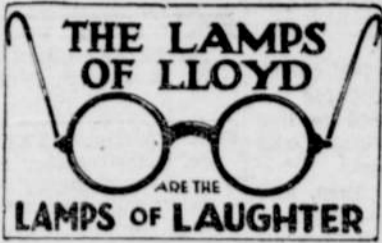

American Legion Notes

A bill has been presented in the state legislature which, if adopted, will give former service men either a straight bonus or a loan upon town or farm property. As drawn, this measure will have to be referred to the voters of the state in June 1922, if it proves agreeable to the state solons and is approved by the governor. Further delay might then be occasioned by the condition of the bond market. More practical results could be obtained by segregating the bonus and loan features. A law granting the state land board the right to loan upon town property as well as farm lands, and granting former service men a preference in loans made by the board, would accomplish nearly the same result as the loan feature of the proposed act and could become effective by the end of May of this year.

The regular monthly meeting of Tillamook Post will be held on Thursday evening, February 10th, 1921, at the city hall in Tillamook City.

Former service men are making good in practically every line of endeavor in the county. Doctors, bankers, merchants, dairymen, loggers and students are to be found on the roster of Tillamook Post and each is doing his bit toward making the county a bigger and better place to live.

The American Legion, which was quick to offer its aid to the police at the height of the crime wave, is now establishing employment agencies and aiding ex-service men during the present low tide of industry. A national survey of employment is being made by the American Legion Weekly and all posts have been encouraged to establish employment agencies by F.W. Galbraith Jr., National Commander.

The present system of immigration was condemned by members of the Braxton County Post of the American Legion at Sutton, Va., in a vote following discussion of the problem. Forty-nine per cent of the vote was for stopping immigration entirely; seven per cent for forbidding it for 2 or 3 years, and forty per cent for establishing an effective system of regulation. There were no votes in support of the prevailing system.

Massachusetts Legionaires have obtained employment of twenty per cent of applicants at their offices. Employment officers of Minnesota posts are discouraging to the cities and interchanging information in regard to prospects for employment in their communities. Spokane ex-service men and their families, who are out of work are being supplied by food and other necessities by Legion managers.

Visiting Ladies' Maid Latest Wrinkle

The "visiting ladies' maid" who need not serve one mistress exclusively and on a twenty-four-hour-a-day schedule but can drop in to my lady's chamber for an hour or two each day to sew on buttons and press out frills and laces has a good chance of employment today, according to the largest Y. W. C. A. Employment Bureau in New York City. "We are making a specialty this year of 'odd jobs' for women," says the director of the Bureau, "because there are so many women who want to make a little money but have only a few hours a day to give to outside work and also because housekeepers in small apartments these days prefer someone who will help by the hour and then leave rather than the person who must live with them." Some of the other odd jobs listed with the Bureau are tending a pool parrot while its mistress goes south; chaperoning debutantes on weekend parties; taking children to walk in the parks; reading to the blind or taking them on walks. There seem to be jobs to suit the taste and temperament of everyone.

Tillamook county people visiting in Portland include: E. T. Halton, owner of Tillamook's largest department store; J. P. Our cheese crop in Tillamook county has all been disposed of at a very satisfactory figure and orders have been booked for the product for several weeks ahead. 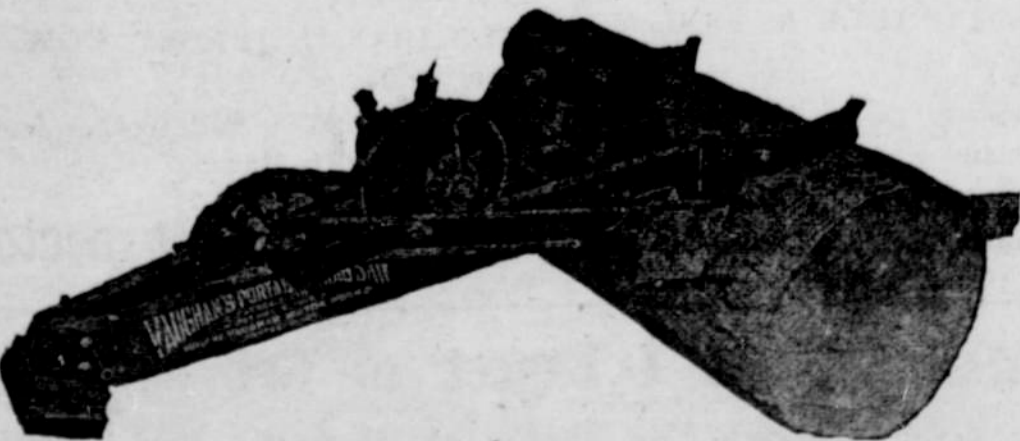
