AT THE REX

Bib Bear Valley, known as "the Canadian Rockies of California," furnishes the background for many scenes in "The Red Lane," the story of the Canadian border, which will be shown at the Rex Tuesday, March 29. Frank Mayo is the star of this photodrama, which is one of those red-blooded, two-listed tales of the great outdoors in which this star is at his best.

Though "Dangerous Hours," the big Thomas H. Ince production, which will be shown at the Rex Thursday, March 31, is a tense dramatic picture with its underlying theme the radical unrest that has been sweeping the country, it is not without its humorous phases. For instance, a collection of Bolshevik vampires are portrayed in some of the scenes showing meetings of the "Red" agitators. OREGON AND WASHINGTON LUMBER CUT INCREASES

An increase of 10 per cent more lumber was cut in 1920 over any annual cut for the past three years is indicated in complete returns from mills which have just been given out by the District Forester's Office in Portland, covering Oregon and Washington.

While the returns received by the Forest Service are still incomplete, they are given as indicative of last year's lumber production in the two States. The figures from eight Class 4 mills, or mills which cut from 5,000 up to 10 million feet per year, for Oregon, show an increase of over 6 million feet, while eighteen mills reporting from Washington report a decrease of five million feet.

BLIND IN ETERNAL TRIANGLE

Husband, Wife and Alleged Affinity, Sightless All—Men in Battle Royal.

Atlanta, Ga.—That love is blind has just been proved in police court here when a blind man, his blind wife, and her alleged affinity, blind also, were arraigned for trial following a battle royal between the two men, after the husband had come home unexpectedly.

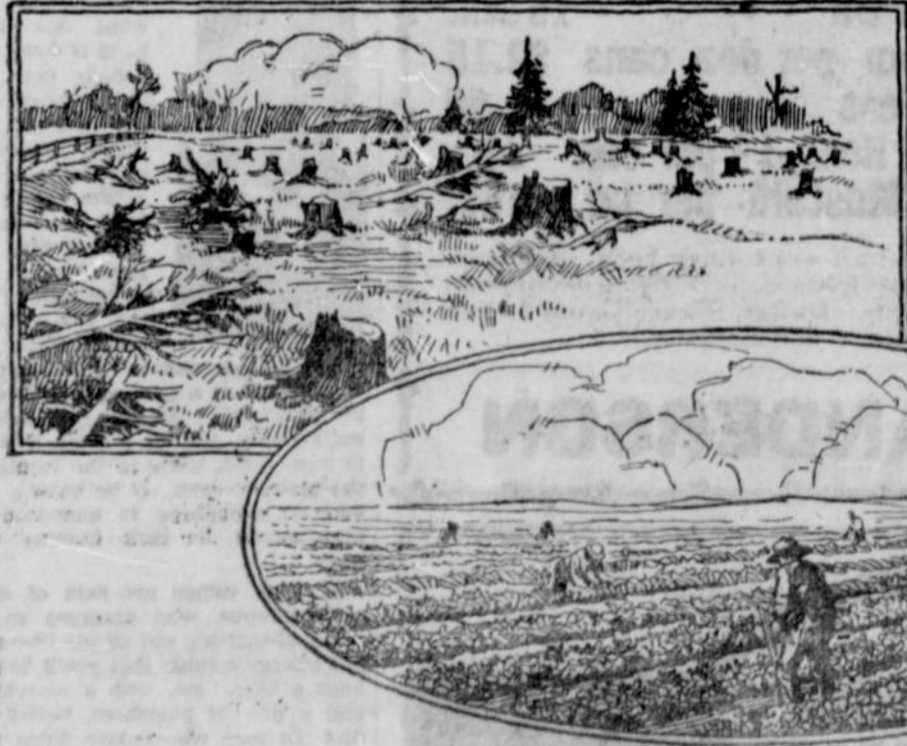

OLYMPIC TIMBER LOSS IS GREATEST IN MANY YEARS

That the storm of the last few days in January was the most destructive that has visited the Olympic Peninsula in the last 500 years and that it has changed a forest area from the safest fire belt in the Northwest into one of the greatest risks, is the statement of District Forester Geo. H. Cecil, of Portland, who has just returned from that country.

Queets and Quinalt River watersheds get anything like reliable estimates greatest possible forest fire hazard

"Estimates of the damage, and these of the damage done," says Mr. Cecil through the impenetrable mass of estimates at best can be only guesses. "All roads and trails are blocked by fallen timber, while most of the timber blown down is outside of the National Forest and privately owned still the extent of the damage is so huge that in Mr. Cecil's opinion it is going to call for absolutely united action on the part of every private owner, the State of Washington, and the U. S. Forest Service to salvage some part of this loss and to prevent it has been changed into one of the forest fires from getting started.
