To the Farmers of Tillamook County
Owing to further advances in Wisconsin, the association has been enabled to raise the price on triplets to 24c Tillamook, Young Americans and Longhorns selling at 25c Tillamook. On account of heavy stocks in most coast cities, however cheese is not moving out very fast, as the trade must first get used to higher priced cheese.
Our stocks in cold storage have been reduced from about 8000 boxes to about 4000 boxes. It is the intention to take all of the May and June cheese out of storage, replacing same with July and August stock. This will probably be kept for next winter's trade. Unless Wisconsin market declines soon, our prices will probably be further advanced as production decreases.
As cheese prices have been going up, feed prices have been coming down. We are now selling the various mixtures of corn, oats, barley, etc., at \$42 in ton lots. Bran and mill run \$38. Clover hay can be had at \$15 and less. Corn \$42. Wheat 3c per lb. in small quantities. Middlings are \$2.50 per sack or \$49 per ton for the best grade. We believe it will pay the farmers to keep up milk production by feeding until the fall rains commence. Those desiring to purchase in ton lots can have their August purchases taken out of their August milk, by making request of the same to the secretary. Linsseed meal and cotton seed meal \$2.25 per 100 lbs.

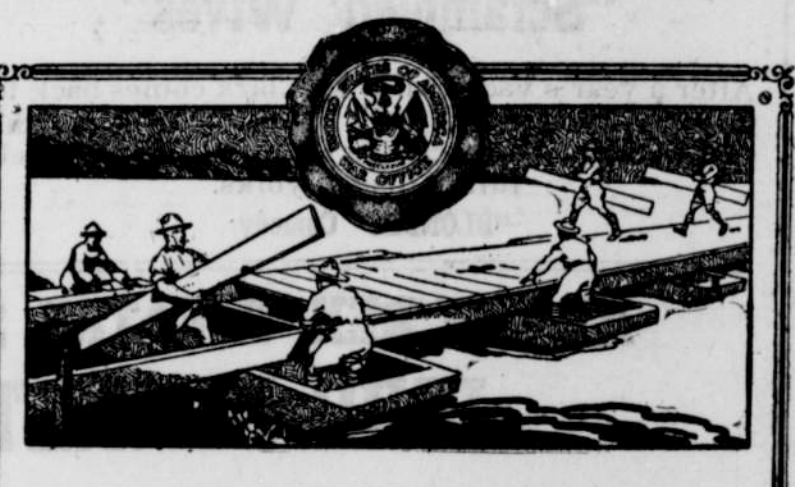
