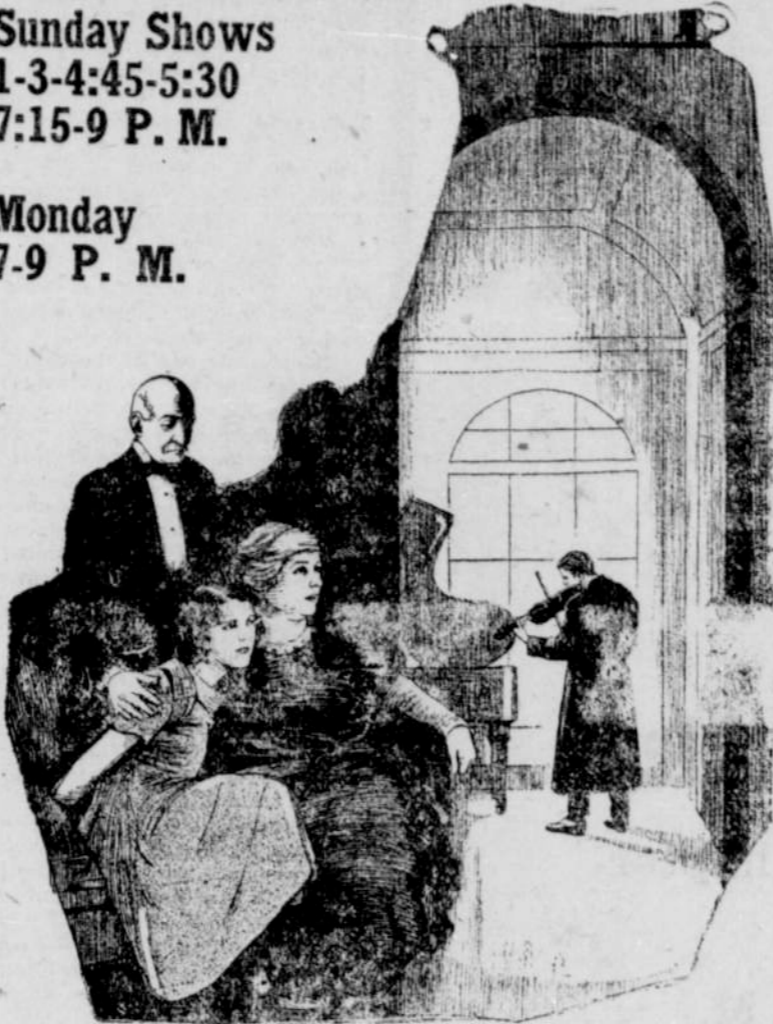

## American Legion Notes



Former service men who have claims against the government of any nature, whether they accrued in the service or developed since discharge should prepare to present their cases to the "flying squadron" which will visit Tillamook in the near future. This organization, which is composed of representatives of the various government departments and the Legion, is out to clean up, so far as possible, all differences between former service men and the Nation. Matters of compensation, insurance, allotments, allowances, liberty bonds subscribed while in the service, back pay, \$60 bonus, victory buttons and medals, and other difficulties which may exist, will be thrashed out. The dates when the squadron will visit Tillamook have not been definitely announced. Department headquarters hope to see the start of the campaign made during the month of February.

Tillamook Post is going to see that proper respect to the National flag and the National anthem are paid in the vicinity. Patriotism is not a matter to be considered only in war times as a sort of "emergency measure" but should be part of our daily thoughts and actions. The teaching of reverence to the flag and respect for the National anthem is part of the course of study of our public schools and thoughtlessness or carelessness should not be permitted to mar this subject. It is just as important now as it was two or three years ago.

