She started loading cargo at the Brighton mills Saturday, and sailed from there Tuesday. If the north-west winds prevail for a few days she should make a quick passage south.

While the wind was blowing in Seaside and other parts of Oregon last week, it did not miss Nehalem. Wood piles were blown down, Mr. Howard's front windows were broken. Bud York was blown off a wagon load of wood. Water was picked up in the streets, blown and churned about like a near cyclone.
