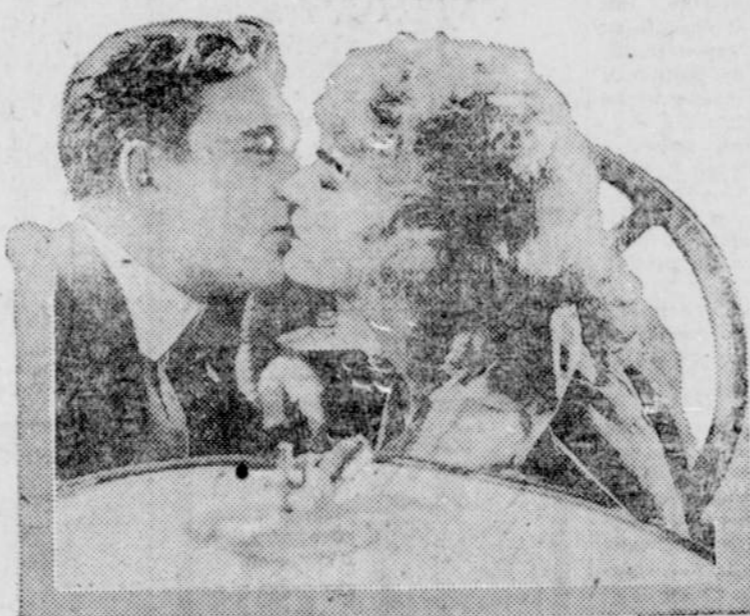

### Church News and Announcements

Extract of sermon delivered by Rev. Harry E. Tucker, at the Christian church Nov. 21, 1920.

"The manna ceased on the morrow, after they had eaten of the old corn of the land."

It was notable event in the history of the Jewish people, when they came to the change from the old order of things to the new order in the giving of the manna. It must have been witnessed with great surprise; no longer could they gather from the cultivated field, for they were journeying inland and the wilderness offered nothing but starvation. If we pause here and look forward over the eminence of the centuries, we may see our own wilderness journey

how day by day we are receiving the things that we cannot obtain only as a free full gift from God. We may be blind to the fact, but it is a fact that the things we need most, is the gifts that come without man's power. They journeyed day by day and their wants were supplied at the right time in the right way. They had no use for more than their daily supply, and they could not take any more than they could use and we can not take anything with us but that for which we have immediate and continuous use. God gives what we cannot provide for ourselves, on condition that we "seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all of these things shall be added unto us."

Their life of ease was not to last forever. When they had eaten of the old corn, the manna ceased. When the child is most helpless it's every need is supplied but as it's helplessness vanishes, it's needs are gradually withdrawn. So the manna

ceased as they reached the rich and fertile land. No longer were they to depend upon the manna from the invisible and Infinite Source, but they were to labor and by their efforts supply their needs. If they had been asked which they preferred, I have no doubt they would have chosen the manna, a choice which would have been pernicious and deadly to their future welfare. It is a great lesson, whenever something is gained something is lost. They lost their infant stage and gained their manhood. They lost weakness and gained strength. They lost their doubts and gained faith.

In the vanishing of the manna, they learned to help themselves. God furnished the soil, elements, sunshine, and seed, but the sowing and reaping were theirs. In short, God did the part between the sowing and the reaping, thus co-operating with them. Teaching them that while the manna ceased his cooperation in all their undertakings had

been extended throughout the history of the whole human race. We are the recipients of His divine mercy, whether we know it or not.

We are prone to evade the vital issues in life and dismiss them by saying they do not apply to us, but common sense teaches us that we must not do for another what he can and ought to do for himself, and if this is true in our dealings with one another, how much more so, in the higher sense. God does for us what we cannot do for ourselves. In fact we are like children at our best, for there is not very much that we really can do independent of God and our fellow men. We have this same teaching in the New Testament.

"We must work while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work." "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God which worketh in you both to do and to will of his good pleasure." "My Father worketh hitherto and I work." "The Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following." "But in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him." "And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which worketh all in all."

In conclusion, let us look upon life as it is in God's eternal plan and purpose, doing his will in all things and when the ephemeral things vanish, we shall be sustained by that old, but ever new truth, unto life eternal.
