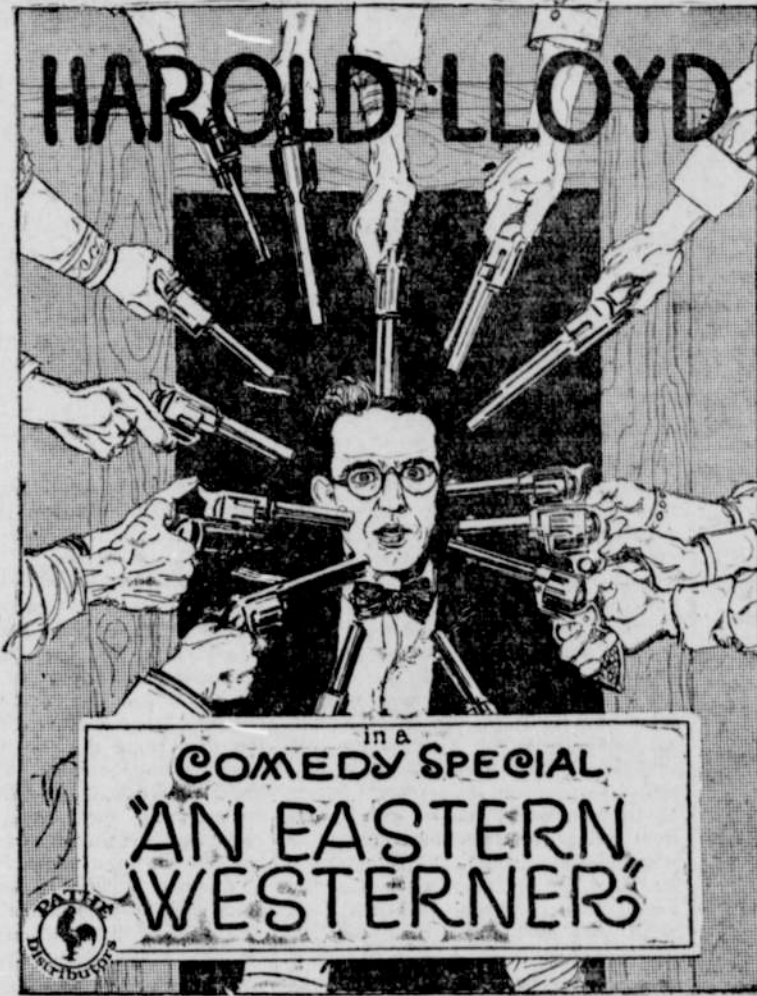

SOMETHING IN YOUR EYE?

There are a few simple rules for the removing of irritating particles.

Though many people have become expert in the art of removing irritating particles from the eyes of others, a few words on this subject will not be out of place. In removing a foreign particle from the eye, ask the patient to look down, and then take hold of the eyelash with thumb and forefinger of the left hand and pull the eyelid downward and slightly away from the eyeball. Next evert, or turn back, the eyelid by placing midway between the eyelashes and eyeball the tip of the thumb of the right hand and make the same movement that would be required to turn back the edge of a coat sleeve.

If the particle is located on the interior of the upper lid it may be removed with a clean handkerchief or a piece of clean cotton placed on the end of a toothpick or match. If the irritating substance is not on the upper lid try to find it in the same manner on the lower lid and remove it in the same way. When the particle is imbedded in the cornea, or covering of the eyeball, it is best to consult a physician or eye specialist. For removing the particle from the eye it is advisable to irrigate the delicate member with boric acid.

Under no circumstances should anyone touch the eye with a handkerchief or other agent that has been moistened with saliva or with the tip of the tongue.

In treating the eyes with some kind of liquid medicine one should take care never to insert the dropper after the solution has been drawn into the rubber and downward and the fluid permitted to run into the rubber and then back into the glass as the solution will very likely contain particles of powder that have washed off the rubber bulb, and these may irritate the eyes. Always hold up the rubber end of the dropper. The fluid should never be dropped directly on the eyeball unless the physician has so advised. The proper practice is to draw down the lower lid and place the drops on the exposed inner surface of the lid. One or two drops are always sufficient and it is only waste to use more.

Ideal telephone service means the prompt connection of any one of these with any other and the least possible loss in strength and distinctness in the conversations that follow.

Our entire plant is engineered and constructed with the object of rendering a satisfactory "state-wide" service sufficient in facilities available with these facilities efficiently maintained. For this purpose the telephone equipment must be better, local and trunk wires must be of proper size and type, and central offices and switchboards must have additional apparatus to accommodate and care for the long distance circuits.

Before the troubled period of the war we always aimed to maintain "spare" or reserve plant—that is, plant ahead of immediate needs, thus ensuring prompt and more satisfactory compliance with demands for service as they arose. During the war this reserve was exhausted as the materials we use were required and properly taken by the Government and those industries given priority consideration.

With the reconstruction period, as in the case with all other lines of business, our problems have continued to an unexpected degree. We are still hampered by shortage of materials and delayed deliveries.
