ANNUAL FIREMEN'S DANCE

An annual event, the Firemen's dance, will be staged next Tuesday February 22nd. For almost thirty years the Tillamook Fire department has held Washington's birthday as it's own and other fire departments throughout the country have done the same.

Mayor Moulton has taken a commendable stand on the booze question. The practice of drinking the raw alcohol which is sold these days for booze, is becoming a little too general and it will surely get someone into a serious scrape before long if allowed to continue.

But why pick entirely on the drinkers? If some way could be found to round up all the bootleggers the result would be much more satisfactory.

Drinkers, amateur and hardened, when they believe themselves in need of a "kick," do not seem to realize what risks they are running in pouring down themselves the concoctions manufactured in homemade stills. It has been proven by test that practically all the bootleg liquor now being made contains a large percentage of fusel oil, a substance that has always been sold as a poison, and though the effects of the drink are not always immediate outside a headache following a crazed condition of the mind, in due time the poison will collect its toll.

Next Saturday is the end of the official prune week in Oregon but that should not stop anyone from

eating all they can until fresh fruit is to be had. Prunes are an important Oregon product but the growers were unable to sell their entire crop this year and have asked Oregonians to help them get rid of what they have on hand. Help them out; for some day we may want help to get rid of our Tillamook cheese, though it isn't likely.

Senator Edwards' bill relating to the port commissions strike us as a worthy, and though it seems primarily adapted to the proposed Port of Tillamook, the measure, as it is proposed to amend it, has many good points applicable to any port commission. The bill as presented would probably remove the objectionable features that have held up the development of our own port in the past on account of the constant friction between the timbermen and the farmers.
