PRESIDENT HARDING TWENTY. NINTH CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Is the Eleventh Man To Be Elected to That High Position From State of Ohio

The head of the new administration which takes over the ship of state tomorrow has several interesting incidents connected with his election. He is the first president of the United States to be elected to that high office on his birthday, being 55 years old on last November 2nd. He is also the first senator to be elected to the presidency and was swept into office by the largst plurality accorded a presidential candidate in many years.

President Harding is the seventh president of Scotch-Irish paternal ancestry. Fifteen of our presidents over a period of 133 years, have been of English decent, three of Scoten, one of Welsh and two of Dutch.

The average age of our presidents at inauguration has been \$6 years. approximately, while the approximate average at death has been 66

President Harding exemplifies the rapid rise possible in American life better than any of his predecessors. He was not included in the 1414-15 "Who's Who."

Unlike many of his predecessors also, his parents were not wealthy and he has risen to the highest office within the gift of the American people through frugality, industry and thrift, of which he is a warm expo-
