

THE BOOSTER COLUMN

To avoid false reports getting into the Portland newspapers about the conditions of the roads in Tillamook county this summer, the Chamber of Commerce will send in a weekly report to the Oregon Tourist and Information Bureau, which report will be compiled after consulting with the county surveyor and county road master.

Mr. John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Co. has advised the Chamber of Commerce that the matter of having the train arrive in this city about two o'clock in the afternoon, will be considered soon and the Chamber will be advised later. Mr. Scott has promised to assist in every possible way to help advertise the county, and in answer to a request whether the Southern Pacific Co., kept a list of persons in other states who had written for information about Oregon, sent the Chamber a list of 59 names and promised to send a similar list quite often. It is the intention of the Chamber to send these persons literary matter of Tillamook county and a personal letter urging them to come to Tillamook county and settle.

"This is the prettiest and most delightful country we have met with since we left Montana three weeks ago," was the verdict of two tourists while they were partaking their noon day meal by the side of the road north of the city a few days ago. And that appears to be the verdict of all who come here from the East and Middle West.

This city extends a right royal welcome to the Jersey Jubilee, as well as the right hand of fellowship. The visitors are doubly welcome, because their interests are linked up with the Jersey breeders of Tillamook county, and the Jersey strain of dairy cattle, has never failed to produce the best kind of milk for butter and cheese. It has helped to make Tillamook cheese famous. Although the visitors will find a most enthusiastic bunch of Jersey breeders in Tillamook county, they will find there is a keen good natured rivalry between Jersey, Guernsey and Holstein breeders, all of whom are endeavoring to make this the center for pure bred dairy stock. For there are splendid herds of Jersey, Guernseys and Holsteins in all parts of the county that are a credit to dairymen who are making a feature of breeding pure blooded stock. It is safe to say that the Jersey Jubilee will be a most delightful event, highly interesting and profitable to a dairyman point of view, for Tillamook county is famous for the success it has made in dairying and in the production of cheese, where dairymen receive a higher price for their butterfat than they do in any part of the United States. Not only does the city extend a welcome to the Jersey Jubilee, but the Guernsey and Holstein breeders also extend a welcome and invite the Jersey breeders to inspect their pure blood stock, for there is going to be good fellowship among all breeders of pure blooded stock.

It used to be that the tourists

travel into Tillamook county did not commence until after the 4th of July. Now it is along about the end of May when the heavy travel commences. Last Saturday, Sunday and Monday there was a steady procession of tourists coming and going.

Although the State Highway Commission had practically decided to select the Miami Road as the highway through the north part of the county, it has shown a most magnanimous spirit in offering to reconsider the matter in favor of the beach route. The reason that the Commission selected the Miami road was on account of less cost in its construction, and from a state and not a county point of view. On the other hand the County Court took the position that the county would have to build the beach road anyway and that in the election to bond the county for road improvements, it was the beach route that was voted on, consequently the county court did not have the necessary money to cooperate with the State Highway Commission in improving the Miami road. Hence the delay. The Commission looking at the situation from a state point of view and the county court from a county view point. The people of the county take the same view as the county court, for the reason that it will be better to have the State Highway Commission cooperate with the county court, and on account of economy to the county. It is hoped that the State Highway Commission will soon decide the matter, for sooner this is done the better. Being part of the Roosevelt Highway and a part of the Portland Astoria, Tillamook, Sheridan and McMinnville loop, every effort should be made to have this loop put in good shape by the 1925 fair. The Tillamook Chamber of Commerce has sent its endorsement of the beach road to the State Highway Commission asking that body to make its decision as soon as possible, as follows:

State Highway Commission, Salem Oregon.

Gentlemen: The Tillamook Chamber of Commerce earnestly and respectfully, now that the State Highway Commission has magnanimously decided to reconsider the matter of locating the permanent highway in the north part of Tillamook County, that you designate the beach route, for the reason that our Chamber and a preponderance of the taxpayers of the county favor it, and who are also in hearty accord of our County Court cooperating with the State Highway Commission making this improvement, which is of considerable importance to the entire county.

Our Chamber recommend that you take prompt action in this matter for it is highly important that the Portland, Astoria, Sheridan and McMinnville loop be improved and hard surfaced by the time the 1925 fair is held in Portland, which will result in thousands of home seekers locating in Oregon.

As labor conditions are far better, there will be no difficulty in obtaining plenty of men to do the work.

American Legion Notes



National Headquarters of the American Legion has received more than 1,100 signed resolutions calling upon Congress for immediate legislative aid to disabled veterans of the World War. Among the organizations which have shown the largest responses to the appeal of F. W. Galbraith Jr., National Commander, are Central Labor and Trade unions, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, Knights of Columbus, associations of public school teachers and principals, the American War Mothers, Service Star Legion and American Legion Posts.

When the school board of Port Huron, Mich., became entangled in an educational and financial controversy which resulted in a deadlock, the American Legion post of the city took a hand. The executive men protested against a proposal to oust one teacher and to reduce the salary of another, both of them former soldiers. The deadlock was broken.

Twenty posts of the American Legion and 63 units of its Women's Auxiliary were chartered during the week ending May 13.
