Ordinance No. 395

An Ordinance to Establish Fire Limits in Tillamook City, to regulate building therein and in other parts of the City, and Declaring an Emergency.

THE PEOPLE OF TILLAMOOK CITY DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS

SECTION I: All that portion of Tillamook City, Oregon, lying within the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of Stillwell Avenue with Fourth Street, and running thence North along the center of Stillwell Avenue to the center of Second Street; thence West to the center of First Avenue West; thence North to the center of the Southern Pacific railroad track; thence Easterly along the center line of the Southern Pacific Railroad track to a point in the center of Fourth Avenue East, etc.

SECTION II

Any person, firm or corporation desiring to raise, lower, alter or repair any wooden building or structure within the fire limits of Tillamook City, or to construct a wooden residence or private garage within such limits as by this ordinance allowed, shall, before commencing to do any such work, file with the common council an application for permission therefor, and such application shall designate the location of such building or structure, and the extent to which it is to be raised or lowered, or the extent and character of the alteration or repair desired to be made, and in case of the construction of a new wooden building, the location proposed, and a statement showing the other buildings adjacent thereto within the distance herein specified for such wooden buildings.

ing as hereby permitted, to be of the character and in accord with the provisions of this ordinance in regard thereto, permission shall be granted. Provided, however, that no such permission shall be given in any case where the building or structure in question is supported by an unsubstantial foundation, or when its roof, frame or walls have become impaired or decayed from long use neglect or otherwise, to the extent of forty per cent of the cost of erection or construction of a new building or structure of identical character.

SECTION III: No building, except a residence or private garage, shall hereafter be erected within, or moved into the fire limits described in Section I, of this Ordinance, unless the same shall have their outside and party walls made of brick, stone or other incombustible materials, and such outside or party walls shall extend from the foundation to the top of, and through the roof of such buildings, and 2 feet above the same, and the roof shall be covered with tin or some other incombustible material, and the walls thereof shall be so constructed as to separate all woodwork of such buildings from the adjoining buildings.

SECTION IV: It shall be unlawful to erect or place any wooden building or structure within the fire limits of Tillamook City, except a residence or private garage erected in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance, or to lower, alter or repair any such buildings now within such fire limits, without obtaining permission for so doing in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance.

SECTION V: A wooden building within the meaning of this Ordinance is a building or structure the exterior walls of which, or any portion thereof, are constructed of wood. Wooden frames covered with metal shall be deemed to be wood en buildings.

SECTION VI: No wooden building within the fire limits of Tillamook City shall be removed to a different place therein, except to a portion of the same lot on which it may have stood, to make room for more permanent improvements, and not then if it shall increase the fire risk of any other building within said fire limits.

SECTION VII: Every chimney or flue that may hereafter be built within Tillamook City shall have walls of a good quality of brick, placed four inches in thickness, the bottom to be six inches thick of the same material, to be laid in good lime mortar, plastered on the inside, and when passing through or near wood work, plastered on the outside. They shall be well secured and extended at least two and one-half feet above the roof, and at least two feet below the ceiling of the room, wherein fire is to be made.

SECTION VIII: It shall be unlawful to erect or place any wooden building to be used as a residence or private garage within the fire limits of Tillamook City, unless the same be detached at least 10 feet from any other wooden building or structure therein.

SECTION IX: No shavings, hay, straw or other combustible matter shall be allowed to remain exposed in or adjacent to any building, except carpenter shops, stables and manufacturing establishments, and from such places such material shall be removed at least once a week by the person in charge of such place.

SECTION X: The fire chief of Tillamook City, the city marshal and the committee on Health and Police of the common council, shall at any and all times have the right of ingress and egress to and from any buildings within the limits of Tillamook City, and to enter and examine any building therein to discover if the flues, chimneys and connections heretofore built, or hereafter built, are sufficiently sound and secure, or whether built or constructed in compliance with this Ordinance, or whether or not properly repaired, and if any such flue or chimney, or its connections shall be unsafe, it shall be the duty of such officer to notify the owner or occupant of the premises of that fact, whereupon it shall be the duty of such owner or occupant to cause using the same until it is placed in proper repair and shall be made safe, and it shall be unlawful for any person to use any flue, chimney or connection thereof in any building or structure within the limits of Tillamook City when the same shall be in an unsafe condition.

SECTION XI: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 and in default of the payment of any such fine shall be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine shall be discharged, but not to exceed one day for each \$20.00 of such fine.
