FORESTERS TO ACT AS HEALTH OFFICER

PORTLAND, Or. July 11.—By an agreement just signed by District Forester George H. Cecil and Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer of Oregon, the forest supervisors in the state of Oregon have been appointed as deputy state officers. This agreement applies only to the forest supervisors who are the officers in charge of the National Forests, of which there are fourteen in Oregon. The above agreement does not apply to the forest rangers or other field officers. The forest supervisors will co-operate with the Oregon State Health Board in enforcing the sanitation laws of the state within the National Forests and will serve without pay. The duties of the forest supervisors under this agreement are to report insanitary conditions and violations of the Oregon health laws occurring within the National Forests; to advise violations of what the State health laws are, and if such violations are continued to report such conditions to the State health officer. The forest officers under existing federal rules are required to protect and keep pure so far as they are able the domestic water supplies of towns, cities and camping places, and to prevent the accumulation of filth and insanitary practices in the Forests that may be injurious to the public using the National Forest areas. With the greatly increasing use being made of National Forests by the public for recreation Forest officers state that the necessity of enforcement of the federal and state sanitation rules become imperative for there are still careless campers who not only do not put out their camp fires, but who leave at their camping places tin cans rubbish and filth, all of which is a menace both to the public and to the Forests. Forest Officers urge compliance with the well-known slogan of the Mazamas, "Leave a Clean Camp and a Dead Fire."

PERSHING INFORMS MEN OF RIGHTS

One of the first official acts of General John J. Pershing upon assuming his new duties as Chief of Staff of the Army on July 1, was the issuing on that day of an order establishing contact between the War Department and the Bureau of War Risk Insurance for the purpose of keeping former service men informed of their rights under the War Risk Act and aiding them in securing these benefits through the cooperation of the personnel of the Army with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance. This order, General Order No. 27, issues the following instructions to practically the entire army: Assistance for ex-service men in their relation with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance—1. It is the purpose of the War Department, acting through its available personnel to assist ex-service men in every possible way in securing contact with the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, thus enabling them without delay to renew or convert their insurance, to secure medical or dental treatment, hospitalization or vocational training, or to present their claims for compensation. 2. The obligation is imposed upon all personnel adjutants throughout the Army recruiting officers, and regular officers on duty with the National Guard and organized reserves to aid their less fortunate comrades. Such officers will at once familiarize themselves with the orders and circulars relating to the War Risk Insurance Bureau, in so far as these instructions refer to renewal or conversion of insurance, compensation, medical or dental treatment, hospitalization and vocational training so that intelligent assistance and advice may be afforded ex-service men in regard to their relations with the Bureau. 3. The officers mentioned will obtain without delay direct from the War Risk Insurance Bureau, a supply of all blank forms needed by ex-service men in their contact with this Bureau. 4. Upon application from ex-soldiers, the officers mentioned in paragraph 2, will furnish blank forms, will assist in the preparation of applications and will themselves promptly forward the completed applications or statements directly to the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. The state livestock sanitary board has overruled a protest of Lake county sheep men against enforcement of the board's sheep dipping order. The board has ordered that all buck bands in Malheur, Lake, Harney, Klamath, Deschutes and Jackson counties must be dipped before being turned in next fall.



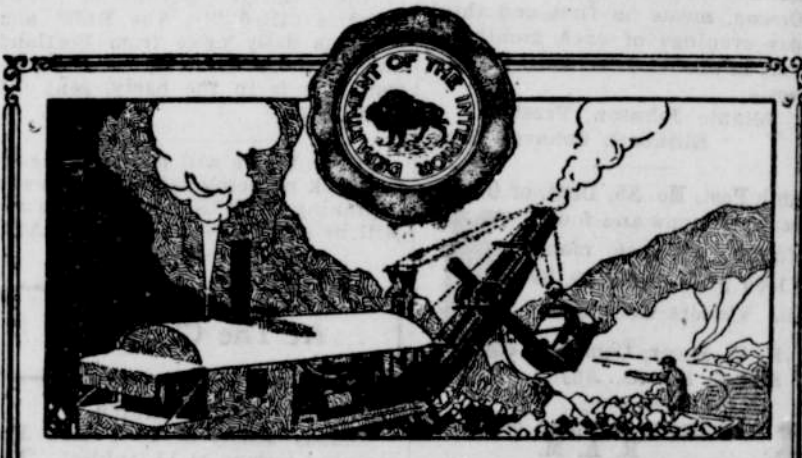

ORDER DECLARING TILLAMOOK COUNTY A WEED CONTROL DISTRICT

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Tillamook County. In the Matter of Declaring Tillamook County a Weed Control District. This matter comes on now for consideration, and it appearing to the Court certain noxious weeds, to-wit: the Canada Thistle, Burdock and Cocklebur (known as the dagger cocklebur) now growing in Tillamook county, Oregon, are detrimental to the public welfare of the citizens of the county, and that the whole of Tillamook County, Oregon, should be declared a Weed Controlling District. It is therefore ordered by the court that the Canada Thistle, Burdock and Cocklebur (known as dagger cocklebur) are noxious weeds and are detrimental to the public welfare of the people of Tillamook county, that the whole of Tillamook county, Oregon, be, and it is hereby declared to be a Weed Controlling District. Dated July 9th, 1921. HOMER MASON, County Judge H. M. FARMER, Co. Com. H. V ALLEY, County Com. The Following Bill was Passed by the 1921 Legislature: Providing for the formation of weed control districts, the naming of weeds to be considered noxious within said districts, the appointing of weed inspectors, penalties for violation, permitting the court to create a fund for control of weeds on highways and public lands within the weed districts, providing for the vacation of weed districts under certain conditions and repealing sections 4838, 4840, 4841, 4842, 4843, 4844, 4845 and 4846 of Oregon Laws. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: Section 1. The county court of each county may declare said county a weed control district for the purpose of destroying such weeds and of preventing the seeding and spreading of such other weeds and plants as the act may for the purposes of this act declare noxious. If said county is not made a weed control district or if said county weed control district does not include all such weeds or plants desired included as noxious, interested parties may present a petition for a special weed control district and upon presentation of such petition describing the area to be included naming the noxious weeds or plants to be destroyed and those to be prevented from blooming and producing seed within said district, and bearing the signatures of not less than twenty-five farm owners constituting a majority of farm owners in
