Million Dollar Deed Filed
A deed was filed with County Recorder Everest this week in which the consideration given is \$1,000,000 and with a \$1000 revenue stamp affixed. It conveys lands in Washington, Tillamook and Lane counties sold under the suit of the First Trust and Savings Bank vs. Tillamook Timber and Logging Co., the agreement having been made October 30, 1916, between Wallace McCamant as trustee and John P. Oleson of Chicago. The deed recites that Oleson having paid the balance of the purchase price the final transfer is made, the signature to the instrument being that of Robert F. Maguire, master in chancery.—Hillsboro Independent.

Big Spruce Tree
Twelve feet two inches in diameter is the size of a spruce tree which has been felled near Kilchis river. Photograph of the big stick were brought to Portland by Russell Hawkins, who is registered at the Saturday.

Hotel Portland. The spruce is a sort of freak, for in all the forests thereabouts no other tree has attained such ample girth. The log has been transported to the mill at Garibaldi and will be sawed up when the plant begins operating within two or three months. A section may be cut off the log for display purposes. The mill is expected to begin operations some time in February and it will be operated entirely by electric power. The mill has an 11 mile railroad up the Kilchis river, tapping the primeval forest, and has made a fill covering many acres of the low lands.—Oregonian.
