ORDINANCE NO. 409

(Continued from Page 2)
forms to the requirements set forth in this Ordinance or as otherwise provided herein.

The City Recorder may issue a permit to any person, firm, company or corporation desiring to install any plumbing in any building in the city, and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, company or corporation to install any plumbing in said city without having first applied for, and received said permit from the City Recorder. Before any plumbing permit is issued there shall first be paid to the City Recorder the sum of \$1.

Section Thirty-seven.
Pictures under this Ordinance are defined as follows:
Water Closets, Urinals, Wash Trays, Range Boilers, Bath Tubs and Shower Baths, Steam exhaust tanks, Lavatories or Washstands, Fountain Cuspidors, Kitchen and Pantry sinks.

Section Thirty-eight:
The Plumbing Inspector shall be paid for his services as follows: by the plumbers employing him \$0.75 minimum charge which shall include inspection of not more than three fixtures and \$0.10 per fixture in excess of said three fixtures.

Section Thirty-nine:
Any person, firm, company or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) or by imprisonment in the city jail of Tillamook City, Oregon, not to exceed ninety (90) days or by both fine and imprisonment, providing that in default of the payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in the City Jail until such fine shall be discharged at the rate of one day imprisonment for each two dollars of such fine.

HAS FAITH IN HIS "CURE"

Only Patient Who Tried Snake Diet for Leprosy Died, but Doctor Holds to His Theory.

In practical medicine for the benefit of the natives I worked out one theory in regard to leprosy, which is a fairly common ailment in the Archipelago. I asked myself why, since a snake sheds its skin, a man who is afflicted with disease should not be able to do the same thing.

In Singapore there was a rich Chinese leper, known as Ong Si Chew, who asked me repeatedly why I did not bring him some new remedy for his disease. Since he had a large household of servants who took care of him, and his own carriage and riches when he traveled, he was allowed to live unmolested by the authorities; but he was very unhappy, because he had tried all the remedies of the native doctors and was steadily growing worse.

At last I told him that I had something that might help. He asked me what it was, but I would not tell him. When he insisted, I answered, "Snakes."

"U-h-h!" he exclaimed, waving his arms in the air.

Then I explained my theory. The ability of a snake to shed his skin might be transferred to a human being if he ate snakes; and if so, the person would be able to shed his leprosy. Ong Si Chew did not care for the idea at all, but I told him it was worth trying and I argued that a snake is much cleaner than an eel.

At last he consented, and I furnished him with a number of small pythons, with the instructions that they were to be killed and cleaned immediately before they were eaten. He was to eat them raw with his rice.

I left Singapore soon after that, and when I returned I found that Ong Si Chew had died. People thought it was a great joke on me because my patient had not survived the treatment, but I am far from being convinced that the cure will not work—or, at least, help to throw off leprosy. Ong Si Chew was in the last stages of the disease, and his case was not a fair test.—Charles Mayer, in Asia Magazine.

Polly Remembered Cyclone.

A parrot, named Polly Langston, died recently at the age of fifty-three. A native of Missouri, Polly was a feathered prodigy whose remarkable talents included many vocal and linguistic accomplishments. She could sing and talk in English as well as Spanish, her mother tongue; pray and sing several of the old familiar hymns, which she had picked up at church and social gatherings, besides having a wide repertory of conversational "small talk." At one time, when the circus came to her local town, and Polly had poured forth her sage salutations to the passing parade, the attention of the late P. T. Barnum was attracted to her and a large cash offer was made for her, but her owner could not be induced to part with her. She remembered to her passing hour an event of her early life when a cyclone wrecked the town and brought death to scores of the inhabitants. Polly survived by a miracle, but for more than 30 years afterwards whenever the dark clouds gathered she became so frantic with fear that it was necessary to put her where she would escape the lightning's flash and the roar of thunder.

Light House Trail to Be Built

It is reported that the county is building a trail from Bayocan to Cape Mears Lighthouse. The trail will be built in such a way that no grade exceeds 8 per cent. The purpose of this is self-evident, the county on account of lack of funds cannot at the present time build a road from Bayocan to the Lighthouse, and in its place will build the trail, which, on account of its construction, may be made a road whenever the county has the money. The trail will be above the slide which has caused so much trouble in the past. It is stated that the Bayocan resorts will open the same date as the past season.

NEW THEORY IN ASTRONOMY

Possibility That There is a Tail Attached to Our Earth Leads to Ingenious Suggestions.

Opposite to the sun there is a very mysterious glowing patch, which is thought to be attached to the earth as a cometlike tail.

The highest regions of our atmosphere consist of very light gases, and the impression is that some of these were driven away by the sun or by other means, and that they stream off from the earth into space just as the light gases do from the head of a large comet.

Naturally, this theory has aroused much controversy, and has led to all sorts of ingenious suggestions. One of these is that a swarm of meteors (of the kind we know as shooting stars) keeps us company through space at a distance of about a million miles, or four times the distance of the moon. But a tailed earth is an ideal vehicle for imaginative flights. It might be argued that if our globe has a tail why should not the planets Mercury and Venus, and even Mars, have one. Well, perhaps they have, for all we know to the contrary. Our earth's tail would be much more easily seen by us because of its nearness and brightness.
