Finding Work For Unemployed Will Be One of Local Post's Activities

## AUXILIARY GETS CHARTER AND ELECTS OFFICERS

State Compensation Law Favored By The Meeting—Luncheon Follows Business

The American Legion and the Women's Auxiliary held separate meetings at the K. P. hall Thursday evening, each of which had a large attendance.

The occasion for the Women's Auxiliary was the application for a charter for that organization and the election of permanent officers.

The election resulted in the following officers: President, Mrs. Alfred Anderson; vice-president, Mrs. Everett Wells; secretary, Mrs. B. L. Beals, Jr.; treasurer, Mrs. Leland Erwin.

The executive committee consists of Mrs. A. C. Crank, Mrs. J. E. Reedy and Mrs. Floyd Gardner.

The Legion took many matters pertaining to ex-service men, among which being a state compensation. Washington has instituted a compensation for men who served in the world war and it may be that the people of Oregon will be questioned as to their attitude in this matter.

Another matter discussed was the maintenance of some sort of a labor bureau to assist ex-service men to obtain work. It was thought that in the near future a great many men will be thrown out of work on account of the temporary closing down of some industries and an organization of this kind would be of great help to ex-soldiers and sailors.

Henry Heisel, Adjutant of Post 47, was appointed to take charge of the bureau. After the meetings of the Auxiliary and the Legion a luncheon that had been prepared by the women was spread. One of the features of the luncheon was the decorations. The tables were decorated with small Christmas trees and lighted with candles stuck in apples, while all other lights were extinguished.

After the luncheon there was dancing with music furnished free by Wilkins orchestra.

The Auxiliary and the Legion are very appreciative to the K. P. lodge for the use of their hall, which was donated, and to Wilkins' orchestra for their donation of the music.

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## SEVERAL HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

TWO GO TO HOSPITAL FOR TREATMENT AS RESULT

Both Cars Badly Damaged.—Ford Driver Takes Responsibility For Accident

A serious automobile wreck occurred on the curve near the Swenson place on the Bay City road Wednesday noon.
