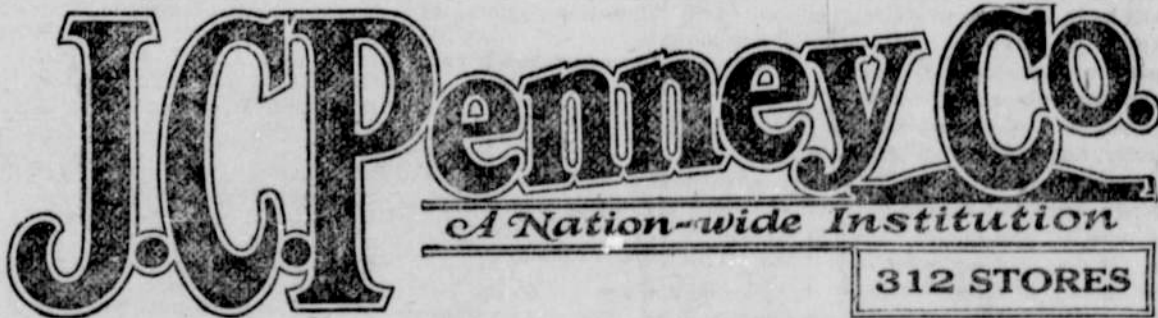

American Legion Notes

The week ending February 25 was one of the most successful in the history of the American Legion and Women's Auxiliary of that organization from the standpoints of new posts and units. Eighty-two posts of the Legion and seventy-three units of the Womens Auxiliary were added. Applications for thirty-two charters for the Auxiliary were received in one day. There are now 10,200 posts and 2,150 units, according to National Headquarters.

Billy Marvin, an ex-service man, of Mulberry, Kan. found real help in the Fred Hutchison Post of the American Legion at Mulberry and the Ben Fuller Post, of Pittsburg, Kan. While a member of the 106th Infantry, Marvin suffered disability which necessitated his removal to Arizona. The Mulberry Post staged a benefit dance, the entire proceeds being given to Marvin, and the Ben Fuller Post also aided him financially.

An appeal has been made to National Headquarters of the American Legion by officers of the American and French Children's League to aid the League in its distribution of several millions of poppies, which the women of France have made to be worn on Memorial Day. The poppies will be sold in all parts of the United States and the proceeds will be used

for French and American war orphans. The fact that a veteran who gets into trouble with the law is an ex-service man will not be emphasized by the associated press, according to orders issued to its superintendents and correspondents. The American Legion at its second annual convention passed a resolution urging the press to adopt a similar policy.

A plan by which thousands of members of the American Legion might be given a free course in government is proposed by Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr. of New York, an American Legion member. Mr. Fish suggests that each member of the House and Senate bring a Legionaire to Washington for three months as one of the secretaries permitted him in his office and replace him at the end of the period with another one and so on. Mr. Fish has already started a relay of New York Legion members in his office.

Memorial Day will be observed by Tillamook Post of the Legion and plans are under way to see that all possible members participate in the ceremonies of the day. Uniforms will not be worn, the official badge for that day being the poppie, the flower adopted by the Legion as its own. A supply of poppies, will be furnished

by the Post.

Official war pictures are to be exhibited in Tillamook. Films taken by the Signal Corps during various battles in the late war will be shown. A committee appointed at the meeting last week will procure the films and arrange for their exhibition here. The pictures are being distributed by State Headquarters and any profits derived from their showing will inure to the local Post.

June of this year was fixed by the State Legislature for the special election at which the recently enacted State bonus law will be submitted to the voters of the State. The bill grants a bonus of \$15.00 a month for federal service or, as an alternative, a State loan not to exceed \$3,000 to be secured by farm lands or town resident property. Enactment of a federal adjusted compensation act prior to the time when the State act becomes effective will eliminate the State aid, according to the provision of the act.

The "flying squadron" has been temporarily halted. Through failure of the various government departments to cooperate to the extent expected, the plan to clean up all outstanding claims against the government has been delayed. Efforts are now being made to secure additional authority so as to permit representatives from the War Risk Insurance department, the federal board of vocational training and the public health service to continue in the work.

Frank W. Galbraith, junior nat-

ional commander of the American Legion, wired to state headquarters, Oregon: "1921 membership now exceeds 400,000 and government of United States acknowledges American Legion greatest single faction for good in nation today. Eyes of world upon the American Legion. I wish you to assume with me responsibility for extending time for removing delinquent members from mailing lists of American Legion Weekly to April 1. In meantime use every means and redoubt efforts to get maximum enrollment old and new. Wire and write every post get everyone on the job. Wake them up and let's put the task over 100 per cent." Heretofore the ruling was that members not paying dues for year 1921 would be stricken from the rolls February 28. The state committee will make plans to cooperate to the fullest extent with the plans of the national commander.

MORE AND STILL MORE STUDY IS DEMANDED AT UNIVERSITY

University of Oregon, Eugene, Mar. 8th, 1921.

Harder and still harder study is a-head for students in the University of Oregon. The faculty has changed the requirements upwards so that while the amount of work remains the same the quality of it must be even higher than it has been in the past. The lowest passing grade is "5" and only 45 term hours at this grade will be accepted towards graduation. The remaining 140 term hours will have to be completed with a grade of "4" or above, according to the new ruling.
