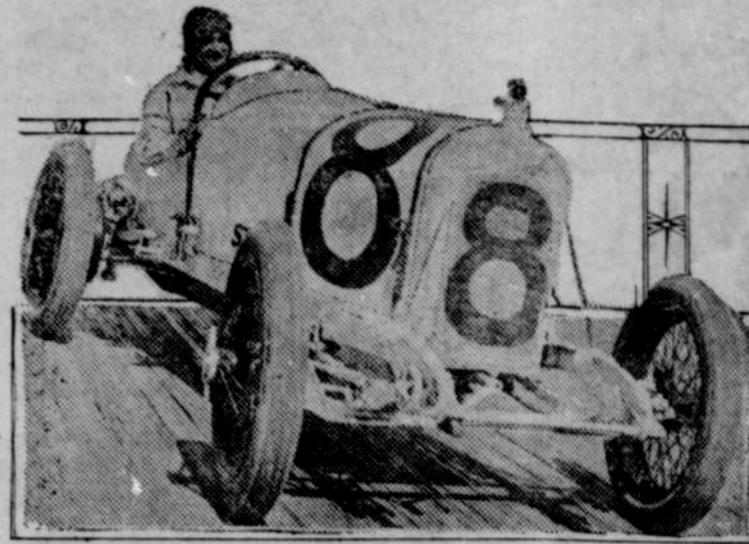

THE BOOSTER COLUMN

Tillamook City officials did the right thing last week when they responded to the call for help from Garibaldi to help fight a serious fire at the Whitney Co.'s saw mill. Although the fire had been confined to the boiler room, when the roof and sides of that building collapsed, the menace to other parts of the saw mill was in a large stack of saw dust into which the fire had well eaten, and the wind gradually fanning this into a blaze and driving it towards the mill, there is not much doubt that the timely arrival of the fire engine saved the other parts of the saw mill from destruction. That is the reason why the people of the city officials showed the right

cooperative spirit in an emergency call for assistance. But suppose the city officials had refused to allow the fire engine to go to Garibaldi, and other parts of the saw mill had been destroyed, public indignation would have been strong against the city officials, and, no doubt, there would have been a demand to recall them. There seemed to be some impression that when the fire engine left that the city was without fire protection. This was not so, however for the hose truck was left and men put in charge, which gave the city the same fire protection that it had before the fire engine was added to the equipment. Though the loss is a most serious one coming at a time when everything was being done to start up manufacturing lumber on a

big scale, it is gratifying to know that the fire engine from this city prevented what might have been a much more serious loss to the company and the community. Some years ago, when a forest fire swept over the mountains, calls for assistance came to this city from many places, and as fast as teams could be obtained men piled into the wagons and drove away to fight fire, leaving but a few of the hose company in the city, and at a time when the smoke was dense and chunks of burning mss were falling, and added to this the fire put the water system out of commission leaving the city without a water supply, but with that serious condition confronting the city, hundreds of men left the city to answer emergency calls for assistance.

"loafs." Our ideas were to strike for more pay, but somehow, the other jurymen had cold feet. We recognized it out this way in an argument to be made before the judge. We were classed as a printer in the court docket, and as printers receive \$8.00 a day, we felt we were justly entitled to that amount of pay. That is a good law and good logic. When it came to go to bat with the judge and tell him that we were going to strike for \$8.00 a day, and then considered the power invested in circuit court judge, I suddenly dawned upon us that the judge might hand the sheriff a "scrap of paper" committing us to the cooler to cool off. That is the reason we did not strike, for the other jurymen would have had a good joke at our expense when they visited us behind the bars. This is only preliminary to what we want to say. A jurymen's most important personage in a law suit and the poorest paid individual in the court room. Most of the jurymen are from outside precincts, and the \$3.00 a day will pay their hotel expenses, that is if they do not order too many side dishes and go off on a joy ride once in a while, leaving them nothing for their services straightening out other people's disagreements, so we are offering this suggestion, which is characteristic of the times: Eight hours work, eight hours rest, eight hours sleep and eight dollars a day for jurymen. Every prospective jurymen will say "Amen" to this.

You cannot take out of the basket until you have put something in. "He profits most who serves best." It is the organization wherein business competitors drop their scramble for business for the moment and merge their resources and power for the upbuilding of the community. It is the savior of business in times of depression. It fosters civic pride; it arouses the latent talents of its citizens, awakening within them a desire to make their town, your town and my town, a better place to do business in, to live in and really to enjoy to live in, untrammelled on the one hand by puritanic restrictions, or on the other hand un-sullied, at home and abroad, by unbridled license. Summing up, a Chamber of Commerce is the concentrated brains, efforts ambitions and progressive desires of the business, professional, social, religion and educational forces of the community."
