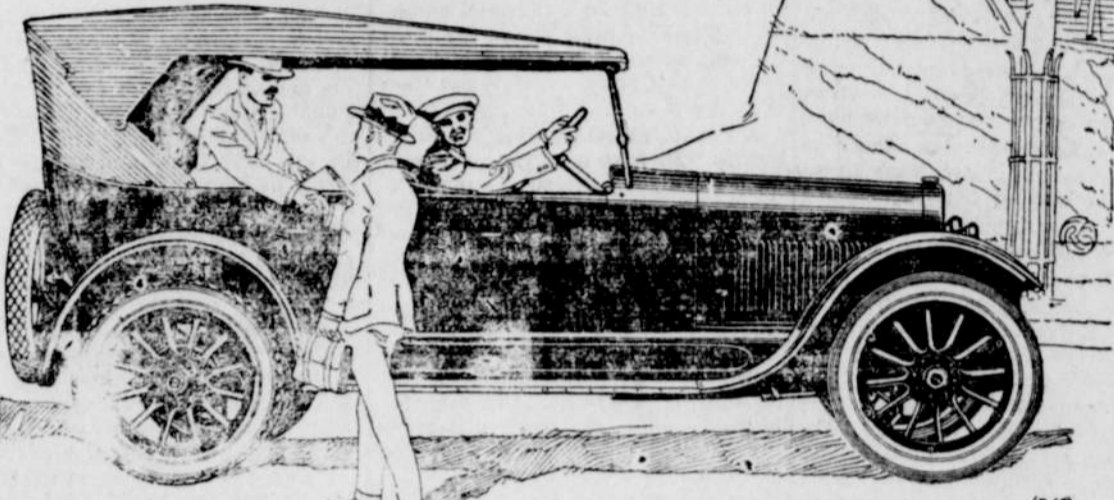
