13.590 DAIRY COWS OWNED IN THE COUNTY

Report of Dairy and Food Commis sioner Contains Many Interesting Facts

Extrats from the report of D. R. Tinnerstet, deputy dairy and food commissioner for Tillamook County: In the county we have 29 cheese

factories of which 25 are operated under the supervision of the Tillamook County Creamery Association. The other four are small individual plants where the dairyman makes up his own product, two of which make brick and limberger cheese.

There are 698 dairies in the county of which 677 are patrons of association factories.

The average score (as per score card) of these dairies is 63.4, the highest being 88.6 and the lowest

Tillamook County has 13,590 dairy cows, of which 633 are purebred as follows: 296 Jerseys, 182 Holsteins, 98 Guernseys, 31 Rcd Polls and 26 Ayrshires.

There are 594 sires of which 398 are pure-bred as follows: 204 Jerseys, 102 Holsteins, 81 Guernseys, 5 seys, 102 Holsteins, 81 Guernseys, 5 Shorthorns, 4 Redd Poll and 2 Ayr-

MERRY SEX WAR ON

Bureau of Engraving and Printing in Throes of Controversy.

Plate Printers' Union Charges That There Are Too Many "Trifling Giris" in the Bureau.

Washington .- A merry sex war is in progress in Uncle Sam's money fac-

The war started when the Plate Printers' union in the bureau of engraving and printing made formal charges that there were too many "trifling girls" in the bureau and that they were retarding the efficiency and the amount of production of paper money. In their charges the plate printers intimated that too much time was spent by girls employed in the bureau in administering "little dabs of paint and powder." In fact it was intimated that the plate printters objected to "flappers" being em-

ployed in the bureau. The plate printers let themselves in
