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TILLAMOOK'S CHANCES FOR SUCCESS

As often as not we hear pessimistic utterances from those who pretend to believe that there is no future for greater business opportunities in Tillamook County. They persistently fail to see that this country is as yet undeveloped; that it is only on the threshold of advancement, and that our period of greater prosperity is yet before us.

To attempt to enumerate the many opportunities possible would be to write a volume, but a mention

of some of the most important can be done in a short space.

What is it that Tillamook County needs most? Population. This can be secured by making payrolls and payrolls are brought by supplying something to the world's market. The mainstay of this country for many years past has been cheese. Are we going to admit that cheese is all that can be produced here? That is to use a fanciful example, the market for cheese would naturally suggest that Tillamook would no longer be able to produce anything to make a living?

The lumbering industry in Tillamook county is yet in its infancy and at its best seems to be hard to compete with other producers on account of handling charges. Someday it will doubtless mean a big thing in this section. Along with lumbering proper, go many allied wood industries such as veneer making, shingle and box manufacture and the manufacture of the many small wooden articles. All these can be successfully undertaken in Tillamook.

Another source of supply will be the small farm system of dividing the land. Now most of the valuable land is being kept in large tracts but the time will come when there will

be few farms in this county of ten or twenty acres. This naturally will bring population.

We now have many acres of unused land, partly cleared. Much will be found to utilize these. In fact, loganberry culture seems to have preempted a place for itself on the new waste land. The planting of unused acres to loganberries will bring growers here in large numbers and it must be said that there is room for them. Canners will then be able to produce anything to make a living?

It is a lamentable fact that to date there has been very little encouragement for new industries to enter here. Any attempt at something new in the country has met with discouraging coolness and the would-be promoters have left without their object completed. This is not as it should be. Several good enterprises have been turned away by this method.

There is no good reason why Tillamook County should not have 29,000 population by the time the next census is taken and it can be fine if there is proper cooperation on the part of our business men and farmers.

Make it 20,000 in 1926.

With good weather not far ahead and vacation time in the offing, something should be done and done soon, regarding a clean-up of the town and surrounding country and the placing of inducements for tourists to visit our city and county. True, a certain number will come anyway, but that number can be increased without a great deal of trouble.
