When you have bought presents for all the family and other friends and relatives and have left the cares of business for a day to sit down to a table laden with the necessities and luxuries ordinarily used in a Christmas dinner, will your mind be at ease and your conscience clear that you have done your part in this season of peace on earth and good will to your fellow men, or will you think of the starving children of Europe who are asking America for food?

When you look at your own children, happy and in good health, will it occur to you that other children on this earth are actually in want for the bare necessities of life, and few are willing to feed them? With this picture in your mind sit down to your Christmas dinner and try to enjoy it. It can't be done, unless you have done your part in helping the needy ones to get enough food to hold body and soul together.

Herbert Hoover states that there are three and one-half millions of starving children in Europe who are depending on America for food. He also states that \$10 will keep one of these children in the necessary food until the next harvest can be gathered.

The Oregon committee of the European Relief Council has allotted Tillamook county 420 children to feed until they will be able to get food in their own land. Will we do it? Will you help? The money is to be used irrespective of color, race or creed but will be sent to some particular country if desired.

UNDERWRITING THE FUTURE

Tillamook county has been blessed with numerous natural advantages, and chief among these has been her wealth of timber, from which has developed the great lumber and logging industry.

To replace the payroll that will vanish with this industry is the problem that must be solved for the continued prosperity and well-being of the county. With this end in view a number of suggestions have been put forth at one time or another, and probably the best of these and the most feasible is that of converting loggedoff land into tillable property.

Notice of Intention to Improve Certain Street in Tillamook City Oregon.

Notice is hereby given, to all persons whom it may concern, that the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, has determined to improve the following street in Tillamook City, to-wit:

Miller Avenue from the south line of First Street south on Miller Avenue to the City Limits.

Said improvement consisting of the excavating and grading of said street to the proper sub-grade and all dirt excavated which shall be necessary for the filling of said street to bring the same to proper grade shall be used upon said street.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the Charter, Resolutions and Ordinances of said Tillamook City, Oregon, and in accordance with the plans and specifications and estimates of the work therefor made and prepared by the City Engineer of Tillamook City, and filed in the office of the City Recorder of Tillamook City.

Beginning at the Northeast corner of Lot 3 in Block 2, of Goodspeed's Addition to the Town of Tillamook, now Tillamook City; and running thence south to the north line of Block 1 of A. A. Miller's Addition to the Town of Tillamook, now Tillamook City; thence East to a point 105 feet East of the Northwest corner of said Block 1; thence South, parallel with the East line of Miller Avenue, to the South boundary of Tillamook City; thence West along the South boundary line of Tillamook City to a point 105 feet West of the West line of Miller Avenue; thence North parallel with the West line of Miller Avenue to the Northwest corner of Lot 2, in block 2 of A. A. Miller's Addition to the Town of Tillamook, now Tillamook City; thence North to the South line of Block 1 in H. F. Goodspeed's Addition to Tillamook City; thence West to a point 105 feet West of the Southeast corner of said Block; thence North to the North line of said Block 1; thence Easterly along the South line of Front Street to the place of beginning.

The cost of said improvement as fixed by the accepted bid therefor is \$8,475.70, to which shall be added the cost of advertising, engineering and superintendence, and other incidental expenses connected with the carrying out and construction of said improvement as authorized by the Charter of Tillamook City, 10 days from the date of the first publication of this notice is allowed by the Charter of Tillamook City, Oregon, for the filing of remonstrances against the proposed improvement and the date of the first publication of this notice is December 23rd, 1920.

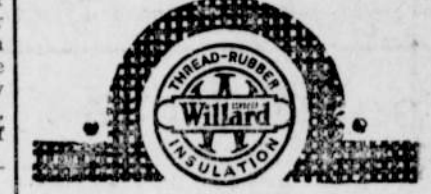

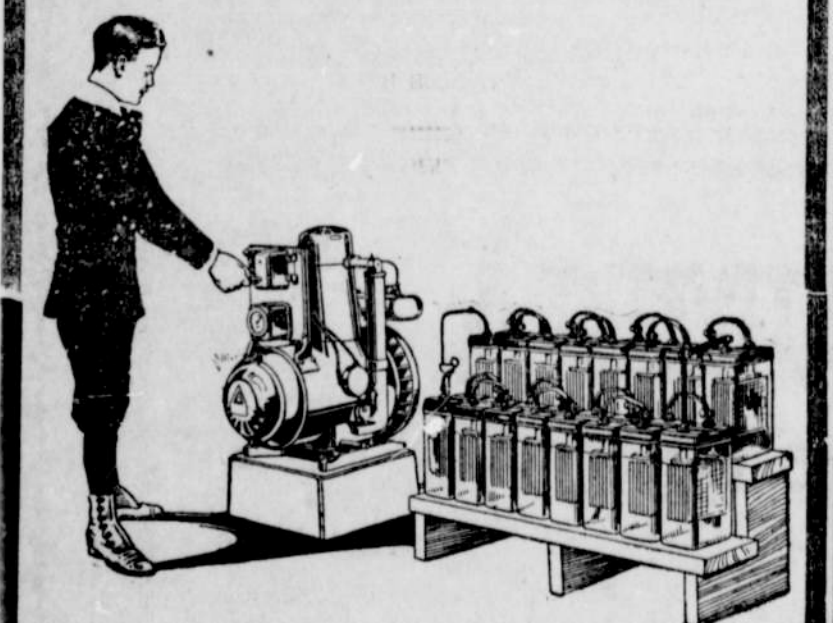
