When the railroad rates were raised on lumber it killed the goose that laid the golden egg, not only injuring the railroads, but caused stagnation in all kinds of business, and Tillamook, like all other places where lumber mills are situated, is now suffering and will continue to suffer until the railroads restore the freight rates that prevailed previous to August 20, 1920.


