### Stock Food Law

Humble boesie, with her biped and quadruped associates, is placed on a parity with mere man insofar as hygiene and its relation to food is concerned, in a proposed law introduced in the senate by Senator Staples, of Portland. For Senator Staples' bill (S. B. 20), which, if enacted into law, would supersede the old commercial feeding stuff law and would impose a brand new pure foods act in the feeding of stock.

The proposed law would require all foods prepared for livestock to pass stringent test by the state dairy and food commission. It would be so binding upon persons who would feed livestock inferior food that for any violation of its terms they would be liable to a fine of not less than \$100 or so much as \$1000 for each violation.

The bill requires each parcel of food stuff for livestock to bear a label containing the following information: weight, name brand or trademark, name and address of manufacturer or sponsor, minimum of percentum of crude protein, minimum percentum of crude fat, maximum percentum of crude fiber, maximum percentum of ash, maximum percentum of grit, shell or mineral matter in poultry feeds, and the specific name of each ingredient used in the manufacture of the food.

The bill would authorize the state dairy and food commissioner to name deputies to act as his assistant in enforcing the terms of the proposed act. These deputies are empowered by the bill to invade any or all livestock food manufacturers and make minute inspection of all foodstuff being made.

Any person dealing in such food-stuffs will at all times be accountable to the state dairy and food commissioner and that official is empowered to revoke licenses for operation at his discretion.

In addition to the fines imposed for violation of any provision of the proposed law the state is authorized to seize, condemn or sell any feeding stuffs that is found not to meet with the requirements of the law.—Oregon Voter.

The Oregon Dairy Council will hold a meeting of the stockholders and members on February 4th at 2 P. M. in Portland Central Library, room E. Plans for reorganizing certain branches of the work will be discussed. J. E. Dunn, the new president, will preside. Fred Merrill is the new secretary. Edith Knight Hill who has served the council and directed all the educational work for the past two years has resigned.

Mr. Carl Haberlach of Tillamook is a member of the Board of Oregon Dairy Council and has ably served them for the past year.

### Sire More Than Half.

We have long told that the sire is half the herd. Some students of the problem of heredity have advanced the idea that the sire possesses the power to transmit his characteristics to offspring in much greater degree than does the female. They argue that the sire is the "metal and the dam the mould" into which it is cast and given form, and that the finished product, except for external characteristics, possesses the qualities of the metal rather than the "mould."

This is an interesting idea, though one that seems difficult of proof. Not many people would be as willing to accept into their dairy herd the daughter of a great proven dairy sire and a beef cow, as they would to accept the daughter of both a proven dairy sire and a proven dam. Possibly the sire is more than half the herd, but it is a far stretch of the imagination to suppose that he is 90 per cent of it. At any rate, he is half, and livestock producers are slowly admitting the truth of this statement and making it a part of their breeding philosophy. The more quickly they all recognize the fact and banish the scrub from their herds and their communities, the more quickly will many of the ills of the live stock industry be healed.—Oregon Farmer.
