

### Electrical Wizard Coming

Glenn L. Morris Demonstrates Inventions.



One of the most interesting departures in this season's Chautauqua will be the appearance of Glenn L. Morris and his assistant in two unique scientific demonstrations. The world has been moving forward so rapidly of late in the matter of new inventions that the Cadmean System has secured this brilliant young scientist to present in a popular manner the most interesting and important developments of recent years and indicate the lines of experiment along which the great students and inventors are now working for future discoveries.

Mr. Morris' demonstrations are

chiefly concerned with electricity, that marvelous force about which so little is known. He carries a mass of apparatus which completely fills the stage and performs some almost unbelievable wonders. Thus he stands on a metal plate electrified a hundred times as powerfully as the electric chair, he lights lamps and welds metal through his body, produces thunder storms, lights candles from running water, discharges guns and unfurls flags by wireless, shows circles and discs of fire and other wonderfully beautiful fiery spectacles.

Mr. Morris will appear at Chautauqua both afternoon and evening of the fifth day.

Howard McLeod who has many friends in Mohler, Tillamook and Wheeler, is a Tillamook county boy who has done well at Hill Military academy. At the recent commencement exercises young McLeod received the appointment of Sergeant of junior cadets

Howard ranked well in deportment and is a favorite among his fellow cadets. Erroll Haltom of Tillamook was up in Portland for the commencement and was welcomed at the reception. Haltom was a senior commission while he was at the academy and told his friends there that he hoped to take up the work again in the fall. J. A. Hill, president of the academy, states that the Tillamook boys are always on the list of those who make good.

During the month of June \$90,591.85 was received by G. G. Brown clerk of the state land board, custodian of school fund notes and mortgages and turned over to State Treasurer O. P. Hoff.

Governor Olcott has reappointed Frank K. Lovell as state tax commissioner. His new term will expire May 21, 1925.

#### STATE CAPITAL NEWS

A hospital unit of the Oregon national guard has been organized at Lebanon.

State stationery sent out from the capitol will bear the advertisement "Oregon Will Hold a World's Fair in 1925."

The new World war veterans' state aid commission has unanimously elected Captain Harry C. Brumbaugh of Portland as its executive secretary.

Governor Olcott honored a requisition from the governor of Massachusetts for the extradition of Sam Segal who is wanted in Boston on a charge of non-support.

Two hundred musical works of Oregon composers have been presented to the state library by the Oregon Society of Composers through Dr Emil Enna, of Portland, president of the society.

The public service commission has suspended until October 1 the proposed increased rates of the Enterprise Electric company. The company had the rates scheduled to become effective July 1.

Nearly sixty Oregon industrial concerns that operate under the workmen's compensation act have elected to take advantage of the reduction in rates available by the establishment of a system of accident prevention. The reduction amounts to 5 per cent.

Miss Juanita Powers of Wallowa, is winner for Oregon of the essay contest put on by the highway transportation committee at Washington D. C., and her essay will enter the national contest for a \$5000 scholarship prize, which may be used in any American college or university of her choosing.

Governor Olcott refused to honor a requisition from the governor of California for the extradition of A. W. Weaver of Eugene, who was wanted in San Francisco on a charge of larceny of an airplane. It was held that Weaver had acted in good faith.

J. F. Albright, of Oregon City, has filed with the secretary of state copies of a proposed constitutional amendment which he has initiated and which will be submitted to the voters of the state at the general election of 1922, providing that 7 per cent shall be the maximum legal rate of interest on contracts by

express agreement of the parties to the contract.

It is unlawful for a pawnbroker to engage in business in Oregon without a license from the state superintendent of banks for which he shall pay \$100 according to an opinion of the attorney general, written in reply to an inquiry by the bank superintendent.

When a school district has its books audited by the district boundary board the expense of the audit should be borne by the district and not from the general fund of the county, says an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to an inquiry by A. J. Moore, district attorney for Deschutes county.

Neal Holloway, who escaped from the state penitentiary May 23, while working as a trusty, was arrested at Payette, Idaho, and has been returned to the state prison. George Evans who escaped at the same time also a trusty, was returned two weeks ago from Wyoming.

Colonel George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon pronounces the most successful in the history of the guard the artillery and field encampment at Camp Lewis and the heavy artillery encampment at Fort Stevens. The camps closed July 30 and the units have all returned home.

Approximately forty-three gallons of gasoline were used by the average Oregon motorist during the month of May, according to figures of the secretary of state. A total of 1,458,398.5 gallons of gasoline and 183,907 gallons of distillate were used during the month.

Salem banks will advance the state approximately half a million dollars to take care of warrants drawn on the general fund which just now is depleted. State Treasurer Hoff has announced. This will make it unnecessary to indorse the warrants not paid for want of funds

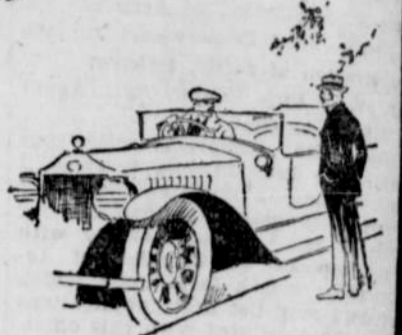