The local posts of the G. A. R. and R. C. are beginning to make plans for Memorial Day. The American Legion throughout the country is also taking an interest in this day and it is fitting that Tillamook Post should participate in the local ceremonies. It is not too early to give

this matter consideration. Paid up members of Tillamook Post now number 133. This is still approximately 100 short of the number enrolled in the past year. Members should remember that the names of all unpaid members will be stricken from the subscription lists of the American Legion Weekly on February 28th. Enlargement and improvement of the Weekly will depend largely upon new advertising secured, but advertising depends absolutely upon paid up subscription lists. The welfare of the Weekly therefore depends upon the number of members who pay dues.

The Japanese question will not become a serious one in Oregon if the proposed Alien Land Laws are enacted. This bill, which is sponsored by the Legion, prevents ownership of land, either directly or indirectly, by any person who cannot become a citizen of the United States. It is also a bar against leasing lands to orientals. The Hood River and Medford districts, which have recently been threatened with an influx of Japanese who are finding California undesirable by reason of its recently enacted land laws, are particularly anxious to have this matter settled in Oregon. At a meeting of the Post Thursday evening, the proposed bill received unanimous endorsement.

A joint meeting with the Auxiliary, to be followed by a dance, is proposed by a resolution adopted at the last meeting of the Post. Commanders Ed Heisel, Charles Woolley, Glenn T. Woolfe, Floyd H. Gardner and R. E. Donovan were appointed to make necessary arrangements. The date is announced on another page of this issue.

Charley Woolley is an American. This was decisively proven recently

when a neighbor called him a "foreigner." Charley displayed all the traits of initiative, self-reliance and combativeness of an American fighting man. Also, he swung a wicked right. When the decision was rendered, everybody concerned was willing to admit that Charley is a thorough, dyed-in-the wool American citizen.

Bonus legislation bids fair to pass the State legislature. The bill which has already passed the House of Representatives, provides for a cash payment of \$15.00 per month for each month served after the first sixty days or, as an alternative, a loan not to exceed \$3,000 which must be secured by mortgage on farm or town property. Any former service man who accepts the bonus may later apply for a loan, but the amount received in cash must first be repaid to the State Treasury before the loan is granted.

Before State bonus legislation can become effective, it must be approved by the people of the state at large and this cannot be done until June 1922. Should the proposed readjustment bills now pending in Congress pass in the meantime, it is probable that the State measure would not receive the necessary plurality to enact it into a law.

To consider between 700 and 1,000 proposed new laws and to act on 300 to 500 of them, all in the space of sixty days, is "some" speed in legislation. Yet this is the problem which confronts the state legislature at each biennial session and the legislatures of many states which follow the same plan. It is not to be wondered that much H.C.-considered, half-baked legislation is to be found on the statute books.

Scores of letters have been received by the editor of the American Legion Weekly urging that the American Legion request the state department to obtain the release of the two Americans, who were captured in Germany during an attempt to arrest Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, Amer-

ica's most notorious draft dodger.

American Legion members in Lawrence, Mass., stood behind eleven veterans, employees of the department of public property and parks, who were dismissed by a newly-elected commissioner. The issue raised probably will test the validity of the Massachusetts Act giving civil preference to veterans in the courts. The commissioner was forced to apologize for disparaging remarks about ex-service men.

Alabama American Legion members are willing to assume O. D. to effect the release of Captain Emmett Kilpatrick a Red Cross worker held prisoner by the Bolsheviks in Russia, according to a resolution passed by the Legion's state executive committee. The resolution, which was sent to President Wilson, demands that Captain Kilpatrick, an Alabamian, be set free "even though it takes an army of ten million of us to do it."

Fifty men have agreed to join a proposed aero unit of the Indiana National Guard at a meeting of Wabash, Ind. Post of the American Legion. The Legionnaires hope to practice with ten airplanes soon.

A new clubhouse, patterned after the style of a military barracks or armory will be constructed by Homer J. Ball Post of the American Legion at Emporia, Kas. It will cost \$10,000.

American Legion members in San Francisco paid honor to Hong Chow Lee, son of a Chinese merchant and the first Chinese of the city to enlist for the World War, when his body was brought to San Francisco for burial. The Chinese hero was only twenty-two years old when he was killed in the Argonne-Meuse offensive.
