One hundred and thirty-one passengers were on board, but the number drowned will not be known for several days. Many Port land and valley people were aboard the ill-fated ship. 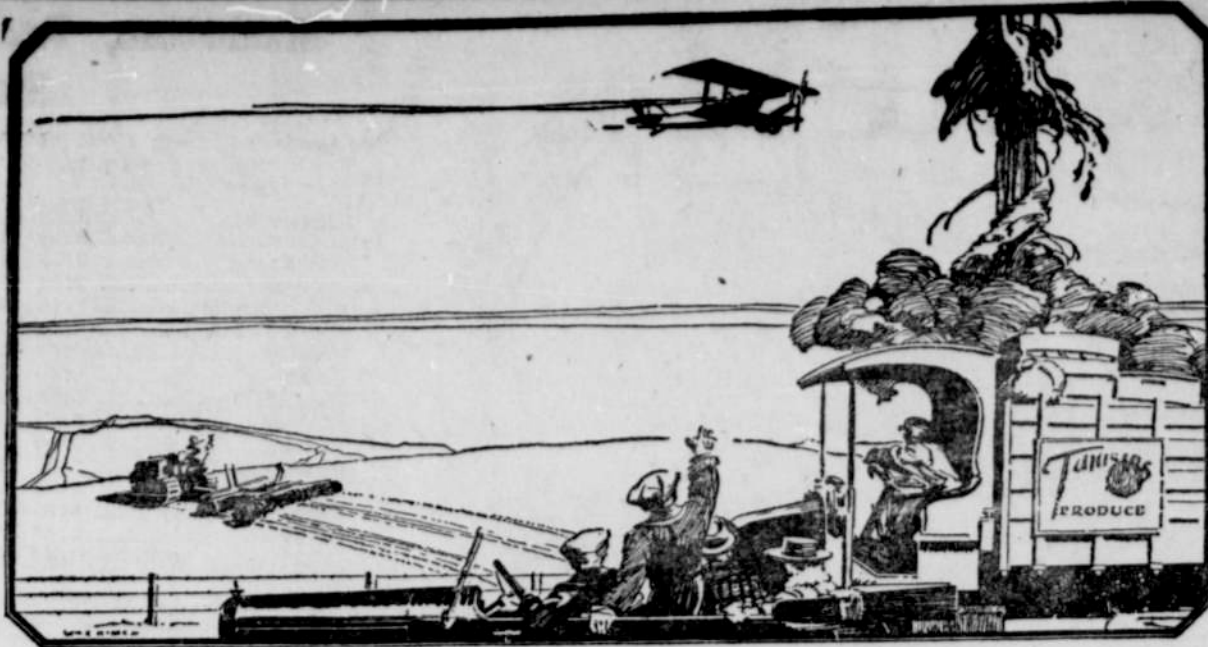

Carl Fuchs and wife and the former's sister, Miss Agnes Peterson, of first of the week on their way to the beaches where they are intending to spend their vacation.

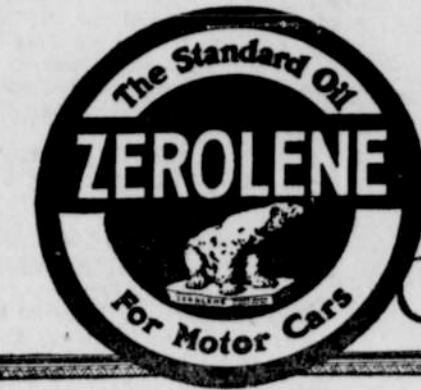
Mr. and Mrs. Webb McCracken and Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Goodman attended the dedication of the Seawall at Seaside Sunday.
