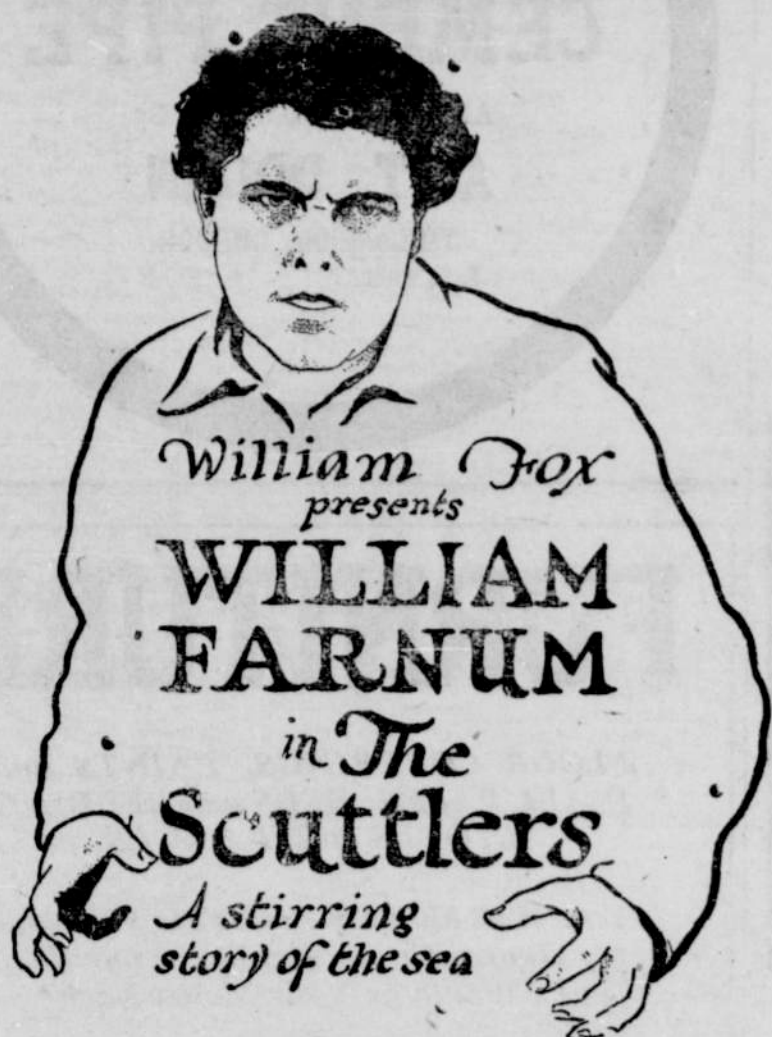

POMONA GRANGE NOTES

Beaver, Ore., March 9—(Special)—Tillamook County Pomona Grange met in regular session with Sandlake Grange on the first Tuesday in March. This meeting was well attended and was full of interest to grangers.

The degree of Pomona was conferred on twenty-two new members. Owing to the fact that special election is to be held in this state on the day set for the opening of State Grange, this Pomona Grange went on record as favoring the meeting of State Grange one week earlier than scheduled. This grange also approved the action taken by the subordinate granges of the county in recommending the appointment of O. K. Tittle and Mrs. A. C. Daniel as members of the County Fair Board.
