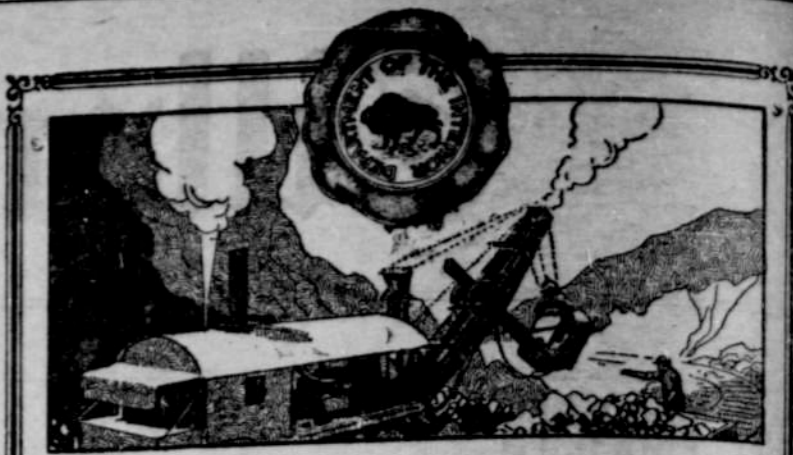

The Chamber of Commerce has received a letter from Major B.M. Atkinson, of the aviation division of the army, asking particulars about the use of a field to land planes. The major says: "It is contemplated sending a flight of three airplanes from Mather Field, Sacramento California through the states of California, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon, for the purpose of photographing and mapping an aerial route in these states. The field required should be 1,500 feet square." The letter also inquired about supplies.
