### HOW SIMPSON SUBSTITUTED AXEL GREASE FOR OYSTERS

Captain F. E. Dodge of this city who has spent most of his life along the coast of Tillamook and Lincoln county, was one of the pioneer navigators of small craft out and in Tillamook and Alsea and Yaquina bays. Incidentally, he knew many of the pioneers of the state, when railroads were few, and coast roads were not what they now are, and are speedily becoming. He has the distinction of helping to can the first salmon on Alsea Bay, where he was for several years associated with the late Capt. Nice, in a cannery at Waldport.

While living on Yaquina Bay the Capt. became acquainted with Sam Simpson, the poet, whose father was for several years Indian Agent at Siletz Indian reservation. The Simpsons had a store at the small village of Newport, and Sam officiated as clerk

when the poetic muse was not working in his imaginative brain. As a clerk he was not a howling success, and really, he took a little interest in the proxy business or store keep- ing.  
In those days Newport had saloons, and one day a fisherman, well-known for his bibulous tendencies, entered the store and asked Sam, for some canned oysters. The fisherman was pretty drunk at the time, and after Sam had looked in vain for the product, and found none, he substituted two tins of canned axel grease, and the fisherman repaired to his boat to assuage the pangs of hunger.  
Half an hour later the fisherman appeared, haggard and indignant, and accused Simpson of selling him "rotten" salmon.  
Sam listened with grave dignity for a moment until the fisherman had concluded, when he said:
