

REPORT COVERS LUMBER OUTPUT

Washington, May 21.—A preliminary comparative report on the production of lumber by kinds of wood for 1919 has been issued by the bureau of census, department of commerce.

The report, which was compiled in cooperation with the forest service, department of agriculture, shows the quantities of lumber manufactured in the United States during the years 1909 and 1919 from the principal species of timbers.

The figures for the year 1919 are preliminary and subject to such changes as may be necessary from further examination of the reports. The data shown for the two years are comparable and include the cut of merchant and custom saw mills for both years.

The total number of mills reporting in 1919 was 30,235, as compared with 46,584 in 1909.

A decrease is shown for all species except Douglas fir, western yellow pine and red gum. The production reported for 1919 for Douglas fir and red gum is the largest for any year for which records are available.

THE BOOSTER COLUMN

Here's one little stunt where every person in Tillamook County who owns an automobile can help advertise the city and county. Attach a plate, similar to the license plate, to the machine with the word "Tillamook." The Chamber of Commerce will undertake to procure these plates for those who want them, at cost.

Yellow and Green is the color to be used for decorating the city for the Jersey Jubilee, and there will not be the least objection to having a few good looking Jersey cows displayed in the city. It is hoped that every business man will get the Jersey Jubilee spirit and get out among the visitors and convince them that Tillamook is the best county in Oregon and in the best part of the state. However that may be, make the city as pretty and attractive looking as possible.

Tillamook county will see the largest number of summer visitors this year, outnumbering those who have come here in previous years by many thousands. The tourist crop is beginning to be a big thing for all parts of the county.

What Tillamook county is in need of is more industries, more people and more money. And the way to procure this is to advertise the county, for good advertising always brings good results. That is the reason that the Chamber of Commerce is making arrangements to advertise the county and induce people to come to Tillamook and locate here. This is a most opportune time to do so, for the next few years there is going to be a considerable increase in the population of Oregon, and Tillamook county will obtain its share by judicious advertising. Watch Tillamook grow through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce.

Every county in Oregon should get behind the 1925 fair in Portland, and it would be a splendid idea if a building could be set apart where every county in the State could have an exhibit. The spirit of cooperation should prevail all over the state, for the fair means a whole lot to every part of Oregon, for it is predicted that the population of the state will be increased several hundred thousands. The fair should not be looked upon as a Portland, but a state affair, for all parts of Oregon will be more or less benefited. Owing to

the reputation of Tillamook cheese and the ideal climate condition prevailing here during the summer season, this county will prove immensely attractive to visitors and home seekers. It is safe to say that Tillamook County will have an attractive booth at the 1925 fair that will be a credit to the county and the State.

Just to show how some commercial organizations in Oregon are keen to interest home seekers coming to the West, the Salem Commercial Club has written a letter to the Tillamook Chamber of Commerce wanting to know whether the care taker would distribute literature from the Salem Commercial Club. That's a good stunt if it can be worked, but it is an encroachment on other organizations territory. It is the intention of the Tillamook Chamber of Commerce to look after the home seekers who come to this city and furnish them with literature matter of Tillamook County.

A proper owner of Tillamook county, not residing in this city and not possessed with a great amount of this world's goods, but always a good booster for Tillamook County when told that Tillamook Chamber of Commerce was getting out a book to boost the county wrote the Chamber as follows: "Cash is not very plentiful with me just now, but will assist to the extent of \$5.00, payable August 1st." Quite often it is hard to induce people, and especially some business men, to affiliate with a Chamber of Commerce, which is doing its best to boost the city and county, but here is one of our citizens who has given his "mite," and without being asked, towards boost-

ing the county. If there are others who want to give their mite to help along the good work, the money will be set aside for publication work. The letter also shows confidence in the Chamber of Commerce giving the entire county a square deal, not confining the boosting to the city. All that the compiler of the booklet has to say on that point is: It was from a county view point and not from a city view point that the book was compiled and the 80 odd illustrations selected. The booklet will plainly show that the Tillamook Chamber of Commerce is endeavoring to boost the county.

It was the intention of the Chamber of Commerce to place half a dozen electric plates in the building of the camp grounds for cooking purposes, but owing to lack of funds he cannot be done this year, because of lack of funds. The Chamber has expended \$300.00 fixing up the camp grounds this year with other expenses caring for the grounds in sight. Consequently a number of Dutch ovens will be placed at different places of the camp grounds and wood will be provided for the use of the campers. If every business and professional man in the city would affiliate with the Chamber of Commerce there would be sufficient money to meet the expenses, but as it is now part of the business men are contributing to the necessary expenses, while others are not contributing one cent to help boost the city and county. The Tillamook Chamber of Commerce should have the support of every business man in the city. Is your name enrolled as one of the boosters of Tillamook City and County.

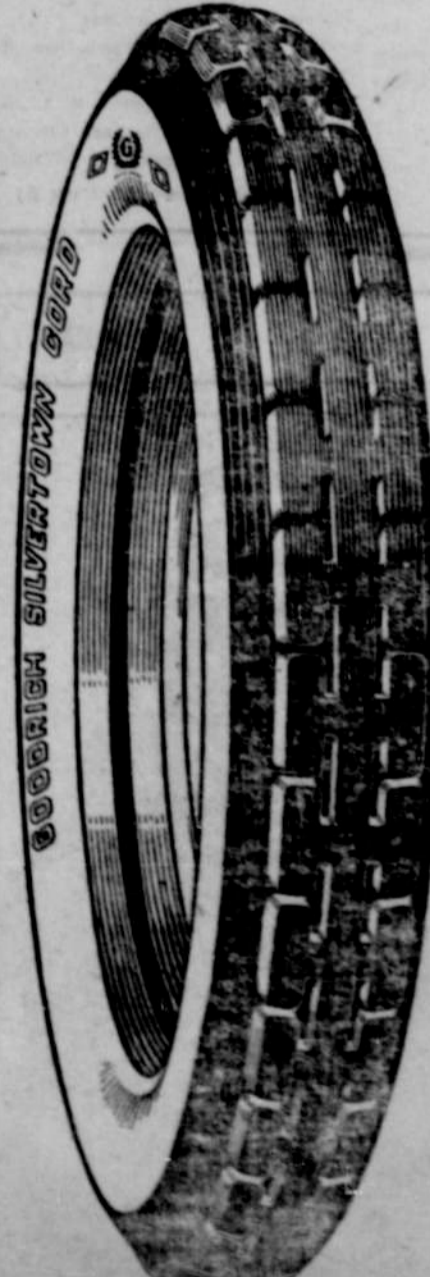
