IRELAND UNDER ALIEN RULE

Power of the Danes Broken by Brian Boru in 1014—Normans Became Amalgamated.

About 800 A. D., the pagan hosts of the Northmen and Danes fell on Ireland with fierce destruction. After a century of destruction, Irish kings led their people in a succession of wars, for the deliverance of their country, and Brian Borama, or Brian Boru (928-1014), king of Munster, by his great victory in the battle of Clontarf, on April 23, 1014, finally broke the power of the Danes in Ireland. In 1171 Ireland was invaded by the Normans from England, in the time of Henry II, and its conquest began. "In Ireland," to quote the words of Prof. Edward A. Freeman (1823-1892) "the Norman was more purely a conqueror than anywhere else, but in Ireland his power of adaptation caused him to sink in a way in which he sank nowhere else. While some of the Norman settlers in Ireland went to swell the mass of the English of the Pale, others threw in their lot with the native Irish, and became, in the well-known saying, "more Irish than the Irish themselves."—Detroit News.

Religion of Good Citizenship.

"In China there existed in the past, and there are evidences that it is coming to life again, the religion of good citizenship," says a writer in Asia Magazine. "That is to say, the Chinese theory is that a man does not need to feel the need of physical force to protect himself; he has seldom the need even to call in and use the physical force of the policeman—of the state—to protect him. A man in China is supposed to be protected by the sense of justice of his neighbor; he is protected by the readiness of his fellow-citizens to obey the sense of moral obligation. The ideal of Chinese civilization, therefore, is that a man can not feel the need of using physical force to protect himself because he is sure that right and justice is recognized by all his neighbors as a force higher than physical force, and that moral obligation as recognized by everybody is something that must be obeyed."

Ground Must Be Hollow.

In Lassen county, California, is a spot called Dry lake, which is in reality almost an arid plain, with some small scattered here and there over its area is two and a half by four miles. On one side are the Pit River mountains and on another are the pine woods, while to the west are the famous lava beds, in which the Indians hid during that last great California struggle with the savages. A winding road leads up from the valley below into the curious basin. If a horse walks on this road anywhere, even two or three miles outside the border of the Dry lake, he can be heard for many miles up in the interior. The ground all about there sounds forth a hollow sound. Reverberations can be heard everywhere. A footfall may be heard like a sound in a great cavern.

God's Best Medicine.

"Mirth is God's medicine," says a noted writer. "Everybody ought to get it in. Grim care, moroseness, anxiety, all the rust of life, ought to be scooped off by the oil of mirth. It better than emery. Every man ought to rub himself with it. A man that mirth is like a wagon without rings, but a man who laughs and uses others to laugh, even though they are dark and the causes for laughter are few, is like a chariot without rings in which one may ride over the rough roads and feel nothing but a pleasant motion."

Skidding is Overcome.

Attention is called in a circular report from Sydney, Australia, to a new invention of a front-drive vehicle which entirely prevents skidding. A test over 16,000 miles of rough road has been made. It is claimed, with no signs of wear. The front wheels are pivoted in the center, which enables the steering of the car with much greater ease than in the rear-wheel-driven machine. The device is now attached to an old worn British car which, prior to the attachment of the device, weighed 32 cwt., with a speed of thirty-eight miles an hour traveling fifteen miles on one gallon of gasoline. After alteration and application of the front drive device, the car weighs 35 cwt., has a speed of forty-five miles an hour and will go seventeen and one-half miles on a single gallon of gasoline.

Tuberculosis in France.

That of 368 antituberculous dispensaries in France only ten per cent are situated in Paris was hailed as a "happy omen" at the second international conference. Only a few organizations were actively engaged in anti-tuberculosis work in France before the war. Today, largely through the activity of the Rockefeller Foundation, in addition to the dispensaries mentioned, there are 10,000 sanitarium beds for tuberculous patients; many hospitals have provided isolation wards; the boarding out of anemic children in rural homes has been organized on a large scale, and there is national co-operation of all the agencies concerned.

British Soldiers and New Roads.

Some seven and a half million dollars worth of new road construction has been taken in hand by various British cities to provide work for the unemployed. According to a report of the British Information Service of the Bankers' Trust company, the ministry of transportation contributes one-half of the cost—probably out of funds accumulated for that purpose for many years by the development commission—and lends to the municipalities the other half for five years, repayable in annual installments. Ex-service men, after due registration at a labor exchange, receive preference among applicants.

Thrill Not on Program.

President Obregon of Mexico has given his sanction to bull fighting by appearing one Sunday afternoon when Rodolfo Gaona and Ernesto Pastor fought jointly. He occupied a ring-side seat. When Pastor, playing the last bull, made what appeared to be a death thrust, the President arose to leave and the band immediately struck up the national anthem. The bull, however, was not dead and started to charge. At the sound of the anthem he stopped in his tracks, lowered his head, and with Pastor standing at rigid attention not three feet from the bull's horns, the hymn was completed. A second later the bull tumbled over dead. Veteran fighters asserted the spectacle was the strangest ever seen in the Mexico City arena.—Brooklyn Eagle.

No Aerial Mail for Chinese.

While Chang Tso Lin, who today dominates the north of China, was wondering just what he would do with six airplanes which he ordered from England the question of the disposal of three of them was settled for him. He was undecided whether to use them for military purposes or for the establishment of a mail service, in accordance with the terms of the contract. While debating the question he ordered three to be sent to Mukden, the remainder to Pootung for military purposes. Those shipped to Mukden were loaded on flat cars and started on their way. Some distance from Tientsin they bumped a railroad bridge and were not only smashed but also put the bridge out of commission. So it looks as though those who expected to get their mail via the air route are doomed to disappointment.
